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Hawaii Wants Freedom.

Honolulu, July 28.—At today's session of the Home Rule Convention, ex-Delegate Wilcox urged that Congress be memorialized to grant Hawaiian independence. He also strongly favored the establishment of a government for the islands similar to that of Cuba. His remarks were received with much applause. It is probable that a petition embodying the views expressed by Wilcox will be prepared for presentation to Congress by Delegate Kahanamoku. Such an appeal would doubtless receive the signatures of many natives.

The platform adopted by the party denounces the administration of Governor Dole as oligarchical, the charge being made that Governor Dole and a selected clique control the affairs of the territory in a selfish and wasteful manner, the administration is charged with being corrupt, and that favoritism is rampant to such a degree as to be intolerable to the citizens of the islands.

The platform disclaims that racial differences have any place in the issues before the convention.

It has been decided that the time is not ripe for the presentation to the National Congress of a memorial praying for an independent form of government similar to that enjoyed by Cuba.

A Big Timber Deal.

The Bulletin says that E. H. Harriman and James J. Hill are uniting in a great timber deal, whereby they, with a number of associates, will control the lumber market of the world. They are securing large tracts of forest land in Northern California and Oregon, through their agents, who have been for some time quietly buying property on the coast. Among the associates of the two railroad magnates are Frederick Weyerhaeuser, of Minneapolis; T. B. Walker, of Minneapolis; Jacob Blodgett, of Grand Rapids, and a number of other members in the various timber sections of the western states.

E. W. Eberlin, of New York, has been in Portland for several months. He is Harriman's agent in that state, and has made frequent trips to the northern part of the state, where he has been buying up available timber lands. Eberlin has also been working toward securing options on timber land held by various eastern people who purchased it since the boom in California timber began about three years ago.

With the many minor holdings which Harriman and his associates may count on, it is said that the plan is to merge the more valuable lands controlled by the Hill roads and the Southern Pacific into a trust. The Southern Pacific's principal holdings are represented in the grant of ten miles on each side of its road, lying between the southern boundary line of Oregon and a point south of Portland, and consist of about 1,000,000 acres of fir and sugar pine. In his plan to place these lands in a pool, Harriman does so conditionally, with provisions for the protection of the company's creditors, to whom all the lands of the company are pledged in security for its indebtedness.

With the lands of the Hill and the Harriman roads and those of Walker, Weyerhaeuser and others in Washington, Oregon, Idaho and California under control, Harriman and his associates would be in a position to control the lumber market of the world.—Oregon Observer.

A Decision Adverse to Mineral Thieves.

The decision of the United States Supreme Court in the famous Scripps case set at rest the vexatious question as to whether a holder of lieu land scrip or claimant under the agricultural land location law has a right to attempt to dispose of a locator on mineral land, by taking up such land as agricultural, on the pretense that it is more valuable for agricultural purposes than as mineral land. The court of final resort holds, in effect, that a miner who has located on any portion of the public domain has a prior right to the land claimed and should have ample time to prove whether it is mineral land or not; and that any public land, whether characterized as mineral or agricultural in the records of the land office surveys, if claimed by and in possession of a miner or prospector is not open to settlement by an agricultural locator. The cases referred to grew out of an attempt on the part of holders of forest reserve scrip to dispose of oil land locators in Kern County, California, by filing agricultural claims to land which was then being prospected for mineral oil, and which has since been found to be valuable mineral land in the strictest sense. The decision is a victory for the miners and prospectors and can work an injury only to unscrupulous mineral land thieves who have retarded the opening up of valuable mining property by fraudulent filing on it as agricultural land. Thousands of acres of mineral land is held in the mineral regions of the Pacific coast, particularly California.—Mining and Engineering Review.

He Slept on Ground.

Oyster Bay, July 26.—Lying on the bare ground, wrapped in blankets, President Roosevelt and his sons and nephews passed last night on the sandy shores of Huntington Bay. The President makes an annual custom of camping out with his boys.

Late yesterday afternoon the President and his little party left Sagamore Hill in two boats for Lloyd's Neck, the sandy promontory on Huntington Bay, which had been selected for the night's camp. He occupied one boat with his son Archie and his nephew Nicholas Roosevelt, and his son Kermit and nephews Philip and Oliver Roosevelt occupied the other. The President and Kermit handled the oars. As the distance to Lloyd's Neck is about ten miles, it took them two hours to row it. After breakfast to-day the party returned to Sagamore Hill.

Soon after his return the President received a call from former Senator Washburn, of Minnesota. They discussed the financial situation, Senator Washburn expressing the opinion that the present flurry in New York is not so serious as it appears on the surface to be, and that it does not affect the country's general prosperity in the least.

Mother Jones and four members of her "army" today had an interview with Secretary Barnes in an endeavor to arrange a conference with the President, but they were told the President could not be seen. Mrs. Jones agreed to write to the President what she desired him to know and to do regarding the textile workers in Philadelphia.

Oregonian: President Roosevelt's refusal to permit a soldier of the marine corps to leave the service in advance of the expiration of his term of enlistment in order that he might accept a much better-paying position in civil life is based on sound public policy. Naturally, a soldier feels that \$13 a month is small pay when a position paying \$1200 a year is offered to him. But his contract with the government for a term of years is binding, and necessarily so, hence his desire to better his condition financially must wait. While such cases would be of very frequent occurrence, the President is justified in holding that to grant the request in this instance might establish a dangerous precedent. The administrative policy that holds a man strictly to his duty is not open to criticism, since it proclaims a Government that is, first of all, reliable.
