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The New York Yacht Club has elected to honorary membership Emperor William of Germany and his brother, Prince Henry of Prussia.

Thoroughbred cattle cost money. Ladd's Washington County stock farm sent thirty-nine head to the Spokane Interstate Fair last week for auction. They realized \$12,680, an average of \$320.

The next state legislature, says the Albany Democrat, instead of adding to the tax burdens of the people, should knock off some of the grafts that were thrown upon the people by the last session, increasing the state tax to the immense proportion of 7 milles.

Oregonian: There is a railroad race in Southern Oregon—one line racing from Roseburg to Coos bay, and another from Grants Pass to Crescent City, Cal. Can it be that both have the same Eastern connection in view? We should like to see the Columbia Southern join in the race to add railroad mileage in Oregon.

The net receipts from the disposal of public lands in Oregon in the last fiscal year were \$546,025, against \$364,988 for the preceding fiscal year. These combined amounts go to the credit of the state and will eventually be used in constructing irrigation works within its boundaries under the new law. The gross receipts of the United States from public lands last year were \$6,261,927.

The following is clipped from an article in the Portland Evening Telegram of Oct. 18th, relative to the building of the Great Central R. R. between Coos Bay and Salt Lake:

"These are cited by experts as the reasons why Coos Bay will become great: Because of the advantages of its harbor; because of its stockraising, dairying interests which are growing and making rich the man who engaged therein; because the vast bodies of timber at its doors with mills already turning out lumber by the tens and hundreds of thousands of feet daily is already a mine of wealth; because of her vast coal fields, which are of easy access, will furnish fuel for vast shipping and commercial industries for years to come; because all the timber for shipbuilding and of the very best quality now being used here in the construction of ships and shipbuilding on the bay will be one of the very important branches of manufacturing which will rise upon the entry of the new direct line of transportation. Bangor will be the chief town on the bay because of its fine location on deep water channel and the terminal point of the new road. The Great Central enterprise has inspired the building of a big hospital in that place."

San Francisco, Oct. 22.—It is learned in an authentic quarter that all the Spreckels interests in Coos County are under bond to the Great Central Railroad, or to some one in New York acting in the interest of corporation. It is stated that the sum named in the bond is \$1,500,000, and that it includes the 27 miles of railroad now in operation between Marshfield and Myrtle Point, about 2000 acres of land, chiefly coal bearing; coal mines of the company capable of yielding about 700 tons of coal a day; much city property and wharves at Marshfield, together with the iron collier Czarina. Of course the railroad spurs to the mines are included, as well as the town of Beaver Hill, at the mines of the same name. All the material interests of the Spreckels Bros. in Coos County are put in this option.

It is also said that the Glasgow townsite and coal lands, on the north side of Coos Bay, have been bonded by or for the Great Central Railroad for \$500,000.

Law Now In Effect.

Salem, Oct. 24.—This evening Attorney-General Blackburn read an opinion to Governor Geer, in which he holds that the initiative and referendum amendment is now in effect, and that the people can avail themselves of its provisions, without any legislation prescribing a mode of procedure other than that prescribed by the amendment itself. It is known that the Governor has said that if legislation is necessary before the amendment can be put into effect, he will call a special session for that purpose.

This question he has considered of great importance. Several days ago he submitted the matter to the Attorney-General, and that official investigated the subject in all its bearings. The opinion cites various provisions of the amendment, showing that the purpose was to secure to the people the power to initiate desired legislation and enact the same, independently of the Legislature, and to order that any act of the Legislature be submitted to them for approval or rejection.

After discussing the principles of construction of laws, Mr. Blackburn lays down the rule that a constitutional provision may be said to be self-executing if it supplies sufficient rule by means of which the right given may be enjoyed and protected, or the duty imposed may be enforced. The closing clause of the amendment is then quoted, as follows:

"Petitions and orders of the initiative and for the referendum shall be filed with the Secretary of State, and in submitting the same to the people he and all other officers shall be guided by the general laws and the act submitting this amendment, until legislation shall be especially provided therefor."

The opinion holds that the provisions of the amendment provide for the filing of the necessary petitions with the Secretary of State; that they prescribe the minimum number of legal voters whose names shall be signed thereto; that they provide the rule for determining whether or not each petition has the requisite number of names of legal voters attached to it; and that when the petition is filed, all that is necessary is that he shall submit the matter as petitioned for.

It is held that the provisions for submission of a measure is mandatory upon the Secretary of State. The opinion holds therefore, that the amendment "supplies a sufficient rule by means of which the right given may be enjoyed and protected." And that it is therefore self-executive and now in force and effect.

Salem, Oct. 22.—Governor Geer this morning made the following statement relative to the proposed special session to a Telegram representative:

"There are some good reasons for calling a special session of the Legislature, against which, of course, is always to be considered the item of expense. In deciding the question the opinion and the reasons given for it of the Taxpayers' League of Multnomah County would naturally have weight and should have consideration."

Coquille Herald: George W. Majory, of Bandon, was fatally injured by a falling limb Saturday afternoon while working in the logging camp of J. T. Jenkin's, which is located near Prosper. The deceased was acting as hook-tender and had just hooked the team to a long log which swung around when the team started it, striking a dead tree near by from which the jar brought down a limb which struck Mr. Majory on the head, causing concussion of the brain. He never recovered consciousness and passed away the following morning at 2 o'clock.

Portland, Oct. 20.—The Western Packing Company otherwise known as the Linton horse cannery, owned by M. Kinsman, was destroyed by fire late Saturday night. The cannery was located in Linton, about six miles northwest of Portland, and was used for canning horseflesh, which was exported in large quantities all over the world, especially to France.

This was the only one of its kind in the United States, and one of the old landmarks in the state.

Tacoma, Oct. 20.—Ice is forming on the Upper Yakon and steamer navigation will be closed this week. Thousands of people are enroute southward from Dawson City.

Regarding the Coast Country.

E. C. Pentland, the Oregonian's traveling correspondent in a well written article, dated at Crescent City, Oct. 18th, devotes considerable space to the milling, dairying and mining interests of the coast country, from which we quote the following:

"There are two classes of people who are interested in reading descriptions of a country; one class seeking for information which will enable them to decide, in their own minds, whether they desire to locate and make their homes there, and gain a livelihood by engaging in business or working for wages, and another class who are ever alert for opportunities to invest their capital in safe but profitable ventures. To the latter class belong tourists, capitalists and manufacturers; and the crying need of this section is that class."

"The residents of Del Norte County should join with those of Curry, Coos, Lane and Douglas Counties, in Oregon, and each small locality have an organization which would devote itself to giving information to the Eastern people as to the many and varied attractions of these coast counties. Thereby the tourist from the East would be induced to include in his visit to the Pacific Coast a trip through the counties bordering on the ocean. The information which he might thus obtain, if he were to meet and receive the courtesies of proper persons in the several localities, would be of great benefit. People living here see the many chances for profitable investment of money; but they are powerless to act, as they have not the capital. Men of means in the East desire to invest their money in profitable enterprises, but, not having been here to see with their own eyes, they are timid about investing in ventures which are only described by others, no matter how glittering may be the promises of quickly earning large dividends."

"If each of one hundred local communities along the coast were to organize an advertising union, and an advertisement of the whole Northern coast, costing \$1000, were inserted in a number of different Eastern publications, the cost for each local union would be only its quota, and all the publicity each local union would need in such an advertisement would be the name of the secretary. Those seeking to know more of the details would avail themselves of these addresses, and letters would pour in by the thousands. These advertisements should be so constructed as to appeal to the class mentioned, namely, tourists, capitalists and manufacturers. "God helps those who help themselves," and, if the people here, few though they are compared to the vast area of country, would but unite in a movement of this kind, the results would be enormously to their advantage."

"There are perhaps half a dozen saw mills operating from Crescent City to Coos Bay, a distance of coast line of over 150 miles. There is not the least doubt in my mind that, if the right persons were to visit this section and investigate, the result would be many more mills in a very short time. There are immense tracts of virgin forest; there are streams down which the logs could be floated, harbors which could be improved so as to permit vessels to enter, and once placed this lumber in vessels on the bosom of the broad Pacific Ocean, it can be transported to any part of the world."

"The development of the dairying industry comes next in importance in these coast counties, and although it has reached considerable magnitude already, if more men of capital were to take hold of it the benefits would result not only to them, but to those already engaged in the business. It would create cheaper and better methods of production and larger and more profitable markets."

"Hundreds of prospectors locate mining claims out in the mountains here every year. They are experienced enough to recognize that, if their prospects were developed, there are millions of dollars in them, but they are without the means necessary, and the man who has the money and could make a venture will not do so until he is better informed through a personal investigation, and such investigation is difficult to secure. If there were some unity of action in inducing the tourist, capitalist and manufacturer to visit this section, the miner, as well as other residents, would be greatly benefited."

Rejected the Treaty by a Tie Vote.

Copenhagen, Oct. 22.—The Landsting today rejected the second reading of the bill providing for the ratification of the treaty between Denmark and the United States in regard to the cession of the Danish West Indies to the latter country. The vote stood 32 to 32, a tie. The announcement caused great excitement in the House, and demonstrations on the part of the spectators. In the voting there was one absent. The Rightists and two Independent Conservatives opposed the bill. The Leftists and six Independent Conservatives supported it. The vote was taken without any debate today, and the result was greeted with mingled cheers and shouts of disapproval.

Crown Prince Frederick, all the Ministers and many members of the diplomatic corps and members of the Folkething were present. The public galleries were crowded.

Washington, Oct. 22.—The State Department was today advised of the action of the Landsting in rejecting the treaty of cession. As summing that today's action is final for the present session, the officials here are disposed to view the situation philosophically, resting on the belief that it will only be a short time before Denmark will tire of making good a deficit in the revenue of the islands and let us have them.
