We clip the following obituary of Dr. Green from the Davenport (Wash.) Tribune:
"Dr. T. C. Green died at St. Luke's hospital Spokane, Friday, July 20, 1906, cirrhosis of the liver. Dr. Green was born in Indiana August, 1846. He attended the common schools and graduated from Wabash Medical College and practiced in Clay county, Indiana for a number of years. In 1889 he left there and came overland to Davenport. He resided here for about three years, but did not practice medicine. He then went to Valley, Stevens County and followed his profession for ten years. From there he went to Curry county, Oregon and was practicing there as a physician when he was taken ill and removed to the hospital in Spokane where he died. The remains were brought here Saturday evening and interred Sunday under the auspices of the Woodmen of the World. Services were held in the Christian church, Rev. Thomson preaching the sermon. Six children mourn the loss of the father. Dr. Green was highly respected as a citizen and physician and his extensive acquaintance and many friends regret his death."

C. H. Merchant Dies.

Charles H. Merchant, the father of Marshfield passed away at the latter place a few days ago. Mr. Merchant began his career at Coos Bay in 1860 and has since been prominently identified with the development of that section. He was an upright, honorable business man, of kindly disposition, well known by all the old pioneers of Coos and Curry who held him in the highest esteem and regret to learn of his death.

Pete Nelson Suicides.

Pete Nelson, an old resident of Curry county, committed suicide at Bandon last Saturday by taking carbolic acid and then shooting himself with a revolver. Mr. Nelson came to Curry county about '78 and resided at Dairyville for many years where he married the eldest daughter of Frank Langlois, and followed his trade at blacksmithing. About ten years ago he moved to Bandon, where he continued his trade up to the time of his death - making a large number of warm friends who regret to learn of his sad end. Domestic troubles and over indulgence in strong drink are supposed to be the incentives that lead to the rash act. He leaves a wife and six children who have the sympathy of their many friends.

Moscow, Idaho, July 31. - David Allen Collier aged 28 who came here three months ago from Coquille City, Oregon, where he has property valued at from \$15,000 to \$20,000, was found unconscious at 6 o'clock this morning in a vacant lot and died at 9 o'clock at his father's residence without regaining consciousness. The father says his son had been on a big drunk for eight days. When he was found blood was flowing from his mouth showing he had suffered a hemorrhage.

Collier's revenue of \$2,000 a month was spent for liquor. He would not even buy clothing, drinking heavily for four years. The body will be removed to Coquille city for burial.

When Collier was found the physician who examined him said, "Take him home, he will be all right." When it was seen he was getting worse the father summoned a physician living two blocks away. The doctor arrived in half an hour and Collier was dead.

Although there have been no executions in Paris for some years, owing to the difficulty in finding a place for the guillotine, the fatal knife has dropped with its accustomed regularity in the provinces, killing men like Clemenceau and others in the present ministry with disgust and a desire for a change.

A bill is being prepared dealing summarily with the death penalty, and at the present moment its passage through parliament seems assured.

Deibler does not mind, as he has an offer to tour the United States with a big circus.

Oregonian News Bureau, Washington, Aug. 2. - The name of Vice-President Fairbanks stands at the head of the La Follette blacklist. That is to say, Fairbanks is classed with those Republican Senators who voted against the La Follette amendments to the railroad rate bill and the Wisconsin Senator premises to make it warm for the Vice-President, as well as the countless Senators who opposed him. This threat to attack Senators who voted down his amendments to the rate bill is going to hurt La Follette more than the Senators' assaults.

There is no justice in the attack to begin with. The La Follette amendments were not necessary to make the bill effective, or else President Roosevelt would have discovered their good points and would have insisted upon their adoption. On the contrary, the President did not urge the adoption of a single one of them, and the only votes they received aside from that of La Follette himself came from Democratic Senators. But so far as Fairbanks is concerned, La Follette has no justification whatever for his course. Fairbanks did not vote against the amendments; he was not in a position to place obstacles in their path, and his opposition was not necessary to defeat them.
