The Oriental Reduction company of Portland, which has secured an option on a large area of beach sands between Crescent City and Eureka, is preparing to ship a large quantity of the sands to the reduction plant of the company at Portland. This plant is now under construction, and the method to be employed is similar to that used by Dr. David T. Day of the United States geological survey, who had charge of the black sand experiments at the Lewis and Clark fair. The sands not only carry gold, but also considerable platinum, nickel and iron. This experiment will be watched with much interest by owners of blacksand deposits in Coos and Curry counties.—Ez.
