Frank Moore was up from Euchre creek again this week after more freight.

Miss Rose Chandler, who has been visiting relatives here for the past six weeks, returned to Myrtle Point Friday.

A band of sheep belonging to Isaac Walker, was driven through town yesterday enroute to Humboldt Co., Cal.

Elmer and Oscar Miller, of Rogue river, passed through town last week on their return from a cattle drive to Myrtle Point.

Floyd Huntley, who has been visiting on the Sixes for the past week, passed through town Sunday on his return to his home at Gold Beach.

T. J. Cook, of Rogue river, has gone to Grants Pass to inspect some property which he is thinking of purchasing. If he makes the deal he will move his family there to reside.

Julius Koch, who purchased the Norberg property, opposite the Masterson residence last winter, is having the house repaired and changed, preparatory to making it his home.

Comment on the orderly conduct of the crowd that was assembled at the late W. O. W. Log Rolling at this place, was heard on all sides. This is the direct result of local opinion and a "dry" county.

Fred Odgers, wife and baby passed up the coast yesterday on their way to California to make their future home. Their many friends regret to see them leave, but wish them success in their new location.

In an attempt to assassinate Stolypin, Premier of Russia, on the 25th, fifty persons were killed or wounded. One of the four revolutionists who made the attempt was killed, and the others captured.

Postmaster Johnson and wife left Tuesday on a visit to relatives in Humboldt Co., Cal. They go via Coos Bay, and will be gone a month or six weeks. Harry Allen will handle the mail sacks during their absence.

B. B. Luce was in town the first of the week laying in supplies for another week's prospecting on Elk river. He says that while he has not struck anything rich so far, yet he has found several good prospects which he intends to further investigate.

The Elizabeth called in on her down trip Thursday afternoon and remained until Friday evening—loading lumber from Adolphsen's Mill. She took about 150,000, and this, together with her other freight, makes one of the largest cargoes that she has ever taken to the city.

Em Jernison's saw mill, on Sixes river, is running right along; while his brother Chas. has a gang of men at work on the big ditch leading to his placer mines, where he has good prospects of taking out a mint of money. Considerable activity in the mining enterprise is reported from that section.

Newt and Ed Divilbiss, and two gentlemen whose names we did not learn, have gone on an extended prospecting trip to the head waters of Elk and Sixes, from whence they will cross over into the Illinois country. They expect to be gone a month or six weeks, and as they are qualified to do scientific work we will not be surprised if good fortune rewards their efforts.

A crew of 7 railroad surveyors who have been surveying along Rogue river from Grants Pass down, for the past several months, are now well up the Illinois river, trying to find a practical route along that stream and thus avoid the deep canyons along the Rogue. If, as some surmise, this is a transcontinental line seeking an outlet on the Pacific, just keep an eye on Port Orford and watch developments.

Will Stauff and Will Beatty arrived in Port Orford from Marshfield last Friday, well supplied with guns and fishing tackle, for a week's outing in the mountains. In company with Geo. Stone and Chas. Long they are now in the woods, where at last accounts Mr. Stauff had succeeded in killing his first deer and had also engaged in a bear chase, but had to give the latter up after wounding it and following the trail for several miles.

C. J. Smith has returned to his old home at Gold Beach, after a years sojourn at Salem.

The Portland baseball team now has a good lead over San Francisco in the race for the pennant in the Pacific coast league.

Court Guerin and Chester Lauglois started over the trail to Big Bend Sunday, to resume work at the Gold Bar Mining Co's mines, after having spent a couple of weeks on the coast.

Bear and panther are reported to be more numerous in the mountains of Curry this summer, than for some time past, and have been causing considerable trouble on the sheep ranges in the Rogue river country.

W. F. Rife arrived in town yesterday evening from San Jose on a business visit to Gold Beach. Walter says that it seems good to get back to Curry again, although he is favorably impressed with what he has seen of California.

The crew of 20 S. P. surveyors who have been working down the coast from Coos Bay are now surveying between Sixes River and Port Orford, and it is said that they will soon move their camps to some point south of Crescent City, Cal.

The Oregon State Fair at Salem, Sept. 10-15 inclusive, is advertised to be better than ever before, and the lovers of the highly bred "race horse" will find there this year a string of "awitt goers" such as was never before assembled at that place.

District Judge Hamilton, Prosecuting Atty. Brown, several attorneys and a number of others passed down the coast a few days ago to attend Circuit Court, which is now in session at Gold Beach. The Court Docket is said to be unusually small, and a short session is expected.

Rough fir lumber is about \$7 per thousand higher in San Francisco at the present time than it was a year ago, and the Port Orford Cedar Company expect to take advantage of this fact by starting the Adolphsen mill in a few days and running it as late into the fall as possible.

The Tribune acknowledges a complimentary ticket to the Southern Oregon Agricultural Fair, which will be held at Roseburg Sept. 4th to 8th, inclusive. This promise to be one of the most successful fairs in the history of the organization in agricultural and live stock exhibits, and also in its speed program. Curry County will be represented by a string of four thorough-breds, which B. D. Hume now has in training at the above place.

Drain-Coos Bay Road Started.

Drain, Or., Aug. 21.—The first ground was broken last evening for the Drain-Coos Bay railroad. Two hundred and fifty mules, a dozen carloads of saws, plows and other tools from California and several carloads of powder, provisions, etc., have arrived already and also enough men to begin work on this great undertaking which means so much for southwestern Oregon.

Several hundred more men are expected to arrive this week, when work will be pushed with the utmost vigor. Nearly a thousand tons of hay have been bought by the Loss company between Drain and Elkton, 16 miles west of here and preparations are made for steady work until the road is finished.

Work will commence next week on the big 4,000-foot tunnel at Paradise creek about 18 miles west of here. The Loss company has sublet a contract to Cole & Sweeney of Portland to build two smaller tunnels, 11 and 12 miles west of Drain. Each of these tunnels will be about 1,200 feet long.

It is the intention to have 1,000 or 1,200 men at work on the new road within a few days. The wages paid are from \$2.25 up.

Several immense warehouses are being built here in which to store provisions. The 40 by 200 foot shed, in which to store 20,000 barrels of cement is nearing completion and thousands of the barrels have already been stored in it. All is bustle and excitement at Drain, which is sure to grow into a great thriving city within a few years.

FROM OUR EXCHANGES.

(COOS BAY NEWS.)

The Gold Beach Globe says, that since they are using the seine on Rogue river, every body that wants trout can go and get them.—The fish warden will be doing business at Gold Beach, if those fellows don't look out. It is against the law to catch trout in any of the waters of the state of Oregon except with hook and line.

The first pardon for a convict ever recommended by Judge J. W. Hamilton of this district, has been granted by Gov. Chamberlain to C. J. Smith, who has served one year of a two-year sentence for assault with a dangerous weapon, from Curry county. District Attorney Brown also recommended Smith's pardon.

Martin Peterson, aged 15 years, met with a horrible accident at the Bay City mill yesterday, resulting in the loss of his right arm. He was feeding a planer, and while endeavoring to adjust the machine his hand was caught by the rollers and drawn into the knives, which cut it to pieces. The rollers crashed his arm so badly, that when brought to the General hospital Drs. Straw and Richardson found it necessary to amputate it near the shoulder.

In conversation with Allen Collier who arrived on last Alliance from Portland, enroute to Coquille with the remains of his son, D. A. Collier, for interment, we learn that the young man was brutally kicked to death at Moscow, Idaho. One of the accused parties, Roy Taylor, had been arrested when Mr. Collier left Moscow, and since that time his confederate, W. J. Shrieve, has been captured in Washington, where he had fled after the murder. Mr. Collier informed us that he had sufficient testimony to convict both of the accused, notwithstanding the fact that they were exonerated at the coroner's inquest. He said he would return to Idaho immediately, and would spare neither time nor expense to bring the guilty parties to justice.

News was received by wire Saturday that the town of Parkersburg, on the Coquille, was wiped out by fire, with the exception of John Koenig's house and one other residence. The fire started about noon, and was soon beyond control, sweeping the mill, the wharves, and the houses of the employees, and badly damaging the schooner Oregon. The schooner Advance escaped without damage. The fire was caused by a spark which caught on the mill roof, and a gale of wind, blowing at the time, soon spread the flames. The original mill at Parkersburg was built in the '70s and was destroyed by fire in 1883. The mill just burnt was then built, and has been in use ever since. It was rather of an inferior type and was valued at about \$2,000. It was the property of the C. F. Doe estate, of San Francisco. It is probable that an up-to-date mill will take its place immediately.

Cuban Rebels Try to Capture City of Havana.

Havana, Aug. 21.—The Cuban revolution is now an actual fact, acknowledged although reluctantly, by the Cuban government. The situation is very serious, owing to the fact that all of those participating were famous in the late war for military prowess.

The rebels are trying to force foreign intervention as well as American. They attacked the home of the Danish consul near the residence of the American minister and stole 12 blooded horses. Raiding continues in various sections, the rebels taking horses on which to mount their followers.

Rebels tried to force their way into the city today. They were discovered by the police and fled after an exchange of shots at the threshold of the capitol.

There was fighting today at the hill of Pinar del Rio. The government has ordered the arrest of General Jose Miguel Gomez. It is reported that he has been arrested and held secretly. Gomez secretly is in prison.

The first important formal conflict occurred near Hoyo Colorado, where Lieutenant Bourke and a private of the rural guard were killed and seven at wounded. Eight casualties were captured. The combat occurred with the insurgent's command by General Emilio Nunez governor of the province of Havana, led the government forces. He returned to Havana last night and when asked if there were casualties, he answered, "Yes, wounded and everything else."

All rail and telegraph communication between here and Pinar del Rio had been cut, but later communication was restored.

The rebel commander at Pinar del Rio is advancing to take that city with 800 men, who are marching in three columns. There are only 300 circles defending the city.

Close watch is being kept by the American government on developments of the revolutionary movement for the purpose of determining whether it will be forced to intervene in the interests of peace. The question now being considered is whether the United States shall interfere of its own volition or wait until President Palma asks assistance.

Whether the Cuban government can put down the present revolution or not is, however, a question. If President Palma finds the situation beyond his control it is believed he will appeal directly to the American government, but the request would come through the American minister here or the Cuban minister in Washington. If the situation becomes serious America is expected to interfere.

Washington, Aug. 21.—The state department has required of the diplomatic representatives in Cuba a full report of conditions. The government is prepared to take formidable means of restoring order without delay if necessary. It is found that the Cuban government is unable to maintain order the marines will be sent ashore to punish the revolutionists. Officials say they do not have to wait a request from President Palma.

Victory Claimed by Government.

Havana, Cuba, Aug. 24.—The government claims that the insurgent general, Guerra, has been defeated in a three-hour fight at Pinar del Rio by government forces. But slight details of the battle have been received and the report is not generally credited.

Guerra is reported to be moving on Guane, 29 miles south of this city. The government claims that the movement is a retreat, though private advices state that it is an attacking movement, Guerra having left guards at San Juan de Martinez and San Luis to enable these towns to hold out against the government while he marches to take smaller towns.

The government massed all available troops at Pinar del Rio to avert the threatened attack when it was learned that Guerra was unwilling to risk a battle at present. Alarmed by rebel success, the government has ordered rapid fire guns from American manufacturers to be manned by former American officers now in Cuba.
