Bandon Recorder.

W. H. Botton, superintendent of the Bandon Oil Co., was in town this week, having business which called him here. A reporter approached him and learned that work was progressing nicely at the well, but that there is a scarcity of water on account of the dry weather, which makes it necessary to shut down occasionally to let the supply accumulate. The well is now about 300 feet deep, and the indications are all that could be expected. For the last hundred feet the drilling has been through shale rock.

News from Eureka brought the intelligence that the Bandon ball team did up the team of that place in a game on last Saturday, in a score of 4 to 3, and again on Sunday, by a score of 2 to 1.

Curry County Recorder.

J. R. Browning returned from Chetco, Tuesday evening. He reports that Mrs. J. L. Crook and her mother met with an accident near the John Cooley place which nearly proved serious to both of them. The ladies were driving home, when upon reaching a narrow place in the road, the horse shied and precipitated the horse and buggy down a bluff, 40 feet below. Fortunately the ladies jumped out in time and received no injury.

Work on the two story building now being erected by E. B. Burns south of the salt house, is progressing rapidly. Four or five men have been employed for the past two weeks. The frame work is now all up and two sides of the building boarded. The building will be considerably larger than the salt house, when completed.

The new steamer purchased by E. B. Burns while in Marshfield will soon be ready for launching. The engine is in position and only some carpentering work remains to be done. The steamer is a pretty little craft and is just the kind of boat wanted for Rogue river, being specially designed for this river by the Marshfield builder.

A charge of perjury against State Attorney-General A. M. Crawford has been filed with the grievance committee of the State Bar Association, with the object of having him disbarred.

The charge is preferred by Wm. R. Willis, one of the oldest attorneys in the state, and the accusation against the Attorney-General is that of having perjured himself while testifying in his own behalf in a case in which he was defendant.

Attorney-General Crawford has rendered an opinion in which he holds that County Clerks are entitled to retain fees collected by them for service rendered in taking testimony in Federal land proceedings. He holds that the law requiring them to pay into the county treasury fees collected by them referred only to fees for service under state law.

Russia now has over 250,000 men under arms in Chinese provinces. She has erected over thirty forts and has fifty more under construction. In addition to the land force there are forty vessels in Port Arthur and 40 others constantly under steam at Talienwan. Three battleships, two cruisers and four destroyers are expected to arrive in Chinese waters Oct. 15th.

Superintendent Frank Smith, of the Coos River Salmon hatchery, will remove the Remote hatchery from the Coquille and combine it with the Coos river station. The Remote hatchery proved a failure last year and the officials have decided to utilize what baskets and paraphernalia they can in the Coos River Hatchery.—Sun.

It is reported that warrants will be issued for the arrest of several timber cruisers at Roseburg. It is claimed that the cruisers made a lot of timber locators believe that they were taking up good timber land when in fact the land shown were located several townships away from the land the locators actually took up.

Col. T. A. Wood, grand commander of the Indian war veterans, is, it is said, almost sure to be disbarred on account of alleged illegal practices in the pension business. The officials and those who have knowledge of his case are certain that the charges against him will be sustained.

London, Sept. 30.—Sir Michael Herbert, the British ambassador at Washington, died at Davos Platz, Switzerland, this morning. The death was announced at 3:30 o'clock this afternoon by Lord Alverstone in the meeting of the Alaskan boundary commission.
