The thorough-bred stallion Joe Kay, owned by Isam Walker, was killed recently while being roped in a corral. The horse fell in such a way that its neck was broken.

We are informed that Jesse Turner has sold his valuable stallion to David McKenzie. This horse is well bred, and speedy, and easily defeated its opponent last Saturday July 4th.

The editor and part of the TRIBUNE force were away celebrating the Fourth and have hardly got "pulled together" yet, and we are therefore a little shy on local news this week.

Jesse Turner and little son Ace, left town this morning with a drove of 51 head of calves which Mr. Turner purchased from the McKenzie dairy ranch on Elk River. He will drive them to Rogue River.

The editor, of this paper, and wife, spent July 4th, at Wedderburn, and, as business matters detained them until the 7th, the editorial chair in this office was filled by Hon. Frank Stewart, for a couple of days.

The people who attended the celebration at Wedderburn raised for the unfortunate George Cook, by subscription and otherwise over three hundred dollars, thus showing that patriotism and generous hearts dwell together.

Never have the ranges, the gardens, and the crops, looked so well in Curry County, as they do right now. Many of the stock ranges between here and Rogue river could be profitably mown for hay, so rank is the grass.

The body of the unfortunate George Cook, is now on the way to Port Orford, overland. It will arrive here, by team, tomorrow. The steamer Chico, now in the Coquille, will call in here tomorrow to receive the body, which is being shipped to his sister in Los Angeles. George was a member of the Wedderburn camp of W. O. W. in good standing, and carried an insurance of \$3000 in favor of his sister.

Hugh Emmel, whom people will remember as a handsome little boy who once resided at Jo Nay's in the '80s, arrived on last Arcata accompanied by Fred Seiberger, and Marion Crow, all of Oakland, Calif. and bound on an outing in the mountains in the vicinity of Salial Springs or any other place, where "cats" cougars, bear, or other ferocious "Big Game," are supposed to abound. As they were all well-armed and young, and tall and trim and evidently in good condition for "sprinting," and eager for any kind of a run in the wilds, no fear for their safety is apprehended, and while the odor of fat venison, anticipated, already permeates ye scribes sautem, we wish the young hunters a glorious time, appetites like starved wolves, muscles like steel, and sun-tanned cheeks like blooms of health, the envy and admiration of the pale-faced lassies who must somewhere pine for the return of their embrowned and embattled heroes' laden with trophies of valor, and camp-fire yarns to raise the hair of the listener, and cheer their descendants even to the generations that are yet to be.

July 5, 1903.

Our little town began filling up Friday morning, July 3, and by mid-day on Saturday a large assembly had collected at the usual picnic grounds where we were favored with an eloquent and most fitting address by R. C. Lee. Other exercises were music by the Cornet Band and by the choir, declamation by Miss Jennie Bossen and an interesting flag drill by the children. After refreshments, ball playing and other amusements followed, and the day was closed with a large attended dance at the band hall.

They cackled so loud that the horse ran away, And that is the way we prepared for the day.

We regret to note that Mr. John Fitzhugh has been lying dangerously ill at the Pioneer Hotel for several days. His condition does not materially improve. Since writing the above we have learned that Mr. Fitzhugh passed away this morning (Monday, June 6) at 4 o'clock.

John Fitzhugh is Dead.

After some weeks of sickness John Fitzhugh died at Floras Creek on the morning of July 6th, and was buried on the 7th by the side of his father and mother at the Willow Creek burying ground.

I have not the facts at hand for a proper sketch of this remarkable man, nor could I, in the limited time at my disposal, do justice if I had them.

He was the most versatile man I ever knew—the very brightest man I ever walked with—arm and arm under the sunshine and clouds along life's way.

In him flashed more different lights of genius than in any man I ever met. With a heart tender as the gentlest woman's there burned the valor of a medieval knight. His wit was boundless as his knowledge, and he was the best story teller I ever knew, not excepting Nesmith, Gazley or Siglin. In music, in literature, in art, in the sciences he seemed as proficient as in mathematics—and he was the best mathematician I ever knew. He seemed a consummate master of all knowledge, all science, all mechanics; and had his lines fallen in places congenial to such universal gifts, he would easily have been one of the very greatest men of the world. Of all the men I ever met I consider him the most learned, and I have often said to him that it was impossible for him to have acquired so much by study—that he got it by absorption, by the inspiration of genius!

Like many a genius he was his "own worst enemy," but faults are what make a man different from an angel. A cloud passed over his early manhood from which he never fully emerged; but under it all and through it all honor was ever at his side guiding his way until the "Lights Were Out."

The Fourth at Wedderburn.

A large crowd assembled at Wedderburn including people from Smith river California to Elk river in Oregon; but the lamentable accident with the cannon described elsewhere in the TRIBUNE, threw a damper on the exercises from which the people could not free themselves, and which would have defeated any attempt to celebrate at all, had it not been for the repeated requests of George Cook, the fatally mangled victim of this accident, that the people proceed with the celebration and carry out the program, in which he was the moving spirit, and so greatly was he missed that it seemed impossible to get any one to properly conduct the exercises.

After the choir had sang America, Frank B. Tichenor was introduced and made an interesting address referring briefly to pioneer incidents, of Curry county, and prophesying as to its auspicious future, closing with an eloquent tribute to the order of the Woodmen.

The Declaration of Independence was then read, by Mr. O'Neil, in a manner seldom equaled, eliciting much applause.

Then followed the Oration by Robert Burns, the young lawyer at Gold Beach, which, for an off hand Oration would have done credit to any Orator, for its good sense, broad thought and illustration, and fervent patriotism. Mr. Burns is a young man of pleasing address, a fine scholar, and evidently "every inch a gentleman." He was congratulated by everybody on his splendid effort, and the good impression he made will, we trust, result in fixing his habitation permanently in Curry county. There being no tables on the grounds the people resolved themselves into numerous picnic groups on the green grass, and seemed to have a most enjoyable time.

The afternoon was spent in carrying out the following program to wit: Boys race under 6 years won by Pat Turner. Boys race under 8 years won by Sidney Walker. Boys race under 12 years won by Harry Gauntlett. Boys race under 14 years won by Harry Gauntlett. Boys race under 16 years won by Blaine Coy. Girls race under 8 years won by Reta Strahan. Girls race under 12 years won by Amelia Melville. Girls race under 13 years won by Nora Trueman. Young Ladies race won by Violet White. Young Men's race won by Harvey Cook. Married mens race won by Delmer Colegrove. Men over 70 won by N. D. Clark. Married Women's race won by Edna Tompkins.

The free for all horse race was won by Hardy Stewart's beautiful mare Winona. A match race, for 150 dollars, one fourth mile and repeat between Jesse Turner's stallion, and the "Cook" horse, was won by Turner, after losing the first heat, and various accidents.

It was sun down when the crowd began to scatter, and but for the wind, and the fatal accident of the morning, the day would have been one of enjoyment as good nature, and good conduct marked the day.

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A Sail Accident.

One of the saddest accidents that will mark the Fourth of July just past, occurred at Wedderburn, whereby George Cook was frightfully and fatally mangled and passing away at 4 p. m., of the next day.

With patriotic ardor, he and some other young men—all inexperienced—were firing the cannon, which they had successfully done for two shots. The cannon is an old iron one belonging to R. D. Hume, and has been exposed to the weather for many years, having, no doubt rust spots of every conceivable nature to hold fire. It is claimed that, after the second shot, the cannon was not properly swabbed, that they tilted the cannon up and poured the powder down the muzzle, when George Cook put in wadding, and started to ram it down, when it went off, blowing the rammer into splinters, many of which entered Mr. Cook's throat, face and arms, literally stripping the flesh from portions, in a manner too horrible to be described.

Fortunately Dr. La Shier was passing near, and everything possible to be done was skillfully done at once, to restore him to consciousness and to relieve him from pain when restored. He revived in about 20 minutes, and thereafter was conscious up to the time of his death, except when under the influence of anesthetics. Dr. Caldwell was called by telephone from Port Orford, but nothing that skill, and loving hands could do, could stay the inevitable.

Mr. Cook was a young man of exemplary habits, refined, generous and strikingly handsome. His parents and brothers and sisters reside near Los Angeles. To them our people extend their heartfelt sympathy, and the consolation that a generous people who loved their noble son and brother, did all that loving hands could have done to soothe his dying hours.

The Fourth at Hubbard's Creek.

Editor Tribune:—The Fourth was duly observed by the people of Upper Hubbard's Creek. Most of the young people either attended the celebration at Dairyville, or spent the day at Port Orford. All those who remained gathered at their favorite resort, on the North Fork, and enjoyed a "way up" time. An American Flag, 4x8 in size, was flung to the breeze amid the barking of dogs, squealing of pigs and whoops of the multitude. The exercises were opened with music by the entire band. The orator of the day having failed to arrive, an interesting discourse in Greek, by Miss Alta Sutton, was listened to with great attention. The reading, by the ex-editor, commanded the undivided attention of the reader. More music by the band. Song, by Miss Anna Laura, was well received. Then followed a magnificent picnic dinner, of Rogue River Salmon, new potatoes and green peas, which proved to be the most enjoyable fast of the day's entertainment.

The after dinner exercises consisted of, Little girls stick horse race, won by Anna Laura. Three-legged race, won by Sutton Sr; peapicking contest, free for all, won by Mrs. Sutton, in this contest there was but one entry; race through potato patch, between trained dog and five pigs, won by the latter. The sack race for boys was omitted, there being no boys for the sacks. The pea nut stand, kept by a former Port Orford lady, was well patronized, and supplied the multitude with an abundance of candy, nuts, oranges, fire-crackers and lemonade. Receipts for the day not reported.

Owing to the non-arrival of the musicians the grand ball in the evening did not occur.
