This company certainly deserves success as they are ditching and fluming at an enormous expense. S. P. Pierce is superintending the work of constructing the lofty trestle, and the work that has been done shows that Story understands his business.

Post Master Johnston is now installed in his new quarters, and carpenter Lindberg is putting the finishing touches on the new office which is arranged in "apple pie" order, and is a great improvement over Uncle Sam's old place of doing business.

We last week received a pleasant visit from M. G. Pohl of Myrtle Point and Shad Hudson. Mr. Pohl is a member of the Commuter Mining Company of Seattle who are developing a deposit of galena and sulphuret of iron, on the South Fork of Sixes River. The ore assays from \$8.00 to \$80.00 per ton.

A. P. Haegensen, has been engaged for the past month, in putting in new machinery and otherwise refitting the P. F. & L. Company's mills. Mr. Haegensen and Peter Anderson came in from the mill's Sunday, and Monday commenced work on Port Point, where a crew of men have been at work for the past two weeks constructing the apparatus for loading vessels by means of a wire cable.

Harry and Tom Guerin, with a friend, were in the woods in the vicinity of Eckley, a few days ago, when they caught sight of a small bear. The bear started to run and the men ran after it making plenty of noise as they went. The bear soon ran up a tree and then his troubles commenced. ## Big Jewel Mine.

Work on this mining property is progressing well, and if Supt. C. A. Jamieson has good luck he will have the water ready to turn on this fall. This company has secured 1500 inches of water and will operate a No. 4 and a No. 1 Giant, and these with the head will enable them to move about 4000 cubic yards of dirt per day.

The greater part of the ditch is graded and about one half of it dug. Work on the trestles has progressed in fine shape under the direction of S. P. Pierce, who has an able corps of assistants and the largest half of the trestles are completed. The highest trestle will be finished this week, and is a fine specimen of engineering skill. It is 400 feet long and 126 feet high and is built on a curve. People are daily visiting the mine to look at this large trestle. One has to see this for himself, as figures give no idea of its height. The timber is of the best and it is well braced and bolted together.

The company will install an electric light plant in its diggings and run day and night, working two crews. With this amount and pressure of water, for they will have plenty of water to run the "Giants" seven months out of the year, and the dirt paying all the way through as it prospects, the company will have a big thing.

Supt. Jamieson expects to take out enough gold this winter to pay for the ditch and plant and still pay a dividend as well.

The property consists of a high gravel bar over 100 acres in extent, comprising three old river beds of the Sixes River. This gravel bar is 90 feet high in places and carries a good prospect in all places. The mine has a good dump near at hand that it will take years to fill.

Taking matters all in all everything points to a big success in this undertaking, and we trust their hopes and expectations may be realized.

The company has spent thousands of dollars and it will still take thousands to complete the work, but the prospects are most flattering and the promoters are almost sure of large dividends right from the start. That this may prove true is the earnest wish of all as there are other mines in Curry County only waiting for money to develop them. While on our visit to the mine the other day we were entertained by "mine host" Supt. C. A. Jamieson at his office building, and with others enjoyed a most pleasant trip and were shown over the works and everything fully explained, much to our enlightenment and interest.

## Railroad to Chetco.

Grant's Pass, Or., June 23.—According to the recent statement of Colonel T. Wain Morgan Draper, the rich redwood and other resourceful region of Humboldt County, California, will be first reached from the Oregon side, and the riches of that region turned first toward Portland, instead of San Francisco.

"The road from the north will be the first to reach Eureka, and Humboldt Bay," Colonel Draper said recently, when speaking of the proposed Oregon & Pacific line, of which he is the chief engineer. "A great many people think it is a difficult engineering feat to build a railroad from Crescent City to Eureka, but there are not half so many obstacles to overcome as between Eureka and San Francisco. Surveys have been made from Grant's Pass to Crescent City, and preliminaries are being made between Crescent City and Coos Bay, and between Crescent City and Eureka. The route between Crescent City and Eureka will be a most difficult piece of work, the greatest grade being between the head of Mill Creek, a tributary of Smith River, and the head of Hunter and Wilson Creeks.

"We are also surveying a route to Chetco, Curry County, Oregon," Colonel Draper continued, "and investigating the feasibility of that place as a harbor. There is plenty of deep water there. Crescent City has also received my attention. Government estimates for this will cost \$250,000 to blast out the rocks in the harbor, and \$1,000,000 to build jetties, but I am confident the work can be done for less money than that. Fifty miles of the survey from Grant's Pass to Crescent City have been definitely decided upon, and some construction work will be done this Summer, though not very much."

Colonel Draper admitted that the Oregon & Pacific is a connecting link in a new Coast route, backed by some of the big lines, but he refused to divulge just what company is behind it.—Telegram.

### A Joy of Journalism.

A few days ago Colonel Alexander K. McClure, the veteran editor and Nestor of the Philadelphia Press, said that the happiest days of his journalistic career were those in which he was "the editor of a country weekly newspaper in Western Pennsylvania."

There are thousands of the older men in the profession today who can heartily say "amen" to Colonel McClure's experience. They remember those joyous old days in some ramshackle print shop in a country town; the old Washington press; the roller boy; the roller mold and the casting of a new roller; the sitting up at night to mail the edition of 600—that 600 more formidable over public affairs and world interests than the charge made at Balaklava by that other 600 of old England! The country editor—who is his peer? He writes and the people hardly contain their patience a week to know "what he has wrote" on the burning issues of the day! He gets invitations to all functions, free passes to all shows, appointed on all sorts of committees where there is no pay, gets cake from the wedding, cordwood for subscriptions and occasionally, "gets it in the neck" from a contemporary.

The country press is an inseparable factor from the forces that make up our civilization. It is on and of the soil. It is the mirror of the human problems of its environment. It is more nearly the organ of public opinion than the mammoth journals whose strongest purposes are commercial.

Any historian who would write knowingly and truthfully the history of these times must get the bulk of his material from the country newspapers. They are the busy bees who gather the pollen of all the indigenous blossoms of their habitat and compress these into the columns from which the honey of true human history is extracted. Every community owes the prime duty of support to its local press. If a man can afford to take only one paper he should take his home paper. If he can go further and take a daily, let that be but the supplement to his country paper. The old Greek adage, "know thyself," should be expanded into "know thy neighbors," and the way to do that is to support your home paper. There is no better or more helpful asset to any country than a good newspaper, filled with neighborhood news, and dealings with all issues of common interest as the weekly press usually does—fairly and honestly.—Atlanta Constitution.
