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He Cuts Steel.

An Oregon toolmaker has rediscovered the lost art of tempering steel, and yesterday astonished many beholders by the feats he performed in his shop in the Suburban Coal & Ice Company's yard at Fourth and Everett streets. His name is B. J. Casterline, and he has just removed here from Corvallis, where he has been working for some time to perfect his secret process.

By what means Mr. Casterline gives steel the wonderful hardness and toughness which makes his tools rival the famous Damascus blade with which Saladin cut in two a feather cushion he had tossed in the air, he alone knows, and he will not tell. When an Oregonian reporter called at his shop yesterday afternoon he put three razors in an ordinary forge, brought them to a red heat, then opened a box standing beside him, in which was a small tank full of liquid, and dashed them into it. After again heating them, he dipped them in water, then ground them, honed them on an oilstone, and shaved some hair off his wrist with them. One blade was so thin at the edge that the heat curled it up like a shaving, and he ground it down by holding the edge at right angles to the grindstone. An ordinary blade treated thus would have flown to pieces, but he brought this to an even edge, then ground it and honed it.

Then he showed what can be done with steel tempered by his process. He has made a drawing knife and, fastening a 10 penny steel spike in a vice, with this tool he took a shaving off it. He handled the knife to the reporter, who felt the edge and found that it had not been turned in the slightest degree; in fact, it was impossible to tell with which part of the blade the shaving had been made. To further prove that the edge was not affected, he took the same knife and, without having sharpened it, shaved some hair off his arm with the greatest ease. All over his arms and the backs of his hands are bare spots which he has shaved in testing his tools.

Then he took a pocketknife having a blade tempered by himself and cut a shaving from the nail with it. He drew it three times across the nail, with the edge at right angles, making a distinct cut each time, and immediately shaved a little bunch of hair from his arm or hand with the same blade. He repeated this test four times, making in all 13 notches in the nail, but the knife shaved his hand as easily the last as the first time.

He had an ax which was taken to him with the edge clipped all the way along, so that it would hardly cut mud. He has tempered it so that it cuts steel and is still a better ax than it ever was before he tempered it. He took a bar of tool steel, secured it in the vice and then brought down the edge of the ax upon it with all the power of both his brawny arms. He made a cut in the steel at least a sixteenth of an inch deep. The reporter felt the edge of the ax, and it had not been turned in the slightest degree. It is safe to say that he could go on chopping that steel bar with that ax until it was cut through, and the ax would still split wood better than any ax that was ever made.

Having seen these things, the reporter incredulity was disarmed when he was told that Mr. Casterline had made a cold chisel with which he could cut a saw to pieces, and that he could make a bit which

would bore a hole through a saw. He showed a set of horsehoes' nippers which was brought to him with the edges all clipped and jagged, but he has put such a fine edge on them that the same pair can be used for cutting nails or hoofs. He showed a letter from the Benton County Flouring Mills of Corvallis testifying to the good work he had done in tempering sack needles. He said that at this mill 11 needles had been broken in one week in sewing flour sacks, but one needle which he had tempered had been in use for nearly two months and was as good as ever.

He now undertakes to temper any kind of steel tools, but will not stop at that. He will undertake to make such springs that they will never break, and will next apply his discovery to armor-plate. He proposes to apply it to a small piece of armor-plate and endeavor to render it impervious to shot and shell. If successful, and he has no doubt, after the success he has had with other things, he will try it on a larger scale.

There is only one secret in the process, and that is in the chemical in which he dips the steel after bringing it to a red heat. After that is done, he again puts the steel in the fire and draws it to the hardness required for different kinds of work. There are three of these degrees of hardness, of which he judges by the color of the heat-d metal. For this purpose a good light is needed, in order that he may judge accurately of color.

In what manner Mr. Casterline will apply his invention he has not yet determined, but he will give a demonstration of his power at 2:30 P. M. every day this week at the shop at Fourth and Everett streets, and has invited every man interested in the subject to go and see for himself. He has not patented his invention and may not do so, for, if the secret were once known, the patent would be so easily infringed as to be valueless.—Oregonian.
