Official Neglect.

In answer to recent inquiries from interested parties in Port Orford, the authorities at the Roseburg Land Office have made known the fact that, some time ago, it was decided that County Clerk's cannot appoint deputies for the purpose of transacting land business. This has been the practice in Curry, and, no doubt, in many other counties in the state. Clerk Smith, of this county, appointed a deputy in Port Orford several months ago, there being no land commissioner here, for the convenience of persons in this vicinity who wanted to file on timber claims. A number of people took advantage of this opportunity and filed before the deputy clerk, and now, through their own efforts and at their own expense they have discovered that the whole proceeding was illegal. This has caused no end of trouble and annoyance for good, honest citizens who filed in good faith, while those in a position to know never gave a hint that all was not well.

From our own personal observation we know of several parties who came here from Los Angeles, Cal., weeks ago and filed on timber claims before a deputy. Some of them have remained here for weeks on expense, waiting for the time of making final proof, while others have gone back expecting to return here to make final proof. Now it becomes necessary for these people to file over again, and their time and expense, so far, has been for nothing. Why didn't the authorities at the Roseburg Land Office notify the county clerks throughout the district that they could not legally appoint deputies for the transaction of such business? Timber land entries in Oregon are getting mixed up in all kinds of ways and causing considerable notoriety for the state. Where fraud has been attempted it is perfectly right and proper that such applications should be "held up" and investigated; but it seems a pity that people with honest intentions should lose months of their time, saying nothing of the expense and inconvenience, on account of the neglect of the Land Office officials to give the necessary notice to the county clerks at the proper time.

It may be well to add in conclusion that the first intimation received here that the appointing of deputy clerks for the transaction of such business is illegal, was from an article in a California paper.

New York, July 15.—Sir Thomas Lipton's request for the use of some of Uncle Sam's expert sailmakers to assist Ratsey, the English sailmaker, in cutting new sails for the Shamrock III, has been granted by the Navy Department. Six men have been picked from the force at the sail loft at the Brooklyn Navy Yard, and, generously cheered by their fellow workmen, who were all eager to share in the work, they at once left for City Island, where Ratsey's shops are located. They have been granted unlimited fuel, and, an unusual concession, have been allowed by the Sailmakers' Union to work with the non-union English sailmaker.

New York, July 14.—Mrs. Mary J. Pierce, said to have been one of the smallest women in the world, is dead at her home in Bayonne, N. J. She was 31 inches tall, weighed 50 pounds and was 40 years of age. The recent hot weather caused fatal illness.
