eliminating the Clerkship graft.
But look out, if some trickster does
not yet upset it all by some inno-
cent resolution slipped through
when the guards are asleep.

Willis Duniway as State Printer
is redeeming his election pledges.
He has already saved the state ten
thousand dollars in printing a brief-
er calendar, and has shown his
capability as a printer, and his
honesty as an adviser.

The TRIBUNE has received a copy
of Governor Chamberlain's Message
to the legislature. It treats of
many topics in a plain, honest,
sensible way, without attempt of
literary ornamentation and is, there-
fore a type, worthy of imitation
by other Governors. For want of
space, we are unable to publish an
analysis.

With no Senatorial or other poli-
ticial fights to distract attention this
session of our legislature has time
for deliberation and should make
an honorable record. That there
are some servile tools of monopoly
among the members, who will
sacrifice the interests of the state
for their masters, is more than prob-
able, and our advice to honest
members is, "Watch em!"

It is doubtful if another speech
can be made in the Senate, on the
"Texas Negro Row" equal to Till-
man's for truth, honesty, courage
and common sense. We agree with
Tillman, that this is to be a "White
man's government—an America for
Americans. We want no colored
citizens of any race, but we owe
duty to the Negroes, that we owe
to no others.

Growth of Gov't Ownership.

In "Soldiers of the Common
Good," in the January Everybody's,
Charles Edward Russell speaks of
government control outside the
United States. He writes:

"Perhaps we in this country give
insufficient heed to the immense
force of this trend (outside of our
country) toward the communal
good. Take but the single item of
government railroad ownership.
In the beginning practically all
railroad enterprises were owned by
private capital. In 1900 there were
167,813 miles of government rail-
roads in the world outside of the
United States. Since that year
Switzerland, Italy, and Japan have
taken over their privately owned
lines and the principle of govern-
ment ownership has been extended
everywhere, so that in 1906 there
are 220,750 miles (outside of the
U. S.) not owned by private com-
panies. It seems likely from pre-
sent indications that in a few more
years there will be hardly a mile of
privately owned railroad in all
Europe except possibly in Spain.
The life of private ownership in
England will certainly be short,
and the nationalization of the
French roads is definitely settled.
It is necessary to bear in mind
these facts in order to understand
the amusement and mirth with
which intelligent foreigners learn
of such legislative wonders of our
making as the railroad rate bill
and the nationalization bill. To
them solemn and elaborate fooling
of this kind seems to belong to the
childhood of the race."

The Democrats are responsible
for having put a Rothschild in the
Oregon legislature, but the Repub-
licans elected the Governor, and
don't you forget it.

In a recent letter from Washington
to the Coquille Valley Sentinel E.H.
Dodge is writing of the Interior
Department his "Bail's Eye," thusly:

The next question of no less im-
portance, discussed principally by
senators and representatives, is the
unlawful acts of the Secretary of
the Interior. The Commissioner
of the Land Department, who is an
ex-Governor of a western state and
a man whose character is of the
highest type, has for some time been
aware of the mistakes being made
by Hittchcock, and because Gyn-
mioner Richards protested
against some of the policies of the
old emaciated man at the head of
the Interior Department, his char-
acter has been assailed out of re-
vengeful spite, so characteristic of
Hittchcock, and the best men of the
nation have wondered why it has
pleased the President to keep such
a man in his cabinet. The old fel-
low will go out soon and he has
had Mr. Garfield at his office, re-
peatedly, instructing him, perhaps,
how to oppress the poor, by closing
up a land office so that railroad
corporations can secure the cream
of the public domain. Gossipers
state that the incumbent of the In-
terior Department contributed \$50,-
000 for a campaign fund and thus
secured his high position and was
able to hold in spite of the proci-
matation that every man should have
a square deal. Owing to Garfield's
close intimacy with the retiring
Secretary, his chances for con-
firmation by the senate is a ques-
tion of doubt.

The Fire Law.

ranchers to procure "permits" to
burn slashings, since conditions
down here are such that we must

waste places of the earth.

hand the bill I prepared asking for
relief in the premises. And there

Petition.

To the Senate and Assembly of the
State of Oregon.

We your petitioners would respect-
fully beg leave to represent for the
consideration of your Honorable body
that we are citizens and residents of
Curry county, Oregon.

That said county is situated along
the Southwest Coast of the State,
where the maximum duration of mois-
ture prevails each year, reducing to
the minimum the liability of forest fires;
That our ranchers and stockmen
must make a persistent fight to keep
down the rapidly accumulating brush
in the county;

That the requirements of Section 5
of an act to protect timber and forest
passed at 1905 session of the Legisla-
ture, while wholly unnecessary as ap-
plied to this county, yet prove vexatious
and embarrassing to our people
and greatly retards their progress in
reclaiming our pastures and ranges
from the jungle.

Wherefore we ask that Curry county
be relieved from the operation of the
said Section 5; and your petitioners
will ever pray.

Had Rough Time.

A dispatch to the Merchants ex-
change of this city says that the
bark Big Bonanza, which returned
to San Francisco yesterday after
having been cast adrift by the tug
Samson in a storm off the Oregon
coast on January 3, lost several
sails in the blow and that Captain
Cameron was badly injured by fall-
ing from the forward house to the
deck. The forecastlehead was par-
tially carried away by the strain of
the towline and the figurehead un-
der the bowsprit smashed into
splinters.

This explains the reason why
the crew of the bark failed to let go
the hawser when ordered to do so
by Captain Jones of the Samson.
It is taken to mean that the for-
ward part of the bark had strained
so that it was impossible for the
sailors to venture out to release the
hawser because of the immense seas
that swept clean over the bow.

menace to the peace of the orient.
We want to civilize Asia and con-
ceive that to be Japan's great mis-
sion."

A Railroad Bill.

A bill has been prepared and
circulated among the members of
the legislature, bearing the name
of Senator Coke, of Coos county, as
its author. In the consideration
of this proposed measure it may be
wise to remember the fact that
Senator Coke is a corporation at-
torney of Marshfield, and as such
he would naturally be prejudiced
in favor of his employees.

Another matter to be considered
is, that it is reported, whether true
or not, it is not for this paper to
state, that the bill in question was
prepared by Joseph N. Teal, Jr., of
Portland, and that it is prepared
for the purpose of heading off any
legislation that might be proposed
adverse to the interests of the cor-
porations be represented.

There are in the senate more at-
torneys for railroad companies than
Mr. Coke, and their acts will be
most critically scrutinized.

This is particularly necessary as
regards any measure proposed to
remedy existing traffic difficulties
and corporate aggressions by any
corporation lawyer, or openly
espoused by any of them. The
