Mrs. C. F. Allen passed down the coast Saturday, on her way to Gold Beach of business necessitated by the death of her husband.

As a number of young people were in town Saturday from Adolphsen's mill and the Cape, an impromptu dance was gotten up, and an enjoyable time had in Nielsen's hall with music furnished by the pianola.

The wireless station at Cape Blanco has been in working order for the past week and messages are successfully transmitted and received. It will take about two weeks to complete work at the station and the house.

Mr. and Mrs. Walter Sutton started for Marshfield Monday morning on the sad mission of bringing to Port Orford for burial the remains of their daughter Birdie. Mr. Ashman having telephoned that he would arrive at Coos bay today.

W. H. Peck returned from a business trip to the county seat Friday, where he went to settle up the estate of his deceased brother. Mr. Peck, having sold his stock ranch on upper Stage, intends to leave in the near future for Los Angeles, where he will reside permanently.

Clarence Wright and Johnny Stone returned from Wedderburn Monday, where they have been working in Hume's cannery for the past month. They report the run of fish so slack that the board bill amounted to nearly as much as their wages, hence their return home.

The yacht Clementine, said to have been the fastest sailing boat on San Francisco bay, was anchored for several days in our harbor last week to escape the heavy wester that was blowing outside. She was on her way to Seattle, having been purchased by the yachting club of that place.

Isam Walker and his associate cattle buyer, Mr. Rohner, and Jesse Turner, accompanied by the former's camping outfit consisting of a four-horse wagon and five extra horses, passed through town Sunday on their way to Mr. Walker's stock ranch at Langlois; all but Mr. Turner having come from Humboldt, California.

Chester Langlois spent several days in town last week on his return from Big Bend, having resigned his position with the Gold Bar Mining Co. of that place, where he has been employed for the past year. Chester says that working through the summer with the thermometer from 100 to 115 degrees in the shade is a little too warm for him, and he will go to Coos shortly in quest of employment.

Mart Sherrard returned from Bandon Sunday, having taken Ace and Ernest Carey to that place. The former goes to drive team for his brother Dave, on the Coquille, while the latter is in contemplation of starting a daily newspaper. This is young Mr. Carey's first visit to the West and he thoroughly enjoyed his few days out in Curry and says he will return as soon as business permits.

Prof. Johnston's school on Elk river is progressing nicely with an enrollment of 16 pupils.

Gold Beach is making preparations to celebrate the Nation's birthday in a rousing manner.

Mr. John Ray and Miss Sadie E. Jackson, of Harbor, were married in Crescent city on the 10th of last month.

The repairing of the pile driver has been completed and it is now expected that work on the wharf will commence soon.

Del Norte Record: C. Wright of Curry county, Oregon, is estimating timber in this county, which C. M. Benham is negotiating for.

The Berwick dropped into the bay Sunday evening and the following morning unloaded a donkey engine to be used in repairing the wharf, and about two tons of household goods for Mr. Burnham. She left the same day for Portland.

J. L. Baker, an old miner who for a number of years has been prospecting in the mountains of Curry, was in Port Orford the first of the week laying in supplies. He will spend the summer on the head waters of Elk river, where he believes indications are favorable for making a strike.

Henry Axtell was down from Bandon the first of the week and spent a couple of nights on his homestead on Elk river. He has just opened up a new market in Bandon—dealing in vegetables, fruit, butter, dairy and ranch products, etc., and reports the beginning of a patronage which bids fair to make a success of the enterprise in that hustling little city by the sea.

Achie Hahn, coach of the Pacific University at Forest Grove, in a recent field meet, ran the 100-yard dash in 9.5 seconds, tying the world record for this event. Hahn defeated Dan Kelly at the Lewis and Clark Fair and has twice this season run in 4.5 seconds, thus proving himself to be a consistent performer. In he and Kelly, Oregon probably has the two fastest sprinters in the world and a return meet between them will be watched with much interest.

New Divilbia was in Port Orford during the week and in company with O. Senore, Shad Hudson and others sent a protest to the Lind Office against some timber claimants holding certain lands on which they have filed and proven up, and which includes a large part of the rich mineral bars of Sixes river which have been located and worked since early days. Ernest Divilbia was also in town and mailed a protest against Thos. Robinson's Homestead which includes a portion of his mining location.

Frazier Tupper died in a Sanitarium at Portland, April 29, of heart trouble. He was taken worse while enroute to Cal. for his health. Mr. Tupper was 44 years of age and leaves a wife and four children. For several years he resided in Bandon where he was postmaster and also landlord of the Tupper Hotel, but some five years ago he moved to Coquille where he had charge of his father's hotel business up to a short time before his death. The deceased had resided in Coos county since 1869, and leaves a host of friends in that section who regret his untimely death.

Mrs. C. F. Allen and son of San Francisco, appeared before the county court in Coos county last week and demanded an investigation of the shooting of Mr. Allen at Bandon by night watchman, Wm. D. Clarke. A number of witnesses were called before the grand jury and every detail of the case was carefully gone over and at the conclusion the jury held that Clarke had only done his duty as prescribed according to his position. While some thought that he had been too hasty in shooting, the majority were of the opinion that he did right in not endangering his life further, as Allen, in his condition was a very dangerous man.

Death of Bertha Sutton.

Mrs. E. A. Ashman, nee Miss Bertha F. Sutton, died of tuberculosis at Oakland, Calif., on Friday, May 3rd, 1907. While her death came as a shock to her friends and relatives, it was not entirely unexpected as it had been known for some time that she was afflicted with this dreaded disease and her life despaired of, yet hopes were entertained that she would, at least, live through the summer and be able to stand the trip from Ashland to her old home at this place.

Mrs. Ashman was the second daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Sutton, and was born at Gold Beach, (then Ellensburg) Curry Co., Oregon, March 28th 1884, and when a small girl moved with her parents to Port Orford, where she grew to womanhood and married Edward A. Ashman June 22, 1902. About two years later she went with her husband and little child to Ashland Ore., where she lived up to the day preceding her death.

Full of life and energy in her childhood days, with an ever ready smile and kindly word of greeting, she was a favorite among old and young alike, and at the time of her leaving Port Orford there was little to indicate that the Grim Reaper had picked her as a shining mark, and that ere a few years rolled by her spirit would be among our loved ones in the world to come and devoted hearts would be grieving for an empty place that never can be filled.

When Mrs. Ashman realized her serious condition and that ultimate recovery was impossible, she desired to return to the home of her parents at this place and pass her declining days amid the scenes of her happy childhood, surrounded by loving friends and relatives, and was while enroute with her husband, with this end in view, that she passed away at Oakland, where they were to have taken the steamer to Coos bay.

The deceased leaves a husband and one little girl besides her father and mother, brothers and sisters, and this community feels keenly the loss of this bright and useful young life which passed into eternity on the very threshold of what might have been a long and useful existence, and extends to the bereaved relatives the deep sympathy of a mutual loss.

The remains are expected to arrive here Saturday, in which case interment will take place in the Port Orford cemetery, Sunday.

Passing Of Mrs. Martha G. Trimble.

Mrs. Martha G. Trimble, the beloved wife of Mack Trimble, for many years a resident of Smith river valley, died at Portland, Oregon, on the 26th instant, aged 41 years, 1 month and 26 days. The deceased was born in Curry county and spent most of her life at Smith River but during the past sixteen years they have been residents of Bridlevale, Oregon, with the exception of a year or two spent in Del Norte county. The cause of her death was a tumor on the brain. She was in a Portland Hospital for two months and had the best of nursing and medical skill in attendance.

The remains were brought from Portland to Smith River where a funeral service was held last Monday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock, the Rev. William Cutler presiding. An immense crowd of people attended and the floral decorations were beautiful indeed.

Besides the husband and little Edna there remain to grieve her demise her father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. J. N. McVay, Sr., six brothers—John, Daniel, Edgar, James, Samuel and Seward and two sisters—Mrs. A. J. Hoffman, the wife of our sheriff, and Mrs. Fred Elliott. All of these relatives are residents of Del Norte county practically although some are away from here at present.

Mrs. Trimble was an affectionate wife, indulgent mother, a loving daughter and sister and a friend steadfast and true. Her bereaved relatives have our sincere sympathy.—Crescent City News.

Burns Prove Fatal to Alta Miller.
A sad accident occurred at Willbur, April 26, resulting two days later in the death of Alta Irene Miller, the little three year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John W. Miller. Her clothes caught fire from the fire place. The fire was quickly extinguished by her aunt, Inez Miller, who wrapped a quilt around her but not quick enough to save the little life. No one could be blamed for the accident. The external burns were serious but not fatal. Death resulted from inhaling some of the fire. The whole neighborhood was shocked. A large funeral, an abundance of beautiful flowers and decorations showed the sympathy of the entire community, and the esteem in which she was held by all who knew her. The members of the Junior League marched by the grave each dropping flowers on her last resting place.—Umpqua Valley News.

American Tars Attacked.

Havana, May 1.—The police of Santiago early this morning attacked a party of enlisted men from the Cruiser Tacoma, who were returning to the wharf upon the expiration of the shore leave, to board the cruiser. Three of the Americans were seriously injured, and one, whose skull was fractured will probably die. Ensign Brislin, who was ashore in civilian clothes, also was injured, but not seriously.

News of the fight came here to Commodore Wood of the cruiser Dixie, he being the senior officer in Cuban waters, from Commander Tappan of the Tacoma, which is regularly stationed at Santiago.

The police evidently used guns, knives and clubs, while the sailors were unarmed, as they are not permitted to go ashore with weapons of any kind. Behind the row is believed to be the hatred of Cubans for Americans which has been shown before. Commander Tappan is investigating the matter.

Sheep Must Be Dipped.

E. W. Donnelly, U. S. sheep inspector and Dr. R. E. Hunt, county and state deputy stock inspector, both with headquarters at Oakland, were in this city Saturday evening. Under the new ruling all sheep must be "dipped" at least once this year, whether they are scabby or not, and all scabby sheep must be dipped as often as the inspector deems it necessary in order to cure the disease. They are making a thorough inspection of the livestock of the county.—Roseburg Herald.
