Forest Fires are Raging on the Head Waters of the Santiam.

Up on the head waters of the Santiam river east of the Willamette Valley a fire broke out Saturday that is causing great loss of property and some loss of life is feared, though the rain falling down may prevent the latter. A strip of land one mile wide and seven long is already rendered bare by the flames and the little town of Berry is completely destroyed. The town of Detroit was considered in the path of the raging flames but the rain that fell Sunday has likely saved that place. It is claimed that this is the worst fire that has ever occurred in this region. A large number of campers were up there from Portland, who were forced to abandon their camps and flee for their lives to Detroit, where they were by no means in safety. Several large saw mills, some in use and others idle are destroyed, but the greatest loss will be in the destruction of timber. It is claimed there is no better body of timber in the state than that which has been burned and it is now raging in one of the state's largest and most valuable forests of timber. Nothing but a heavy rain can stop the course of the destructive elements, the small showers of Sunday being ineffectual in stopping the course of the fire.—Spokesman.

Scenes of Blood in Warsaw.

Warsaw, Aug. 15.—There were many sanguinary conflicts here today with revolutionists, who have organized wholesale massacres of policemen, gendarmes and infantry patrols. These conspirators shot and killed 17 policemen, four gendarmes and seven infantry patrolmen, and wounded a score more. Soldiers fired a volley into a crowd, killing 15 and wounding with bullets and bayonets 130. The massacre is supposed to have been planned by revolutionists in revenge for the arrest recently of ten Socialist workmen in the iron working suburb of Prago. It was a Catholic holiday and no one suspected that a massacre was in preparation. The weather was beautiful, the city was calm and thousands of people were crowding outgoing excursion trains. Simultaneously the attacks on policemen began at 10 o'clock in the morning. At about 1 o'clock in the afternoon news began to arrive from all parts of the city, revealing the concerted nature of the attacks. In Ostrovskaia street four men attacked a sergeant of police, but the latter was able to capture them, who were armed with revolvers. In a fight in Torgovia street revolutionists shot down two soldiers and a Jewish merchant was killed by a stray bullet. A band of three men invaded a grog shop in Cholodensia street, where they wounded a soldier. The clerk and wife of the proprietor opened fire on the intruders and a passing patrol, attracted by the disturbance, seized the entrance of the shop and captured the band.

In the afternoon strong detachments of infantry, dragoons and Cossacks appeared in the streets, dispersing the crowds with their swords, fire arms and bayonets. The streets were quickly emptied and by 9 o'clock all the shops and restaurants were closed. Ambulances and vans were kept busy carrying the wounded to hospitals. All passersby were searched by patrol, and many arrests were made.—Oregonian.

Lakeview, Or., Aug 15.—The rush to the new strike, 25 miles north-east of Lakeview, in the Coyote Hills, keeps up. Five wagonloads of people arrived here today from California. A new ledge was found yesterday three miles south of the original find. Dirt picked up in the ravines in the vicinity of the strike pans \$6 per pan. A book leaf ore has been discovered that assays \$50,000 per ton.

A ledge has been discovered within half a mile of Lakeview that shows values of \$2.85 in gold. The old Sagehen mine, 10 miles from Lakeview, is being relocated and 20 claims have been taken there. The ore closely resembles the Tonopah ore and runs from \$200 to \$5000 per ton. Mining men are looking for from Reno to investigate the new strike. Excitement is high and claim jumping frequent. Lakeview is the nearest point from which to reach the mines.
