"The Coos Bay Harbor says that the leading Republicans of Coos have selected Huston as the fittest man for Representative to Congress. The Tribune thought so from the start, and it predicted that the longer the time till election, the greater would be his majority. But Huston came to see us, although he was already familiar with our Coast conditions, having often visited his relatives and friends in Coos County. He is thoroughly familiar with all the questions for legislation that affect our coast. He knows all about our needs for Light houses, Life Saving Stations, Harbors, Coast Navigation, Land Matters, Fisheries, Lumber Business etc. It is doubtful if either of his opponents have ever given them a thought until the campaign opened. Let voters consider these things.

Some of the Reasons Why Charles A. Johns Should be Nominated For Governor.

To the Editor: Because he is a native born citizen of the United States; forty eight years old; in the prime of life and a type of the younger and progressive element in the republican party. Is a pioneer of Oregon, having resided twenty-nine years in the Willamette valley, and eighteen years in Baker City. Graduated from the Willamette university with an A. B. degree in 1878; admitted to the bar in 1881. Has always taken an active interest in public affairs. Was elected mayor of Baker City in 1891, re-elected in 1892, and again in November, 1904 by the largest majority any candidate ever received for that office. In June, 1905 was elected school director for the fourth consecutive term and received every vote cast. Has always taken an active, personal interest in educational affairs. CANDIDATE FOR NOMINATION AS STATE TREASURER.



Judge Thos. F. Ryan of Oregon City, Ore.

Born in Rhode Island 46 years ago, Judge Ryan came to Oregon in his 21st year and entered into the employ of the Brownsville Woolen Mills Co. at its factory in Brownsville. The following year he went to Oregon City where he has since resided. He has been elected as Mayor, City Recorder and School Director and Clerk of Oregon City and for the last seven years has been the County Judge of Clackamas County, in which position he has proven himself to be an exceptional business man, paying off an indebtedness of over \$200,000, and at the same time constructing each year many miles of good, improved modern roads, and decreasing the tax levy each year. In an interview Judge Ryan says: "Being neither President, Cashier, or Stockholder in any Bank, or Agent or employee of any Money Lending Institution I pledge myself to use and guard the funds of the State in a strict conformity to the laws of the State and for the interests of all the people and not to declare in favor of any institution or person. STATE PRINTING OFFICE

"All The Law Allows" Versus "A Square Deal For The State."

There is, perhaps, no office to be filled at the coming election which is so important to the state from a financial point of view as that of State Printer. The average voter never gives the office a thought and yet it is the one office of all the state offices where thousands of dollars may be squandered or saved to the state according to the desire of the incumbent of that office.

The present incumbent, Mr. Whitener, in conducting his campaign for a re-nomination, justifies his record by saying that he has taken no more than the law allows, and has printed nothing except such as was ordered printed by the Legislature. This looks plausible upon its face, but to those who know the inner workings of the office and the lobbying that has been done to induce the Legislature to order large quantities of work which is of no value to the state, simply to fatten the emoluments of the State Printer, it is known to be a sham and evasive plea, set up to fool the people.

Mr. Whitener does not promise any reform in methods should he receive the nomination and election and it is fair to presume that he will continue to "take all the law allows," and to see that the law allows everything possible in the way of printing. That is what he conceives to be right and privilege—that is what he is there for—and he promises no change for the future.

That being the case, it becomes the part of wisdom for the people of the state to see that a man who will promise reform in those methods which have cost the state so much shall be nominated and elected. They have the chance and probably will take advantage of it. Mr. Willis Dunaway, a printer of unquestioned ability, a Republican whose party fealty has never wavered, a man whose integrity is above reproach, is asking the people for the nomination for the office of State Printer. He promises that no jobs shall be worked through the Legislature to fatten the fees of his office. He promises a new deal and a square deal to the people, and he should be and probably will be given a chance to show the difference between "all the law allows" and an economical administration of this important office. —Portland Chronicle.

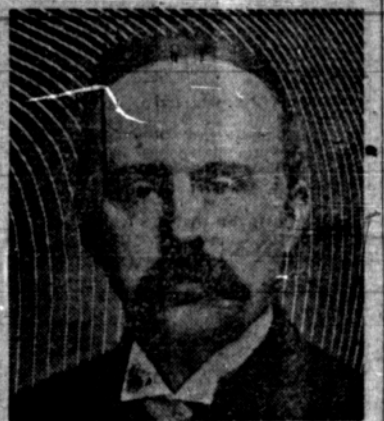
A Cunning Claim.

It is amusing to observe the cunningness with which some of the Democrats claim, that under the Direct Primary Law, the candidate for U. S. Senator, who has the greatest number of votes must be chosen by the legislative assembly regardless of affiliation. Such a claim in an age of trust and graft might be called "good politics," but it is not law; neither is it good democracy nor republicanism, as it would nullify the right of the majority to rule.

If the Primary Law contemplated such a proposition, it would not have provided three colors of ballots to be voted exclusively by the respective political parties at the primaries. This alone shows that the law never intended to destroy the rights of parties, but that it speedily protects them from interference in a most effective manner. A Republican ballot is white; a Democratic blue; all others are yellow. There is no chance for counting or mixing them by fraud. The highest candidate in each party is the recipient of his party's support, and if the object of the law is carried out by the legislative members, the dominant party will oust of their candidate who has the most votes at the primaries, and elect him without the usual exhibition of staid and cautious lobbyists and their slimy scoundrels.

With six Republican aspirants in the field, and but one Democrat of great personal popularity—it is a safe bet that Senator Geatin, the Democrat will have many more votes than any Republican. Hence the smart claim! But no Republican member of the legislature, in defiance of a large Republican majority in the state, will or can transfer his vote to the Democratic candidate—without committing moral, political and legal treason to his constituents.
