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Andre Alive in the North

Slooflpa, Alaska, April 1.—A report of the most astonishing character has just reached this place. Many of the details are even startling, and when known to the civilized world will prove how far astray have been the opinions of the most erudite regarding Andre and his attempt to gain the mysterious regions of the North Pole and its open seas by means of aerial navigation in his mammoth airship. It will be considered marvellous, by practically the entire thinking world, how this bold Norwegian was able to survive hardships such as human beings have seldom, if ever, been called upon to endure. In the frigid regions of the midnight sun he contrived to live in spite of incomparable obstacles. Lived on, after his companions had miserably perished. Driven over surging oceans by blasting tempests, wrecked on barren shores where no man ever lived. So desolate were they in their bleakness that even the animals God created to inhabit the most northern snowbound climes were never seen. But Andre is alive if his own words can be believed, for with rotten walrus blubber as ink and the flashes of the aurora borealis for light he penned a message to a world who believed him dead. Thousands of miles have been traveled in bringing this letter from the pole, and many were the perils encountered in its transmission. Two months ago there arrived at Demarkation Point near the mouth of the Mackenzie River a whaler. Twenty rugged men comprised the crew under command of Captain Windquist. At Demarkation Point there is a trading post and off the shore the vessel lay at anchor nearly a week. Captain Windquist declared he had sailed from St. Johns, Newfoundland, two years ago and had made the long sought North-west passage. He also said he had for a few months been whaling north of Prince Patrick Island and before then about Cape Columbia, Grinnell Land, or one of the most northern points so far known to geographers. Captain Windquist further informed the traders at Demarkation that he had found a clear sea eight degrees north of Cape Columbia and had taken six large whales in that far northern latitude. He showed his log book and there was recorded the fact of his having been in 87 degrees north latitude, or within 3 degrees of the North Pole. He related the startling news without ostentation and went further by saying he sighted land far to the north and would have continued his journey had not his crew become filled with superstitious fear, owing to the increasing heat as the ship sailed northward. He said the members of his crew grew frantic with terror when viewing the sublime pranks of the aurora borealis. Using Captain Windquist's own words: "So strange a sight no man ever witnessed. To the zenith of the heavens the strange scintillating flames would shoot. They seemed to come from a point scarcely 50 miles from where we lay in the calm water. The magnificent glow was accompanied by a temperature equal to that of the Tropic of Capricorn. There was ever present in the air a vaporizing essence and at times it resembled a mild shock of galvanic battery. Personally, I was wrought to a fever heat in my desire to explore the great mystery lying just before me, but my men rebelled; they mutinied, in fact, and threatened to tie me to the anchor chain, did I not turn back.

Overcome by my duty to my crew and ship I reluctantly veered to the south the evening of August 14, 1902. At daybreak August 15 we spoke a small island lying in 86 degrees north and saw with astonishment several natives on the shore, wearing naught else but breech cloths, signaling our vessel. "I manned a dory and went ashore. I at once observed that the people were of the North American Indian type, only of a more yellow complexion. They had huts built of tree bark and running here and there were several naked little children. I saw no women during the three hours I remained on the island. I was not allowed to go inland, where I learned the principal habitations were located, but in other respects I was treated courteously. One tall and sprightly native made me understand by signs that he had sent a messenger for something he wished me to see. My four men and I waited nearly two hours for the return of the messenger and at the expiration of that time he appeared running swiftly in our direction. When he came up to us he handed me a folded brown paper, such as grocers' sacks are made of, and by motions bade me inspect it. "My surprise was unbounded as I read the few words scrawled upon the soiled paper. This is what I read: "People probably think me dead, but I am alive and can say happy to the hardships experienced since I undertook to find the North Pole by aerial navigation cannot be told in words. I am minus one foot and one arm (both frozen at Milne Bay.) Can only say now that white companions are all dead except two Norwegians—Borgson and Lundberg—who were wrecked with me June, 1900, near Tumio Island, 86 degrees north. They were members of the crew of the bark Novjogson, on which I had also shipped. Vessel and all lost. Beautiful land here, with 5,000 inhabitants. Warm all the year as summer. This is due to electric heat. Will send this by native fishing craft to Alouja Island. I will return to civilization as soon as we complete our three-mast schooner, which will be early in 1903, and then I will explain some things that have been mysteries to scientists since the world has stood. ANDRE. "I took the remarkable piece of information," continued Captain Windquist, "and left Alouja Island and with a hold filled with whale ergo I put into this place—Demarkation Point." When Captain Windquist had finished his remarkable story and exhibited Andre's message he was prevailed upon to allow it to be taken into the United States. It was only after J. A. Kelson, agent of the Hudson Bay Company, had assured him a handsome recompense and the valuable message's safe arrival into civilization did Captain Windquist release it. The document was at once transmitted to Fort McPherson and from there to Circle City, thence to Slooflpa, the first telegraphic station to be reached from Northern Alaska. Today the great news reaches the whole civilized world.
