BUILD RAILROAD EUREKA TO COOS

Southern Pacific and Santa Fe Announce Extension of Joint Line.

San Francisco, April 30.—When the directors and nominal stockholders of the Northwestern Pacific met yesterday in the Board building and voted to mortgage the property for \$35,000,000 and add in New York, it was merely a formality in obedience to the orders of President E. H. Harriman of the Southern Pacific and President Ripley of the Santa Fe, who are the real controlling owners of the property and its proposed extension into new territory and that the previously large valuation on which the bonds are to be issued is based upon the joint reports of the Southern Pacific and Santa Fe engineers as to the value of the completed system which is to be constructed with the proceeds of the bond issue.

It is not often that Chief Engineer Hood of the Southern Pacific admits any plans that are not at ready public information, but today he declared that the company's engineers had run surveys to Eureka along the coast to Marshfield on Coos bay and that men were out collecting the data of those surveys, as the records were destroyed in the big fire.

Hood also announced that the line was being built westward from Drain, on the Shasta route to Winchester bay, about 20 miles north of Marshfield, to which a Southern Pacific extension is also being built.

These proposed roads and surveys indicating the connection between Eureka and Marshfield, are intended to be part of the plan of extension in addition to the building of the 105 mile gap between Willits and Peppersburg on the run from Tiburon to Eureka. These new lines will add 200 miles to the Northwestern's trackage.

(Coos Bay News)

Preliminary work is progressing as rapidly as possible for the construction of the big mill for the C. A. Smith Lumber Co., and it is hoped to have the mill completed before the end of the year.

The wreck of the Bessie K. was sighted Friday off the Quillike, and Capt. Magee with the tug Columbia left the bay to investigate. The steamer schooner Cascade had a line on the wreck when the Columbia arrived, and may possibly have towed the derelict to Port Orford. The wreck is hard to handle, being bottom up, and both anchors dragging, and few vessels would care to tackle the job of towing her.

We acknowledge a pleasant visit from Attorney Louis Barbee, of Roseburg, who has been on the bay for several days, representing the business men of Roseburg, who are anxious for the construction of an electric railroad from Roseburg to Coos bay. The Roseburg merchants have agreed to subscribe for a large amount of stock in the enterprise, and Mr. Barbee says that he feels the Coos bay people equally liberal and enthusiastic over the proposition. It is positively asserted that after five miles of the road are built on each end of the route, the money is ready to finance its completion and equipment. From present indications the outlook is very promising, and we hope to be able to state positively in the near future that all arrangements have been completed for the construction of the line.
