Salem lawyers are working together to have the law that does away with the services of the grand jury repealed. Under this law the District Attorney may file an information, which takes the place of an indictment by a grand jury, and allows the trial to proceed without a grand jury's intervention. The law might possibly be abused by a District Attorney, but it is not likely to be, for it is believed that it has been; if not, it is a good law. It aids the speedy trial of persons accused of crime, and saves considerable cost. Unless there are better reasons for its repeal than now appear, the law ought to stand.

Argentina, one of the most progressive and strongest South American states, is said to be preparing to fight shoulder to shoulder with Venezuela if the red besom of war sweeps the shores of the Caribbean, and Chile, the leading fighting nation on the southern continent, is said to be forming the same heroic resolution. From all the South and Central American capitals come reports of the wildest patriotic outbursts on the part of the populace and there is a well grounded belief that things are rapidly shaping to toward the compact formation of a bellicose alliance of all these Latin American states, with the possible inclusion of Mexico. Such an alliance would be logical enough, and numerically it would not be altogether despicable. The contempt these mercurial governments have excited in the past, on account of their turbulent weakness, is not so well founded in latter-day conditions. Some of them have quite respectable modern navies—notably Chile—and nearly all of them have a large equipment of small arms. The frequently recurring revolutions have taught the Spanish-Americans the use of the Mauser and Springfield, and while their courage and endurance may not be of the highest quality, they are fighting men by practice and temperament. In taking a poke at Venezuela, England and Germany may not have anticipated the contingency of bringing upon their heads the entire swarm from the whole South American hornets' nest.

Coos Bay News.

Wong Jam, an Astoria Chinaman, was married to Lulu Cong, a Chinese maiden of Marshfield, at Coquille City on Wednesday last, Judge Harlocker officiating.

Owing to the fact that six cases of scarlet fever have been reported in town, the Board of Health met yesterday and decided to prohibit the assembly of children's parties or Christmas tree festivals, at either private or public places.

Articles of incorporation have been filed by the Sengstacken Water & Power Co., of Marshfield, with a capital stock of \$10,000. The incorporators are Henry Sengstacken, Agnes R Sengstacken and P. M. Wilber.

The number of miners at Beaver Hill is being constantly increased, and so is the output of coal. The development of the mine is being pushed as rapidly as possible, and everything indicates lively times at Beaver Hill.

The Coquille is to have two new river steamers, to take the places of two of the boats now running between Coquille City and Bandon. The new boats are to be much larger than the old ones, and will have lots of room for freight, as well as good passenger accommodations.

The tug Hunter came down from the Umpqua, Wednesday, bringing two tons of steelheads for the P. C. S. Co. A ton of steelheads were received by the beach route the previous day, and Mr. Mason, agent for the company, who visited the Umpqua last week, reports a big run of steelheads in the river, and is much pleased with the prospect of securing a large quantity of fish from there.

Brief News Notes.

Rear Admiral W. S. Schley is ill, suffering from an acute attack of lumbago.

Peter Neil, an Oregon pioneer of 1844, died at his home near Roseburg, Dec. 22, aged 88 years.

Isaac S. Leonard, a pioneer of Josephine county, died at his home near Waldo, on Dec. 19, aged 76.

The Oregon Congressional delegation have recommended F. A. Bancroft for the appointment of Postmaster at Portland.

A Washington dispatch, dated Dec. 15, says that Major Morton Tower has been appointed Collector of Customs for Coos Bay.

The Edison Hotel at Gazelle, Siskiyou county, Cal., was destroyed by fire on Dec. 17, and Miss Elizabeth Faulk, daughter of the proprietor, perished in the flames.

The department of the interior has sent to the House the draft of a bill providing for the sale of timber on forest reserves and for the rental of timber lands with forest reserves.

It is stated by officers arriving at San Francisco on the transport Thomas that the provinces of Cavite, Batangas and Taysbas, in the Philippines, are to be placed under military control because of the difficulties of the civil government with Ladrones.

Wm. Hallop, a late arrival at Coos bay, was accidentally killed at Hiram King's Daniel's creek logging camp on Wednesday, last. A log on which he was standing was struck by another log, which caused him to fall, and the log rolled over him, killing him instantly.

The transport Thomas brings news of a new cholera outbreak in Manila. When the Thomas left there, 30 cases of cholera were being reported daily. Army surgeons arriving on the Thomas say the disease is raging unchecked in the southern provinces. In Ilo Ilo the death rate is very heavy and the authorities seem powerless to check the epidemic.

During a fire in a lodging house on Post street, San Francisco, last week, George Stump and wife jumped from the third story, alighting on a shed, and from thence to the ground. Mr. Stump escaped with a few bruises, but Mrs. Stump had her arm broken, and was otherwise badly bruised. They were formerly of Marshfield, and Mrs. Stump is a daughter of W. A. Luse, of Coos river.

Washington, Dec. 10.—The feature of the House proceedings today was a thoughtful speech by the venerable Galusha A. Grow, of Pennsylvania, on the relations between labor and capital. At the end of the present session he retires, at the age of 79, after a career in public life extending over half a century. His first speech in the House was on "Man's Right to the Soil." He was the author of the free homestead act. His speech today was regarded as his valedictory to public life, and was listened to with close attention by his colleagues.

In concluding his speech Mr. Grow said: "A labor strike is an unequal contest at best. It is a contest between endurance between hunger and thirst of the human stomach and the income of capital. Capital in such contests loses none of its accumulation of wealth, unless an industry itself should be destroyed; and in such cases labor would be the greatest sufferer. Some method of profit-sharing between employers and employees that would secure a harmonious co-operation of both, so as to prevent strikes and improve the condition of labor, is of vital importance to the general welfare, for the pillars of the Republic rest upon the comfort of the home and the happiness of the fire-side of labor."

Marconi has succeeded in transmitting wireless messages across the Atlantic ocean, and is properly the recipient of renewed congratulations. How valuable, in actual, practical affairs, Marconi's discoveries and experiments may be cannot as yet be accurately determined, but his system will no doubt work considerable of a revolution in the methods of transmitting messages.
