**Americans in Japan.**

An American doing business in  
 Japan writes to the New York Her-  
 ald that American in that country  
 are discriminated against in many  
 ways. He says, among other things,  
 that Americans are not allowed to  
 own real property in Japan; they  
 are only privileged to buy a certain  
 class of securities; they cannot hold  
 Japanese on certain sorts of mort-  
 gages; they are not allowed to at-  
 tend Japanese schools, old or young,  
 they are only permitted to reside  
 in certain sections set aside for  
 them; they are not permitted to sail  
 in a private pleasure boat; they  
 cannot leave a treaty port without a  
 permit; and it is next to impossi-  
 ble to obtain one; they cannot enter  
 any port of Japan (except the regu-  
 lar open ports) from the water  
 front; at the theatres they are  
 charged more than double what  
 Japanese pay for the same accommo-  
 dations, and hotel charges are on a  
 similar basis; they cannot obtain  
 justice in the lower courts; every  
 case in which a foreigner is involv-  
 ed must be carried up before justice  
 is given; they pay double the rate  
 of taxes paid by Japanese.

Most of this will be news to Amer-  
 icans generally, and it is true it is  
 strange that more has not been said  
 about it—though not many Ameri-  
 cans go to Japan to live, and those  
 making only brief visits may be  
 treated better. The San Francisco  
 Chronicle, quoting the above, says  
 that it knows that most of these as-  
 sertions are true, and that they are  
 probably all true; and suggests that  
 if the Japanese in this country are  
 not satisfied with their treatment it  
 would be well to ascertain and de-  
 clare officially how Japan treats  
 Americans.

 aire to keep up "senatorial dignity,"

 to abolish it. For some years it  
 has been called a "Conclave of  
 Millionaires"—it is becoming more  
 and more so. When a poor man  
 cannot afford to be a member of  
 our congress, who will there be to  
 guard the interests of the plain peo-  
 ple? The rich have never done so,  
 in the history of the world. As a  
 patriot Spooner should have held  
 his position as the moral of his  
 resignation is not a healthy de-  
 velopment. It is an ominous storm  
 cloud, rising over the future.

**Current Topics.**

Editor TRIBUNE:—It has been  
 fashionable for some time for Demo-  
 cratic politicians to point to Dewey  
 and Platt and Aldrich as frightful  
 examples of Republican corruption  
 and rotteness in the United States  
 Senate. Such will have to speak  
 in whispers now, in view of the  
 presence on the Democratic side, of  
 Balfour of Texas whose Standard Oil  
 bribes have been traced by docu-  
 mentary proofs directly into his  
 pockets.

Senator Wm. M. Stone ("Guns  
 Shoe Bill") of Missouri had acce-  
 sibly got his seal warmed when his  
 connection with the Baking Powder  
 scandal in Missouri was unearthed  
 in the process of convicting several  
 State Senators for the rawest sort  
 of corruption and bribery.

In view of the epidemic of cor-  
 ruption in high places which scarcely  
 any person denies and no one  
 can refute, can one wonder at the  
 widespread unrest among the peo-  
 ple and their growing tendency to  
 look to the standard of Socialism?

And lest it be said that Socialists  
 themselves once in power will be-  
 come corrupt it is only necessary  
 to show that this will be impossible,  
 as they will wholly eliminate "prob-  
 its," which is the whole foundation  
 of graft.

There is a cold blooded proposi-  
 tion to enact more stringent vag-  
 rancy laws at the South under  
 which negroes may be legally kid-  
 napped and carried away and com-  
 pelled to work on the Panama Canal  
 for the profit of wealthy contractors.  
 Under such a law, to accuse one of  
 vagrancy is to convict him. To  
 what lengths of cruelty and dia-  
 bolism will not rich men resort  
 for profit. This vagrancy scheme  
 was suggested by the mad Oliver  
 who was seeking the contract to  
 build the canal. And do I hear  
 you say that the Courts would not  
 permit the carrying into effect so  
 inhuman and monstrous a law? Of  
 course they would. Have they not  
 justified and applauded worse out-  
 rages in Colorado and Idaho where  
 the Standard Oil is in control of  
 the legal machinery.

A recent U. S. Supreme Court  
 decision upheld the law of Nebraska  
 forbidding the use of the U. S. Flag  
 for advertising purposes whereupon  
 the Oregonian in a display head-  
 lined the Court was manifestly dis-  
 satisfied, while at the same time the text of  
 the dispatch said it was Judge Peck-  
 ham who dissented. That paper  
 had an object in view knowing that  
 hundreds of readers look no further  
 than the statement blazoned at the  
 head of a dispatch for the truth;  
 and that object was, as far as may  
 be, to discredit McKenna's dissent-  
 ing opinion in the kidnapping case,  
 by the intimation that that great  
 Judge had no respect for the flag!  
 And the libel was for its hoped for  
 effect in the trial of the kidnapped  
 workmen soon to come off in  
 Idaho where Judge McKenna's de-  
 cision is popular to the verge of  
 hysterics almost, among the people.

**Railroad Overcapitalization.**

In a speech in the Senate on the  
 Railroad question on March 1st,  
 among many striking facts, Senator  
 La Follette said:  
 "At the present time the men who  
 control the railroads of the coun-  
 try are making the public pay a  
 profit upon a capitalization of \$13,-  
 000,000,000, while \$6,000,000,000  
 will reproduce every railroad in the  
 land—cars, terminals, tracks, brid-  
 ges, depots, everything."  
 "I have fought, and shall continue  
 to fight, to have the \$7,000,000,000  
 of water, egged out of the rail-  
 road stocks of this country, and  
 then the public will have a chance  
 for its rights, because if we figure  
 that the companies pay 5 per cent  
 annual profit it will be seen that  
 each year the vast sum of \$350,000,  
 000 is taken from the public to re-  
 turn interest on \$7,000,000,000  
 of water."  
 "The government should take an  
 inventory of the railroads; ascer-  
 tain exactly how much they are  
 worth, and then allow them to live  
 within the provisions of the law to  
 the extent of making sufficient  
 profit to pay for all maintenance  
 and a fair percentage on the amount  
 of money actually invested. Now  
 they demand from the public not  
 only that, but an additional \$350,  
 000,000 income on \$7,000,000,000  
 of water dollars."

**HUMBOLDT, Cal., March 3.**—Humboldt  
 bar claimed another victim  
 today when the steamer Oakland,  
 in an attempt to reach the inside  
 entrance, ran on the rocks of the  
 south jetty. For almost an hour  
 the Oakland remained on the rocks,  
 and the bar tug Ranger was called  
 to her assistance by the lifesaving  
 crew. When the tug reached the  
 Oakland, Captain Krager, of the  
 Oakland, refused aid. A big wave  
 washed the Oakland from her peci-  
 olous position, but also tore off her  
 rudder. For several hours she  
 drifted helplessly and perilously  
 near the rocks. The lifesboat com-  
 manded by Captain Henning, put  
 out.

At this time the Oakland display-  
 ed distress signals and once more  
 the tug Ranger went to her assist-  
 ance, lowering her life into the  
 bay, where she was beached in a  
 badly leaking condition. There are  
 several large holes in her stern.

The Oakland went on the rocks  
 about 1000 feet from the wrecked  
 Corona. Several attempts have  
 been made to reach the Corona by  
 the Humboldt Bay lifesaving sta-  
 tion, but all were futile. One trip  
 the lifesboat barely escaped destruc-  
 tion on the rocks on the north jetty.  
 Captain Boyd and a crew of men  
 are aboard the ship making pre-  
 parations to unload part of the  
 cargo. The Corona is in the same  
 position, but has sunk about six  
 feet—Oregonian.
