The day for "Good Lord and Good Devil" worship is past. No man can long serve two masters in this age of publicity, without being discovered in his hypocrisy. Fulton must serve the people, or serve the graft; he cannot serve both. Fulton's dust—throwing amendment to the Land Bill, providing that 20 per cent of the purchase price for timber land be given to the state, whence the timber is purchased, "in lieu of taxes," is impossible of explanation, and will most surely close his political career.

Current Topics.

Editor TRIBUNE—I assume that not every one knows that the genesis of the Bellamy Story Roosevelt controversy dates back to 1896 when Mark Hanna, the shrewdest politician of the century, secured Archbishop Ireland's assent to the use of his name in a powerful article against Bryan. Although Mr. Roosevelt was not originally a party to the attempt to prostitute the great Catholic Church to the uses and abuses of a desperate gang of politicians, he nevertheless inherited from the lamented McKinley a balance of obligations to the wily Archbishop not yet discharged, and among them the pledge of Mr. Hanna to bring such pressure on the Pope as might seem advisable looking to his promotion to a Cardinalate. And it was presuming largely upon the complacency of the Pope to urge such a request in view of the fact that the Pontiff had only shortly before unfrocked Father McGlynn of New York for the active part he had taken in the Henry George campaign for Mayor. However, it is a ill wind that blows no body good. One of the fruits of the pact with the Archbishop was the placing of that stalwart Irishman, and great Constitutional lawyer and able Jurist McKenna of California on the U. S. Supreme Bench.

Justice McKenna's dissenting opinion in the Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone kidnapping case wherein he held up the Governors of Idaho and Colorado as criminals, will go down the ages as one of the greatest outpourings of that great Court.

I have drawn up a Bill amending Section 5 of our timber protection law so as to exclude Curry Co. from its operation. This is a moist county, so much so that, during the "open season" for burning brush it would be impossible to fire a slash, and if our people do not persistently cut and burn they must retire from the stock business and consequently from the county. No fire law was deemed necessary until after non-resident speculators got control of nearly all of our timber reserves.

As a matter of fact, so little is this county that, as I understand it, no "Fire Rangers" have been demanded here, then what a mockery to require a permit from the County Clerk when one wants to fire a brush pile, and when the Clerk must not fire a "Fire Ranger" near by, where there is no such Ranger.

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Why Roosevelt is Strong.

We don't suppose that anybody, Republican or Democrat, questions that President Roosevelt is the most "popular" man in the United States. Our own opinion is that if it had not been for his enormous "popularity" the Republican party would have lost the House of Representatives in the Congress elections last month. The public was determined to give him its backing up in the second half of this administration, and committed to this purpose of a Republican Congress in support of the Roosevelt program, it waived other considerations except in rare cases like that of a Wadsworth, beaten in New York, a Babcock in Wisconsin, etc.

Within the last few weeks President Roosevelt has done several things any one of which the conventional politician leader would regard as fatal to the "popularity" of a man in public life. Perhaps any of them would have shot the ordinary leader into the limbo of retirement. One might mention the appointment of Cortelyou, an offense to the policy holders of the United States and to others who hold that trust funds of any sort should be protected from political loot. On the discharge of three companies of colored infantry in disgrace because the many innocent members of the troops would not or could not tell who the few guilty ones were. Or the very emphatic stand against the Californians in the matter of the Japanese in the public schools, when undoubtedly American parents in all the states sympathize with the attitude assumed on the Pacific Coast. And if he jolts citizens of means with his vigorous demand for inheritance and income taxes, he must have fretted hundreds of thousands, possibly millions, with his strictures upon them, in that he denounced roundly their leaders, to whom they are enthusiastically loyal.

Yet we believe that if Mr. Roosevelt would run again for President he would be triumphantly elected. We believe he could carry the Pacific Coast, where the sentiment against Asiatics is both strong and sincere; that he could carry New York, where the balance of voting power to determine elections rests with the so-called laboring classes which have just given to a demagogue the biggest ballot ever cast for a Democratic candidate for Governor in a year that was not Presidential—and it was at this man that the President struck straight from the shoulder, in his message; that he could carry Ohio and Illinois and Indiana and other states, where the negro vote wins for the Republican party.

We believe this because we are sure that the American people have an unshaken confidence in Mr. Roosevelt's sincerity of purpose, his devotion to the ideals of the American people, his courage to do anything which appeals to him as the thing for him to do. He may be impulsive; they remember that he is not afraid. He may make mistakes; they are certain he is honest. He may be wrong; they are convinced he would never commit any act unless he thought he was right.

The faith which the American people have in Mr. Roosevelt—which would show undimmed, we judge, in still another election—is a Nation's splendid tribute to honesty and fearlessness. It ought to be a lasting lesson to those who aspire to rise to National leadership and rising, to survive the storms of politics.—Oregonian.

Said relocation route having been viewed out and surveyed according to law and the previous orders of this court, it is now ordered that said road be opened and the clerk of this court is directed to advertise for bids for the building of said road, and it is ordered that the following be adopted as the tax levy for the year 1907:

For State purposes \$ 25 mills
For School purposes 3.25 mills
For County purposes 5.50 mills
For Road & Bridge purposes 3.00 mills

Total levy 14.00 mills

It is ordered by the Court that J. A. Tyler be appointed to collect the money subscribed for the construction of the new road between Denmark and Sixes River, and to pay the same over to the County Treasurer and take his receipt therefor.

Whereupon Court adjourned for the term.
