Grant's Pass, Or., Aug. 11.—The surveying crew that has been at work making a preliminary survey of a coast route from Crescent City, Cal., to Coos Bay for the Oregon & Pacific Railroad Company, has been withdrawn from the field by the company and ordered back to San Francisco. The crew had surveyed north nearly as far as Gold Beach, at the mouth of Rogue River. The other crew surveying south from Crescent City toward Humboldt Bay is still at work, and will be kept in the field till the survey is completed to Eureka.

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CHAOTIC PENAL SYSTEM.

Ten-Day Prisoners Are Frequently Mixed with the Condemned in Delaware.

The whole penal system of Delaware is in more or less chaotic condition, and this, as well as the pillory and whipping post, may be attributed to lack of public thought or study along corrective and charitable lines, says Theodore Dreiser in *Absolve's*. The state jails have the qualities of old-time colony prisons. There is no penitentiary. There is no system of prison labor. There is no reform school. For important crimes the county jail at New Castle is much because it is the nearest and much the strongest, for the most trivial offenses the same prison is made to serve. Prisoners with ten-day sentences are mixed with those awaiting execution and those who have a lifetime to serve. Young and old, boys and gray-haired men, negroes and white, all are jumbled together, and the discrimination made is one which lacks import. It is that the short-term prisoners are allowed to do the small labor, such as cleaning, cooking, coal-carrying, rock-bedding and the like in the open court or jail-yard, where stands the pillory, while the long-term convicts are not allowed to do anything at all. This is considered a fairly satisfactory arrangement, although a more modern workhouse is sometimes talked of.

STRANGE WOOLING OF LUCK.

Italians Make Growsome Selections of Numbers in the National Lottery.

Ever since the assassination of King Humbert hundreds of Italians have been trying to win prizes in the national lottery by playing those numbers which correspond with his age, says a London paper. These numbers are 56, 10 and 49, the king having lived for 56 years, 10 hours and 49 minutes. If these three numbers should win the player would receive 4,250 times the amount of his stake. Some unusually optimistic gamblers have tried to win even more than this by playing a fourth number (73), which is the symbol of a regicide. If this combination, 56, 10, 49 and 73, were to win the government would have to pay 60,000 times the amount of the stake. The last drawing was held in Milan a few days ago, and, singularly enough, the winning numbers were 56, 10, 48 and 72. These came pretty close to the mark, and as a result Italian gamblers are more determined than ever to keep on playing their favorite combination until it brings them good fortune.

AN EXPENSIVE CITY.

What It Costs to Support the Municipal Government of New York for a Single Year.

New York is the most extravagant city in the world. Great countries, possessing millions of square miles of territory, are governed more cheaply. One hundred million dollars! This is double the cost of the government of Mexico, with its 15,000,000 inhabitants, including the cost of Mexico's army and navy. It is almost one-third of the cost of the government of the German empire, and Germany has a population of 52,000,000. It is a quarter as great as the cost of the government of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, including its army, its gigantic navy and the interest on its debt. France's burden of taxation is crushing that wealthy nation of 40,000,000 inhabitants, yet New York's city government costs one-sixth as much as that of France. The expenditure of the government of the United States in 1890, when the country's population was 31,000,000, was \$63,000,000, or not very much more than half the yearly cost of the support of the government of New York City at the present time, says the Cincinnati Commercial Tribune. One hundred million dollars! This is in excess of five times the cost of the imperial state of New York with a population considerably more than 7,000,000. The departments of water supply and of docks and ferries are supported by their own revenues.

THOUSANDS OF MILES OF GOLD.

Rich Auriferous Sands That Are Found in South New Zealand.

A stretch of rich gold-bearing sand, 300 miles long by 25 miles wide, or 7,500 square miles, sounds like a somewhat tall order, writes the Wellington (N. Z.) correspondent of the London press, but that is the well-authenticated news which comes here from across the strait. From the Karama river, in the southern part of the South island, down as far as the Haarst river, in latitude 44 S., the whole of the west coast is almost fabulously rich in auriferous quartz reefs, and for 300 miles the black sands are full of the precious yellow dust. Hitherto none but entirely unsuitable machinery has been used for gold getting along these Pictorial shores, but recently the Walthero Shuiling company has put up a plant adapted to the peculiar conditions of the sand and is reaping an enormously rich harvest. The result has been a rush, and 3,000 acres have already been taken up by prospectors from as far away as Sydney. Orders for dredgers to the value of over \$100,000 have already been placed with manufacturers in England and the United States and at Krupp's works in Germany, and on the basis of the results so far attained it is expected that the annual yield will not be less than \$4,000,000.

A BRIGAND WHO LEVIES TAXES.

He Also Preserves the Peace and Protects Property.

"Brigandage" is still rampant in many rural districts in Italy," said Dr. Ravogli, the resident Italian consul, to an Enquirer representative recently. "From advice I receive occasionally I keep in touch with home affairs, and a letter from a friend in Trieste contains a reference to Tiburzi, one of the most picturesque of these freebooters. Tiburzi is about 45. At the beginning of his career he was as bad as others of the same vocation in life; in 1872 he was caught, convicted of highway robbery and murder, and sentenced to imprisonment for life. He escaped in 1874 and took refuge in a wood near Viterbo, where he lived in security, in spite of 17 warrants and a large reward for his arrest. The reason of this security is simple enough. He was good to the poor—any peasant in need of help could always get a gold coin from Tiburzi—and he punished traitors. Consequently the peasants were ready to assist him against the police or government emissaries, and those who would willingly have given information were afraid to do so. "After his escape Tiburzi altered his method of gaining a living. He caused it to be made known to all the well-to-do people in the district that if they paid him an annual contribution he would not interfere with them, and would protect them from molestation by others. It was considered advisable to agree, and Tiburzi has been for years in receipt of a large income, one man alone paying him \$150 a year. Crime has considerably diminished in the district; the smaller fry dare not molest Tiburzi's proteges, for he is still a good shot with his English repeating rifle. Tiburzi does what the government cannot do; he collects taxes without trouble and he keeps down crime. "It must not be supposed that he hides in the woods all day. He can walk about the whole district without fear of capture, and he lives in good style. He goes to Rome sometimes, presumably in disguise, and has even been abroad. Will he ever be arrested? Time alone will tell."—Cincinnati Enquirer.

A FRIEND TO WOMEN.

Gen. Spinner, Who First Employed Women Clerks in the Treasury.

If any man deserves the gratitude of the "new" woman, it is the man to whom the sex is indebted for one of the greatest advantages which women enjoy at the present day—that of holding office under Uncle Sam. When the first woman was put in the office of the treasurer of the United States there were only 20 clerks to do all the work, and a batch of seven women was appointed. Now there are 6,000 women at work for the government and the number is yearly increasing. In 1863 all the available men were needed in the volunteer army. This was the reason for the appointment of the women in the various departments at Washington. Then the United States treasurer, Gen. Francis E. Spinner, one day went into the room where men were engaged in cutting the "greenbacks," which first made their appearance under the financial policy of Gen. Sherman. Here shears were used and the labor, which was simply the clipping of the paper, was such that Gen. Spinner remarked that there was no reason why some women should not be employed to assist in a work that was daily increasing in size.

Gen. Spinner died about five years ago. In 1891 a mass meeting was called, and what is now known as the Gen. Spinner Memorial association was organized. Its object was to erect some suitable monument to the man who had done so much for the women, and the women in the government employ are expected to show their gratitude by contributing to the work. The statue has been modeled and cast and is now in the Washington studio of the sculptor, Mr. Elliott, the creator of the statue to Gen. Hancock which is to be erected in the fall. The figure is of bronze and represents the general in a simple but dignified attitude, with a large cloak thrown around his ample shoulders.

The statue and pedestal will cost about \$5,000. An effort has been made to secure a site in front of the treasury building, on the north side, and a bill granting permission passed the senate but was pigeon-holed in the house.—N. Y. World.

The Flying Frog.

The curiosity of tropical Africa is the wonderful flying frog, first described by Bishoff, of the Equatorial Africa expedition, which returned to Europe in the fall of 1894. This oddity of the reptile family is about the size of a common bullfrog, and resembles other members of the order of batrachians in everything but its feet, each of which is webbed and enormously enlarged, so much so as to form splendid substitutes for true wings. The creature has five toes on each of the other two, which are of moderate size, and three on each of its hind feet and three on each of its forefeet, or 14 in all. In his description of it Bishoff says: "Each leg terminates in a sort of a fan, and with these little reptile paddles the air like a locust, or like a partially fledged bird testing its pinions for the first time." Although somewhat awkward in its flight, the winged frog can dart through the air at a speed of about ten yards per second, and can keep itself going forward at that rate for from ten to fifteen seconds. The average distance covered by these sports of grasshopper-like flight is from 75 to 125 yards, but Bishoff mentions instances where the flying frog cleared sandy stretches 200 yards in width.—Rams' Horn.
