Salem, Ore., May 24.—County
Clerks need not make transcripts of
assessment rolls for 1907, but may
extend the takes on the original
roll and turn over to the sheriff.
Such is the substance of an opinion
rendered today by Attorney Gen-
eral Crawford in response to an in-
quiry from County Clerk G. B. Lamb,
of Tillamook county. This will be
pleasant news to clerks, for it will
save them a large amount of work.

new law governing the collection of

Astoria, Or., May 25th.—Harry
George, only son of Geo. H. George,
a Columbia river canneryman, was
accidentally drowned in Young's
river about three o'clock this after-
noon. During the afternoon George
and Miss Winifred Higgins went
for a sail in a small boat. They
had been out but a short time and
were just above the Young's River
bridge, when the boat suddenly
gave a lurch and the boom swung
around, striking George in the head
and knocking him overboard. The
young man was an expert swimmer
but he must have been dazed from
the effects of the blow, as he swam
a few strokes, almost in a circle, and
sank before help arrived, although
a launch was but a short distance
away, and hastened to the rescue
when those on board heard the
young lady's screams. The body
has not been recovered, although
several people have been "dragging
for it, and a diver was at work for
several hours.

The deceased was 20 years of age,
and had just completed his sopho-
more year at Stanford University,
returning home but a few days ago
for the summer vacation. He was
a young man of exceptionally fine
character, stood high in his studies,
and was a favorite among his
schoolmates, not only in this city
but at Stanford as well.
