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Turks Insult Americans.

Constantinople, Dec. 8.—Grave sentiments are expressed here today over the action of American Consul Davis. It is believed that the Sultan has serious trouble in store unless complete reparation is made to the United States.

The United States flag over the Consulate at Alexandria, Asiatic Turkey, has been hauled down, and Consul Davis has left his post for Beirut, in consequence of a serious diplomatic incident, during which Mr. Davis was insulted and assaulted by the local police.

The affair grew out of the arrest of an Armenian—Chamnes Attarian, a naturalized American citizen. Attarian had been in prison at Aleppo during the last two months, and had just been liberated through the intervention of the American Consular agents on condition of his leaving the country forthwith. Mr. Davis was accompanying Attarian on board a departing steamer, when the police intercepted the party, assaulted and insulted Mr. Davis, and despite the resistance of the Consul and his attendant guards, rearrested Attarian and took him back to prison.

Mr. Davis immediately lowered the flag over the Consulate and formally broke off relations with the Turkish authorities by quitting Alexandria and leaving the Consulate in charge of the Vice-Consul.

A number of Muslims seized on the occasion to make hostile demonstrations against the Consulate and against the Christians generally. The local authorities assert that Mr. Davis struck the police with a cane, and that after the arrest of Attarian the Consulate cavasses, (military couriers) attempted to rescue him, and that in the fracas which ensued the cavasses broke the windows of the prison.

The Turkish authorities further claim that Attarian, who is a native of Diarbeker, Asiatic Turkey, has been traveling about the country with an illegal passport. They also point out that the question of Armenians naturalized in America returning to Turkey has always been a source of trouble, since the Porte invariably refused to recognize naturalization. When Attarian was arrested \$2,500 was found in his possession. This, it is believed, may have contributed to his arrest, the Turks suspecting him of being a revolutionist.

The matter is engaging the energetic attention of the United States Legation here. Mr. Lieshman has made urgent representations to the Porte, and is now awaiting a full report before taking further steps. The outrage, it is anticipated here, will lead to strong action on the part of the United States to obtain full reparation, especially as full satisfaction for the Beirut affair has not yet been given.

THE NAVY RATION.

Immense Amount of Provisions Consumed in a Year by American Sailors.

The enlisted force of the navy during the coming year is expected to consume 220,000 pounds of frankfurters, or sausages and 144,000 pounds of sauerkraut. This is a part of the new navy ration, for the component parts of which contracts are shortly to be awarded covering one year's supplies. Deliverable at the various navy yards and stations. The contractor for these provisions has been prepared in the bureau of supplies and accounts, and it has been one of the interesting estimates of that bureau to figure out the amount of subsistence of this class which will probably be consumed on shipboard, says the Army and Navy Register. The aggregate supplies, in addition to the 220,000 pounds of frankfurters and the 144,000 pounds of sauerkraut are as follows: 1,150,000 pounds of fresh beef, 287,000 pounds of fresh pork chops, 172,000 pounds of fresh veal, 285,000 pounds of fresh mutton, 220,000 pounds of pork sausages, 88,000 pounds of bologna sausages, 723,000 pounds of smoked beef tongues, 141,300 pounds of sugar cured hams, 141,300 pounds of sugar cured shoulders, 141,000 pounds of fresh beef liver, 285,000 pounds of dressed chickens and 71,300 pounds of dressed turkeys.

A NATION OF SMOKERS.

The People of Spain Puff Tobacco Incessantly and in All Sorts of Places.

Although one often hears that the tobacco habit prevails universally in Spain it is impossible to know how general that habit is until one visits there, says a London paper. People smoke incessantly under all conditions, at all hours and in all places—excepting the church. Men smoke in the railway carriages; they smoke in all the tram cars; they smoke in all the minor theaters; they smoke in all the restaurants in the hotel dining rooms, and, of course, in the cafes. In the business office the merchant and his clerks smoke. In among the shopman, while trying to sell goods to a lady, will stop to roll a cigarette, which, when lighted, he will puff in her face. You see conductors and drivers of tram cars smoking. All the hackney cabmen smoke all the time, while even coachmen and footmen of private carriages sometimes smoke on the box. Beggars approach you cigarettes in mouth to induce you to give them a penny. Cigarettes at a railway office the clerk lays down his cigarette as he hands you the dingy bits of pasteboard. The innumerable peddlers all smoke cigarettes all the time. The lower-class women, including the gypsy women, smoke freely on the streets.

AUTOMATIC DOCTOR IN PARIS.

Drugs for Twelve Different Ailments Furnished by Penny-in-Slot Machines.

It is probable that the climax of the automatic supply craze has been reached by the company which is about to install penny-in-the-slot machines, called "everybody's doctor," on the boulevards and principal thoroughfares, says the Brooklyn Eagle. Each machine is to have 12 slots, which means that not only the remedies, but also the prescriptions for 12 different ailments, such as toothache, indigestion, cold in the head and "nerves," will be forthcoming for the ubiquitous penny. The faculty of medicine has granted the system a certificate, and there is consternation among Parisian doctors. One doctor said: "It will lead to all sorts of complications. People who are suffering pain have not always their wit at command, and it is quite conceivable that many people will take the opposite drugs to those they require. I can see a man who is half blind, with biliousness, putting his penny in the wrong slot and swallowing a cure for influenza. That is certainly what will happen, and then those machines will be railed at just as many a doctor is when he happens to make a mistake."

Cordially Agreed with Teddy.

Gov. Roosevelt attended the recent commencement at Cornell, and while there was entertained at one of the college fraternity-houses. When he was about to leave one of his staff said to him: "Governor, the boys have an excellent library in the house and I think they would appreciate its enlargement by a copy of your 'Rough Riders.'" "Teddy," in an outburst of good-fellowship, exclaimed: "All right, boys, I'll be glad to send you a copy with my compliments; the book would be a very small return, indeed, for your hospitality." Whereupon one of the boys replied, excitedly: "That's so, governor; I've read it."

Artificial Leg That is Inflated.

An English inventor has devised a very ingenious artificial leg and foot intended for use in cases of amputation below the knee joint. It is mainly composed of a hollow rubber chamber, which is inflated in exactly the same way as a bicycle tire. The skeleton of the foot is of wood and contains within it a rubber-faced plate which permits of movements like those that take place at the ankle. A pair of rubber pneumatic pads surround the end of the amputated limb, so that no undue pressure is exerted on the tissue.

English titles are conferred either directly or indirectly. Directly, when no third person recommends a candidate for royal recognition, and indirectly when a third person brings a candidate's name forward, he having good and valid grounds for doing so.

It is a very easy matter for the prime minister to distinguish a name celebrated in politics, science, art, or literature, and to decide whether the merits of any given prominent person deserve recognition at the hands of the king, says the Baltimore Herald.

Armed with the person's approval, the prime minister now takes the next step—that is, the obtaining his majesty's sanction, which is never refused.

As a general rule a plain "Mr." is transformed into "sir"—that is, knight or baronet—and one who is already a "sir," and has done some signal service to the state entitling him to royal recognition, finds his reward in the ultimate elevation to the peerage.

The total number of peers is just under 600, while the baronets exceed 800, and the knights number 1,000.

Letters patent accompany the conferring of a title on an individual. They take the form of a royal mandamus, and the issuing of the documents is a costly matter, which has to be borne by the candidate. In practically the amount of the fee a new knight has to pay for the letters patent conveying the royal authority. A baronet's liabilities are about the same.

When a "Mr." or a "Sir," is advised of the royal intention to elevate either to the dignity of baron, the letters patent conveying the royal authority carries a fee of \$750; of a viscount, \$1,000; of an earl, \$1,250; a marquis, \$1,500, and a duke, \$1,750.

When Lord Roberts was promoted to the dignity of a serjeant as a reward for his services in South Africa, he had to forward a check for \$1,250 to the authorities of the college of arms for the parchment confirming his new title. But to be fined \$1,750 for marrying a princess is hardly stiff. When the earl of Pitt was married, when the husband of Princess Louise, of Wales, Queen Victoria, at the wedding breakfast which followed the happy ceremony, drank to the "health of the duke of Pitt."

This drink cost the semi-royal bridegroom the amount of his letters patent confirming the dukedom. It is a serious item when a man is made a peer. Baronets or knights wear no robes; peers do. A peer's robe is made of very fine royal serenade cloth, suitably trimmed with ermine, the rank of the wearer being known by the number of ermine bars which encircle the upper or shoulder part of the robe. A duke shows four of these bars, a marquis three and a half, an earl three, a viscount two, and a baron one.

The coat of a peer's robe varies somewhat, but the average price paid for a set is about \$1,000. Coronets—they are of silver-gilt, not of solid gold—cost from \$125 to \$250 apiece.

The new lord, on being summoned to the house of lords, attends, arrayed in his official robes, and is introduced to the lord chancellor and informally to the members of the house of lords by two peers of his own rank.

On walking down the floor of the house of lords, and the two peers bow three times to the throne, the observance being acknowledged by the lord chancellor, who receives from the newcomer the letters patent relating to the elevation.

The royal authority is read as a matter of form, and the document is handed back to the new peer, who, bowing ceremoniously, again retires.

Odd Nuptial Gift.

A German paper reports a singular freak of paternal liberality in the matter of wedding dowry. On the betrothal of his daughter Herr Duchateck had announced that he would give her as her marriage portion her weight in silver currency. Accordingly on the wedding day the bride was formally weighed in the drawing room in the presence of the assembled guests before proceeding to the church. The bride turning the scale at 140 pounds, a sack was at once filled with silver crowns to the same weight. The exact number of crowns was 13,500, about \$2,800.—Chicago Chronicle.

Amherst students have petitioned the trustees for practical courses in Italian and Spanish.

The course of the medical department at Bowdoin college has been changed from three to four years.

Sixty-six per cent. of the elementary schools in Belgium have savings banks for scholars, while in England the proportion is only 36.9, though it was 33.5 in 1893.

The common school fund of Texas owns in round numbers 28,000,000 of unsold lands. One-fourth of these are leased for grazing purposes at four cents an acre.

Principals of Chicago's public schools are opposed to the giving of prizes and medals to pupils. They do not deny that prizes are an incentive to effort on the part of the children, but prize-giving develops the immoral traits of envy and jealousy, and where the prizes are offered for competition in an essay, to be written out of the school room, there is a likelihood of assistance from older hands, and a consequent deceit on the part of the children.

Washington, Dec. 8.—To nullify attempts of cattle companies and others to obtain public lands in violation of the law, the Secretary of the Interior today overruled former decisions of the department that widows and minor orphans of soldiers or sailors do not have to reside on the land on which they make homestead entry. The decision which affects a large number of cases, and which has an important bearing on the public land frauds, is made in the case of Mrs. Anna Bowes, who made an entry on land in the Broken Bow district in Nebraska. Mrs. Bowes claimed the right of entry as the widow of a sailor in the Civil War under a section of the revised statutes which allows such dependents to make homestead entries with credit for the time of the soldier's or sailor's military or naval service.

It was admitted this entry was made under an agreement with the Standard Cattle Company whereby Mrs. Bowes at the time of the entry leased the land to the company with a further agreement that the company should have the purchase of the land. The department decides that Mrs. Bowes is required to maintain residence on the land and that her agreement with the company invalidated the entry, and requires its cancellation.
