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Seattle, Oct. 30.—An unknown Alaska miner went mad in a local variety theater this morning, presumably from a mad-dog bite. He was sitting down, when suddenly he sprang at the crowd like mad, with mouth foaming, and barking and biting like a dog. Six strong policemen bound and sent him to the County Jail, where he was placed in a strait-jacket. At noon he was sleeping, under the influence of chloroform.

New York, Oct. 26.—Elizabeth Cady Stanton, the well-known woman suffragist, died today at her home in West Ninety-fourth street, in this city. Old age was given as the cause of death. She was conscious almost to the last. About a week ago Mrs. Stanton began to fail rapidly. This became noticeable last week, and then it was known to the family that her death was only a question of days or hours.

Washington, Oct. 25.—Attorney-General Knox has decided that if the United States should accept the offer of new Panama canal company, submitted last spring, for the sale of the canal for \$40,000,000, it would receive through the parties in interest, a valid and unincumbered title to the property. This decision was arrived at after a thorough and exhaustive investigation of the situation in Paris, first by special attorney Charles W. Russell and later by the attorney-general himself. The attorney-general formally submitted the opinion to president Roosevelt today. It makes about 300 pages.

Washington, Oct. 31.—The first pension to be granted to a claimant in the Pacific Northwest, under the Indian War veteran bill passed at the last session, is to Patrick Maloney, of Portland, who has just been allowed \$8 a month. It is promised by the Pension Bureau that other allowances will be made as the claims can be examined and certified. Several claimants from the Eastern States, who were the first to file applications, have been drawing pensions under this act for several weeks.

Salem, Oct. 29.—The state printing office is now working on the last form of the new Oregon code and the two volumes will be sent to the bindery next week. It is expected that the new code will be ready for distribution about the middle of November. Under the act authorizing this code, the publisher must furnish the state 1000 sets for \$10,000, and must keep the code on sale for six years at not more than \$12 per set. The volumes delivered to the state will be distributed among the members of the last Legislature, the state officers, Federal Judges, Circuit Judges, District Attorneys, County Treasurers, County Commissioners and Justices of the Peace. A set will be sent to each Governor and each state library in the United States.

San Francisco, Oct. 31.—An important capture of counterfeiters was made by the Federal authorities, aided by the police early this morning, when two men giving the names of Harold Jones and Harry Peterson were taken into custody, after a hard struggle. The men have been under surveillance for some weeks past, and according to the authorities, have passed a great quantity of bogus half dollars. Thirteen counterfeit 50 cent pieces were found on Peterson, and one or two on Jones.

Notice of the operations of the two was sent to this city from Seattle, and it is believed that fully \$10,000 worth of the stuff has been unloaded by them on the Coast. Plaster of paris and other articles used in counterfeiting were found in their room, but no moulds, which, however, the police believe they will yet discover.

Charges of Timber Frauds.

Roseburg Review.

A newspaper dispatch from Washington yesterday says: The Secretary of the Interior has just received positive evidence of extensive frauds being perpetrated in Oregon under the timber and stone act, whereby certain persons are seeking to acquire absolute control of the richest timber lands in the public domain in that state. The most flagrant violations of the law have occurred in the Roseburg, Lakeview and the Dalles land districts. According to the secretary's advice people are being shipped into these districts by carloads and are immediately entering the forested lands under the timber and stone act. In other instances large tracts are being denuded of their timber by parties who are doing assessment work on what they assert to be mineral developments. There is strong proof that a large number of these alleged mineral locations are on non-mineral land and have been made purely for the purpose of acquiring the timber. When this is accomplished they are abandoned.

So positive and convincing is the evidence now in the secretary's hands that immediate steps are to be taken to prosecute every one of the fraudulent entrymen. As a first step in this direction Secretary Hitchcock today ordered that all entries in Oregon under the timber and stone act be suspended pending specific investigation, and directed that each timber entryman be served with a notice to show cause why his entry should not be canceled. If, during this suspension, any entryman attempts to cut or remove timber from the tract sought by him, he will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law.

The ordered investigation will include the land offices at Roseburg, the Dalles and Lakeview to determine whether or not they have been in collusion with the perpetrators of the extensive frauds.

When called upon by a Review representative, Register J. T. Bridges, of the Roseburg land office, said, regarding the matter:

"I have nothing to say at this time concerning the article which appears in Wednesday's Oregonian concerning timber land frauds in this district, further than to state that I have no information of any frauds being committed at this office as stated therein, and shall be glad to have the department make the fullest investigation possible concerning the same. When I have received from the department information as to the nature of the charges referred to, I will be able to answer the same more fully."

It was further learned that the Roseburg office had just received a letter from Commissioner Hermann by which the land officials here were directed to suspend all action upon any and all entries made in their office for lands under the Timber and Stone Act during the past quarter. The past official quarter extended from June 30, 1902, to Sept. 30, 1902. There have been about 850 to 875 timber entries made in the Roseburg office upon which final proof has not yet been completed. Under this order it appears that final action upon same will now be suspended pending a special investigation.

As Inspector McMillen recently visited the Roseburg office, and, as we understand, found everything in proper condition, the alleged charges of fraud and collusion are surprising and mystifying to the local officials. Most of the timber land entries made for several months past have been by eastern people of means who evidently came here with the purpose of investing because they believe the demand for lumber will soon make Oregon timber lands valuable.

The report that new timber entries would not be received is erroneous. No such order has yet been made and 25 or 30 new claims were filed on in the Roseburg office today.

New York, Oct. 30.—Joint agencies shortly will be established by the Southwestern railroad in New York, Boston and other Eastern cities, and also in the principal European capitals, for the purpose of turning the tide of immigration into the Southwest. This move, says the Times, involves an aggressive competition with the Northwestern roads, which have been carrying the greater portion of west-bound emigrants for several years.

E. B. Burns and His Woeful Wall.

Rogue River, Nov. 2, 1902.

EDITOR TRIBUNE:—In the issue of the Gold Beach "Long Felt Want" of Oct. 23, one E. B. Burns pours out a dismal tale of woe, comparable to the last wail of a dying calf, not only showing himself to be a weakling, unable to "stand on his own bottom," but while crying for the sympathy of the people to aid him in his violations of the laws of State, he shows his inconsistent vindictiveness, in that issue and since, by virtually condemning and anathematizing the people for their wickedness in electing such monsters as R. D. Hume and our Justice of the Peace, taking special occasion to question the honor and integrity of our Justice, in whom the people have expressed their confidence, and whose duty it was to take cognizance of the unlawful acts of this man Burns. And he implores the sympathy of the law-abiding citizens, with whom his ideas so materially conflict.

Mr. Burns' bitterness of heart seems to extend not only to Mr. Hume, but to the officers, lawyers, and all those who gave Mr. Hume a rousing majority for a second term in the legislature. If he does not want himself and his employees brought before this wicked Justice why does he persist in violating the laws of the State, by trespassing upon property where he has no right?

And this man Burns seeks to gain the sympathy of the people by gross misrepresentations. Referring to the costs of the criminal suits against himself and companions, he says: "This is your money and my money that is being maliciously wasted—money that should be used for the schooling of our children." How much of this money is yours, Mr. Burns? How much taxes have you paid in Curry county altogether? Is it your ignorance, or a desire to deceive that you intimate that the school children are being robbed in an effort to force you to respect the laws? Do you not know that the payment or non-payment of these costs in no way affect the schools—that the school fund remains the same—unless it so happens that you receive justice and are forced to contribute a liberal sum to the school fund? Mr. Hume has no children, yet he pays about one-sixth of the county school tax. They do say you have children—how many I do not know. What part of the school tax do you pay? And again, who is the most reprehensible, the man who invokes the law to protect his property rights, or the man who wantonly and persistently violates the law and gets himself arrested at the expense of the taxpayers. Which is the most to be condemned by the taxpayers?

And Mr. Burns again misrepresents when he pretends that either Mr. Hume or the law have prevented or attempted to prevent him from navigating the river, anchoring boats or landing, as it is well known that Mr. Burns and his employees come and go at will, land where they please, and tie their steamers to trees growing on Mr. Hume's land. When Mr. Burns or any one else enters upon the property of another for the purpose of fishing, dragging seines or doing anything else, without permission, he is a trespasser.

It is true Mr. Hume owns most of the river frontage for several miles up. He paid liberally for it, and has a right to invoke the law to protect it from trespassers of the Burns stripe. He has made a financial success, is conducting the most extensive and important industry of the county, employs many people at fair wages, and he always pays prompt, without waiting to be sued and attached. He was elected to the legislature two years ago, getting a large majority in this county. He made a record that satisfied the people and they again elected him by a large majority. And Mr. Burns while virtually denouncing and condemning the act of the large majority, whines for their sympathy; and while the people of the district have confidence in the honor and integrity of their Justice, whom they elected to enforce the laws, Burns condemns their judgment, classes him as a coward and mercenary, and whimpers for sympathy, because he cannot keep within the bounds of the law. "O, consistency, thou art a jewel!"

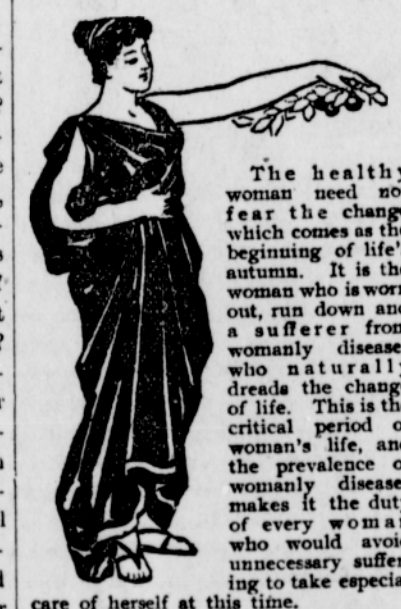
And what has been Mr. Burns' record in this county? Told in a few words:—Law suits, troubles, indebtedness, a succession of failures. He says he brought \$30,000 to the county. \$30,000 invested in legitimate, successful enterprises is a benefit to any county. \$30,000 squandered in a succession of failures is of no permanent benefit to a community, but a detriment to the end.

And now as to that "Long Felt Want." The young man announced when he dropped down among us, that he started his paper to "fill a long felt want." It came so sudden as to almost take our breath, for we didn't know we were laboring under a long felt want around in these woods, as we already had a good county paper. But, judging from its subsequent policy and appearance, it was Burns who was in want—long felt. He wanted to match his literary talents against any one who failed to see a monster in Hume; he wanted to prove to the people that Hume had no rights at Rogue River which he was bound to respect; he wanted an organ that would serve him and cuss Hume; he wanted to cuss the people and force their sympathy. In fact, an ultra anti-Hume mouth piece through which to tout his horn was a long felt want with him—and at last he has secured that long felt want. And we see by this long felt want that Mr. Burns is circulating a petition asking the citizens to petition Judge Hamilton and District Attorney Brown for an injunction, (an unusual proceeding) to enjoin Mr. Hume and others from having him arrested when he violates the law by trespassing on the property of others. Cheeky, to ask the people to invoke the judiciary to grant him a free license to violate the law at will.

And yet, after all these wonderful bursts of literary talent, dealt out in weekly doses through the columns of the Long Felt Want a very large majority of we'uns of the river are inclined to think that if we live to see Hume run out by Burns and his organ, we will live to see a coast railroad, an immense harbor of refuge at Port Orford, and that town the metropolis of the State, with 500,000 inhabitants, and our Justice of the Peace the Mayor of the city.
