Exemption Knocked Out.

Under the above caption the Salem Journal has this to say concerning the invalidation of the householder's exemption law by the Supreme Court:

"If the fact were dug up and made to appear this litigation was the work of Oregon Taxpayers, who by knocking out the exemption of the little fellows get relief for themselves by paying less taxes."

"The writer of the above evidently misconceives the operation of the law as it stood, or is endeavoring, in the interest of rich people, to arouse a sentiment among the masses demanding the restoration of the law, the very people who in the past have enjoyed next to no benefit at all from it. He seems not to know that the law has heretofore always operated to reduce the taxes of only such persons as gave in to the assessor personal wealth, be it cash, merchandise or whatnot, because, from the total assessment, it has been the practice to deduct \$300 thus relieving everyone possessed of that much personally, of an average of \$9 a year taxes, while the thousands who possess little besides the homestead in its beginning, or the house and lot in town get like or no deduction because their little wealth consists of real estate from the value of which no deduction can be allowed."

"As I pointed out last week the law which would bear equally upon all, and still be free from constitutional objections, would be vigorously fought by full handed people, which would be a law exempting from distress sale for taxes or for the indebtedness, say, \$800 of such property as the debtor may possess."

"Yet, so long as the masses decline to think, they will continue to be misled into their own undoing by the cunning and dishonest minority; the 3 per cent discount on taxes is one conspicuous example of the success of cunningly contrived schemes for self-enrichment at the popular expense."

"And by the way, I wish you would reinsert the following paragraph from my last article corrected so as to read 'millions' where 'dollars' occurs:"

"The deductions of the entire State amount to upwards of eight million dollars, wherefore it results that the persons who have enjoyed no deductions are compelled to pay over two and a half millions toward the payment of the taxes of the two-thirds of our people whose taxes have been lessened by the \$300 exemption each."

Trained Nurse Given Diploma.

Miss Agnes Sullivan, who has been training at the Sisters' Hospital passed a creditable examination last night for the position of trained nurse. She was examined by Dr. G. L. Simmons, Dr. W. A. Briggs and Dr. George Duffley, and the diploma was presented by Dr. Simmons. Miss Katherine Sullivan, head nurse at the institution, presented the graduate with a handsome pin. A reception in honor of Miss Sullivan will be held at the hospital this evening.—Sacramento Bee.

Fraud Cases to Wait Till Spring.

Owing to the fact that Special Prosecutor Francis J. Heney will have to appear in Washington for trial of the Hyde-Benson case in October, and the further fact that District Judge Hunt is anxious to return home early in September, the probabilities are that there will be a trial of pending land fraud cases in September lasting until next Winter or next Spring. Nearly a month has been required to try three cases, and the prosecution has made scarcely more than a start. Several of the longest and most important cases on the docket are yet to be tried.

Judge Hunt has announced on several occasions that he desired to return home not later than September 1, and while he might let the time lapse, it would be impossible for him to remain through the trial of all of them without remaining on the bench here until late in the Fall. Judge Wolverton will not get through in Judge Hunt's case in Montana until about August 20, and before returning home he desires to tour the Yellowstone National Park, and consequently he would not be here in time to preside.

While the plans of the Government are not matured as to the future trials, it is regarded as highly probable that land frauds will be given a rest early in September and not resumed until this Winter or next Spring. The Binger Hermann case at Washington will come up in the Fall term of court and will likely be reached in November. This case is likely to follow immediately after those against Hyde, Benson and others, both of which require Mr. Heney's presence at Washington.

Judge Hunt desires to take a vacation. Mr. Heney is tired and District Attorney Bristol says he will shortly have to arrange for a recuperative spell, and so the outlook is that the great land-fraud drama will be presented in two acts, instead of one, as was at first believed would be the case, when Mr. Heney came to Portland, a month ago. Before ending the present grand it is probable that the Mays case, the Steiner case and the Blue Mountain reserve case will be tried. This will clear the docket of some of the most important pending indictments and will afford the Government a breathing spell.

Judge Hunt's familiarity with the cases on trial, the fact that he has been twice assigned to preside over them and his recognized qualification render it probable that he will be reassigned to try the remainder, in the event a vacation is taken.

From present appearances it would seem that Charles will be again indefinitely deferred in his demands for a speedy trial.—Telegram.

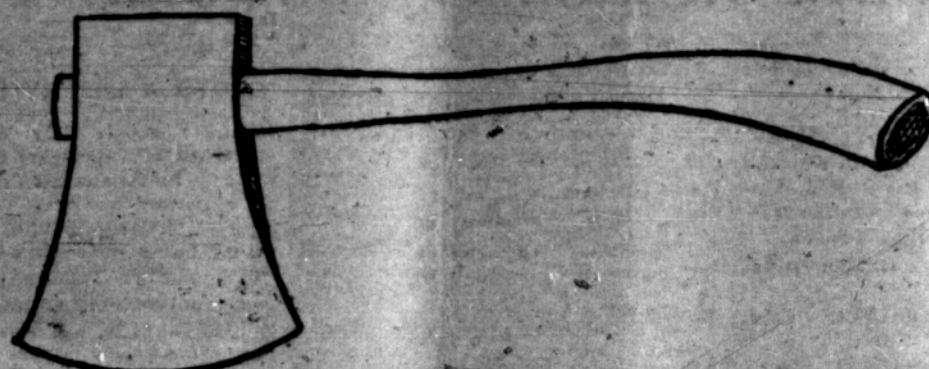

GRAND INITIATION.

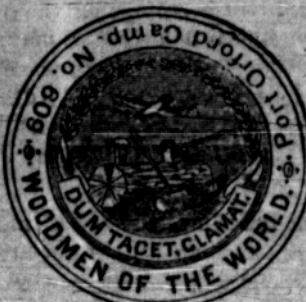
Woodmen of the World.

A Big Class will be initiated into the mysteries of Woodcraft next Friday night.

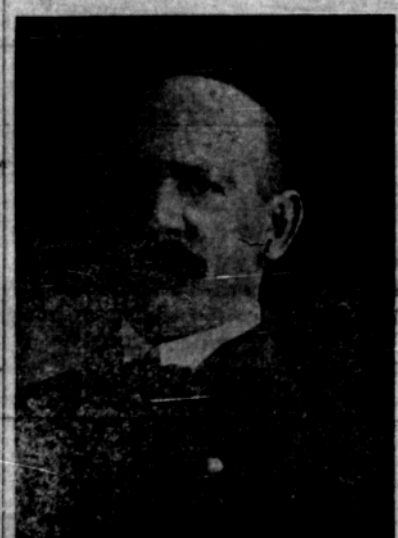
