At last Admiral Clark is to have his sword. Associated with the great achievement of the battle-ship Oregon, and, indeed, with the battle-ship itself, is the name of the gallant commander who trod her bridge during her famous run around Cape Horn in the Spring of 1893. This tribute to the patriotism, the courage and the ability of Admiral Clark from the people of Oregon is long overdue. It will not, however, be less acceptable to him on that account, but the more acceptable rather, since its late presentation will prove that the feeling that prompted the gift was not a temporary outburst of enthusiasm but a lasting appreciation of the substantial service which the recipient rendered the Nation in a time of great stress, and the honor that he conferred upon the State of Oregon through his command of her namesake battleship in the destruction of Cervera's fleet. The chief mover for this testimonial, Colonel R. W. Mitchell, is deserving of all praise and recognition for the perseverance, tact and good taste with which he has pushed it to success.

The dairy industry is being farther and farther removed each year from the era of the old wooden churn and dasher. The latest advance has been made by adding a course of dairying to the curriculum of the State Agricultural College. Most of us who sprang from the rural districts are still loyal to "butter as mother made it." But, reviewing in memory the store butter of the period immediately preceding the creamery era, we are fain to believe that old fashioned butter making, for commercial purposes, at least, is a lost art. Modern dairying is a science. There is no doubt about it, and to conduct it successfully it is necessary to know how. This process the new course in the State Agricultural College is designed to teach, and it may be hoped that a large class of the farmer boys and girls will avail themselves of the opportunity offered to become familiar with it.—Oregonian.

Brief News Notes.

Herr Krupp, the great gunmaker, died at the age of 90 years.

The Boer Generals Krutzing, Fouché and Joubert have sailed for the United States.

In the past two years Governor Geer has granted 10 full pardons, 16 commutations, eight remissions of fines and 35 restorations to citizenship.

The will of the late President Harrison was filed in probate in San Francisco on Nov. 25. Deceased left an estate in California valued at about \$10,000.

The postmaster-general has issued an order that hereafter a classified woman in the postal service who shall change her name by marriage will not be reappointed.

Edward B. Linnen, chief clerk in the Surveyor-General's office at Salt Lake, has been appointed Special Land agent of the General Land Office for service in Oregon.

Bertha Wilson, aged 4½ years, was burned to death by her clothing accidentally catching fire at the home of her parents, at Canas valley, Douglas county, on Nov. 26.

The noted Bowden mine and Braden mill, situated near Gold Hill, Oregon, with its splendid water power, has been transferred to a corporation capitalized at \$500,000.

In a saloon row at Bonanza, Klamath county, Or. on Nov. 26, Sam Walker struck J. M. Davis a blow on the head with a billiard cue, fracturing his skull, from which it was believed he would die.

The report of the marine hospital service just made public, shows that in India there were, within the past 21 weeks, 127,000 cases of bubonic plague, 100,000 of which proved fatal.

A Grants Pass dispatch says: Steelheads are running in great quantities in Rogue River at the present time. They are being brought into Grants Pass by the wagon load and from 500 1000 pounds of them are shipped from here daily. Fishermen claim that fish are running in Rogue River this year in greater number than known for years.

Professor Asser, the Dutch jurist, who has been arbitrating the claims of American sealers for the seizure of their vessels by the Russian Government, about 10 years ago, has delivered his award in favor of the United States. He appraises the damages in the case of the American schooner C. H. White at \$23,444; in the case of the James Hamilton Lewis at \$28,588; the Kate and Ann at \$10,488, and the Cape Horn Pigeon at \$38,750.

The magnitude of the mail robbery at Chicago on Nov. 22d is just beginning to be realized. Postal inspector James A. Stuart thinks now the amount will probably reach into the hundreds of thousands of dollars. Much of the stuff secured is not negotiable, consisting of stocks and bonds, but the actual cash will amount to at least \$100,000. Up to date no clues have been discovered, and the whole affair seems shrouded in mystery.

Mrs. Julia Dent Grant, widow of the late President Grant, is seriously ill at her residence in Washington, D. C. Although no immediate apprehension is felt for her she is suffering from a heavy cold of two weeks' duration, combined with asthma. Mrs. Sartoris is with her mother, devoting all her care to her. None but the most intimate friends are admitted to see her. Mrs. Grant returned from her Summer home at Coburg, Canada, a month ago, and has for two weeks been in poor health. She is 77 years old.

Vienna, Nov. 29.—Only 500 living out of a total population of 2,500 is the terrible story of death from smallpox on the island of Furni, in the Aegean Sea. The greatest terror prevails and hundreds of dead bodies are unburied, strewn about the shores. Survivors fear to approach the dead, and the stench arising from the decaying remains is awful. An epidemic of smallpox broke out on the island and the natives sought to check it by employing vaccination. Not having the proper virus they extracted pus from the sores of the sick and inoculated the well. The result has been that nearly every patient died.

Herrmann for Senator.

Binger Hermann, ex-congressman and now commissioner of the general land office of the United States, a resident of Roseburg, Douglas county, Oregon, is a candidate for the United States Senate.

This is one of the established facts. It has been an indistinct understanding for many months.

Furthermore, unless his plans change, Commissioner Hermann will come out from Washington soon to attend personally to his interests as a candidate.

It may be, and probably will be, that Mr. Hermann will stand ostensibly as a supporter of C. W. Fulton. He will, so it is understood, remain in that column long enough to demand reward for loyalty, and to be in a position to ask for Fulton support in the event the latter comes to a field of Waterloo.

Mr. Hermann has some support that is for him first, last and all the time. He has friends who believe that no other Oregonian can so brilliantly discharge the duties now devolving upon Joseph Simon.

This increases the list of known candidates to:—Scott, Fulton, Geer, Bourne, Herman.

These are entered in the race, openly. Some others are to run, but they keep their identity dark, like the dark horses that they are.—Portland Telegram.

Philadelphia Ledger:—If anybody was in doubt about John Mitchell's ability to present labor's side of the case to the strike commission when confronted with the able counsel retained by the operators it seems that he may be at ease. It is apparent from the way the labor leader is holding his own when subjected to the most searching questions that he knew his case better than any lawyer could possibly learn it in a short time, and that he can handle it as well as any lawyer. The reports of the hearings show that the interests of labor will not suffer because of lack of ability in their counsel or from an inadequate presentation of their side of the controversy.

New Haven, Conn., Nov. 25.—It was voted at a meeting of the State board of Health in this city tonight that the Surgeon-General of the United States Army be requested to call a convention of State Boards of Health for the purpose of preventing the spread of bubonic plague.

At the international convention of health authorities held in this city two weeks ago it was announced that if five states made a request for such a convention the Surgeon-General would call it. Connecticut is the fifth state and it is believed that a National convention will be called to discuss the methods of preventing a spread of the plague.

The board condemned the manner in which the San Francisco Board of Health has handled the bubonic plague outbreak in that city.

Washington, Nov. 25.—At a special meeting of the cabinet, called this morning to discuss the Panamanian canal situation, Secretary of State Hay announced that he had failed to conclude satisfactory negotiations with Colombia for a right of way for the projected route. It is understood that Mr. Hay favors abandoning the idea of building the waterway over the panama route and taking up the Nicaraguan instead.

Washington, Nov. 26.—Minister Quesada of Cuba called at the White House today and informed the President that he had received a cablegram from the Cuban Government at Havana, informing him that the reciprocity treaty negotiations are proceeding satisfactorily. Minister Quesada also presented a copy of his cablegram to Secretary Hay.

The cabinet meeting today was devoted almost exclusively to the consideration of the status of the reciprocity treaty with Cuba and the canal treaty with Colombia. The hitches that have occurred in the negotiations were discussed as were also the prospects of settlement.

By orders issued October 22, by Commissioner Herman of the General Land Office, approximately 6,000,000 acres of public land in northern California were provisionally withdrawn for the creating of forest reserves.

Drummer's Adventure.

He was pushing cautiously up the hill, though with little expectation of finding game so near town, when his eye suddenly caught sight of a patch of tawny hide, and closer inspection disclosed the unmistakable outline of that terror of the woods—a ferocious panther. With menacing men and glaring eyes, the fierce beast stood motionless, prepared to spring and Mr. Ford could plainly see the nervous, twitching tail, which indicated that he was about to charge.

Finding that he was not followed, Mr. Ford stopped before he got to town and made his way cautiously back toward the spot where he had seen the panther.
