The Entertainment.

The school entertainment given by Norman Tyler and his pupils, aided by local talent, was a decided success in every way, and was highly appreciated by the large audience which assembled from Flores creek to Brush creek to patronize and applaud.

It is a just tribute to Mr. Tyler to remark that this was his second school, and that for the entire six months he grew in the estimation of the pupils and parents and taught a most successful term. And as this was his first attempt at conducting an entertainment of this kind he is entitled to much credit for his zeal and skill in making his pupils so proficient in their various parts in carrying out the program, some acquiring themselves remarkably well, and all doing the best they could.

The songs by Marsh and Johnston were encored as usual. The orchestra, Tyler, Neumann and Johnston, rendered some high class pieces which were well received.

After the entertainment was concluded the audience went to Nielsen's large hall and danced the night away, the ball being one of the best ever held at this place.

The attendance of so many people from Flores creek is appreciated and Port Orford will try to reciprocate when possible.

The gross receipts were \$19.25 and as the expenses were but \$4.50, a balance of \$14.75 remains to be used in painting the interior of the school house.

Veni, Vidi, Vici.

Last Friday a very interesting business meeting was held in Port Orford, the importance of which is far reaching, as we hope, and some day may be one of the final chapters in this great but neglected place.

Hon. R. D. Hume, having purchased the wharf at this place, came up from his eyrie at Wedderburn and announced that he would like to meet the citizens of this vicinity the next day at one o'clock, to talk over with them the best methods to be pursued for the future business development of Port Orford and vicinity.

A very respectable turnout, representing the town and our adjacent business men, responded to the call, meeting in Nielsen's hall, where a most satisfactory and harmonious interchange of ideas was held.

In his opening address Mr. Hume outlined the policy he desired to pursue in repairing the wharf in a permanent manner, and stated that it was not his purpose to antagonize any established business, but to develop new lines of business if possible, especially in both the salmon and deep sea fishing. That as Port Orford with its deep water offered facilities for large vessels, he proposed to use it as a depot for supplies which could be readily transported to Rogue river by his smaller vessels; and if his fishing developments were successful, he might erect a large refrigerating plant here and make it his headquarters in this line of business.

We were glad to note that on all sides there were no pessimistic opinions and that a cordial expression of good will met Mr. Hume from every lip, and if he was not pleased by the reception it was wholly his fault.

Mr. Hume has now reached that mature age when he knows the value of public opinion as life's greatest reward, and that it can only be won and held by squaring our words with our acts. We have faith in his words spoken here, and their fulfillment means a turning point in Port Orford history, beneficial alike to him and this community.

Japan and Russia have finally withdrawn from Manchuria, and the last of their soldiers marched out, the Chinese soldiers marched in, and China is an entity again, thanks to the Treaty of Portsmouth and the pressure of friendly nations.

We are informed that the "Curry County Land Frauds," concerning which so many men have been indicted, involves but SEVEN CLAIMS, the extent of timber claims purchased by the defunct P. F. and L. company of Los Angeles. Of these SEVEN CLAIMS not all were fraudulent, and it is doubtful if there is a single one!

There is said to be great dissatisfaction with Harriman among the big men in his concerns, and that his fall is certain. But, as he is said to have beaten his enemies to the tune of 20 millions in the late Wall St. flurry, so he may beat them again by his dazzling versatility. While men may admire his audacious success, yet nobody would mourn at his business death.

The Coos Bay Harbor wants R. D. Hume to succeed Fulton in the Senate. It has never liked Fulton since he refused to pledge himself to get 40 feet of water on Coos Bay Bar, whether possible or not. Fulton pledged himself to "get all he can," but possibly the Harbor fears that he may get too much! Let the Harbor learn the lesson quickly that Charlie Fulton will succeed himself, because the old Oregonians know him and have full confidence in his ability and integrity. He is the Republican leader in Oregon, and one of our strongest national characters, having won his way by sheer force of intellect in contests with the master minds of the country.

Pertinent Politics.

As will be seen elsewhere in this paper, President Roosevelt has not answered the protest of the Labor associations, regarding his unjust condemnation of Moyer, Pettibone and Haywood while their trial was pending. The truth is, he cannot justify his rash talk against these men, any more than his unlawful attempt to interfere in the San Francisco School question. These rash errors and his assault upon our Reserved Rights, would defeat his re-election by an overwhelming vote, and so well he knows it that he is again refusing to be a candidate for the nomination. Except Hughes and La Follette, the Republican party, under existing conditions, has no available man in sight who would have a ghost of a show against Bryan, and Hughes as yet is an unknown quantity.

With both the great corporations and the labor organizations against him, no man can be elected President of this country, nor can he choose his successor, nor should he be allowed to do so.

WASHINGTON, April 16.—No reply has been made by the President to protests sent him by the Chicago Federation of Labor and the executive committee of the Moyer-Haywood conference at New York, which took exception to his reference to Moyer and Haywood, the men charged with murder of ex-Governor Steunenberg of Idaho, as "undesirable citizens." These words were used in the President's letter to Representative Sherman in the controversy with Mr. Harriman. It is not believed the President will make any answer to the protests regarding the matter.

(COOS BAY NEWS.)

The new steam schooner, Wellesley, built at Prosper, on the Coquille, arrived in the bay yesterday afternoon in tow of the tug Columbia.

The Triumph towed the Wellesley over the Coquille bar, where she was picked up by the Columbia. She is taking a cargo of lumber at North Bend.

The tug Columbia left the bay Friday with the barge Chinook in tow, bound for the Coquille river. The Columbia was to tow the Chinook to the entrance of the river, and the Coquille tug, Triumph, was then to take the vessel across the bar.

For some reason the Triumph failed to show up, probably on account of the Coquille bar being rough, and after waiting for a considerable time, Capt. Magee started back for Coos Bay with the barge in tow.

A strong ebb tide was running when the Coos bay bar was reached and the bar was breaking at intervals, but it was not as rough as it occasionally is when vessels are towed in. The tug shippeled a little water, and the deck of the barge was washed by a few seas; but the bar was crossed in safety, and the tug was off the end of the jetty when the wire hawser broke in the chock of the unwieldy tow.

The wind and sea quickly drove the vessel into shoal water on the South spit, where it was impossible for the tug to render assistance. The anchors were let go, but failed to hold, and the vessel continued to drift towards the beach. Signals from the tug were promptly answered by the life saving crew, who rescued the men on the barge, which had at that time beaten across the spit, and was swinging to her anchor in what is known as the South channel, close to the bluffs. With the flooding of the tide, however, the heavy seas broke the anchor's hold, and the vessel was thrown ashore in a small cove some distance from Coos Head. The vessel was high and dry at low water on Sunday, but owing to the steep bluff which surrounds the cove, the freight could not be removed. Besides some freight for Coquille merchants, there was half a ton of dynamite on board, and it was feared the powder would explode when the vessel struck the rocks, but fortunately nothing of the kind occurred.

Altosna, Pa., March 23.—John Ellmore, a hard working cobbler, gave a demonstration at the Citizens' Light company's plant of a process of extracting heat from ashes, to the perfection of which he has devoted 20 years' study. His father worked on the invention and when the father died Ellmore took up the problems.

The results shown were marvelous and if the process is brought into general use there will be a revolution in the fuel industry. Several hundred persons witnessed the demonstration.

Ellmore's secret is a chemical compound with which he sprinkles the ashes. Under one of the company's 10 boilers he built a fire which gave more heat than was produced by bituminous coal fires under the other nine boilers combined.

He used 10 parts of sprinkled ashes to one of coal. Only a small residue is left when the fire goes out. The ashes glowed like a bed of burning anthracite. Ellmore says the discovery will make a tremendous cut in the cost of fuel.
