To Orchardists.

Hood River, Or., June 1.—According to John C. White of Rickreall, Oregon, who has been here attending the state grange meeting and liked Hood River so well that he is remaining a day or two longer than his fellow members, woolly aphids, San Jose scale, codlin moth and all the bugs that trees are heir to, are doomed to extermination shortly by electricity. Mr. White is an enthusiastic horticulturist and claims that it will cost but \$5 per acre to render orchards immune from insects by his electrical apparatus. In company with a friend he is experimenting with the device, which he says, has produced wonderful results.

The method is to place in each orchard a small building in which a strong battery will be placed, and string wire about the orchard attaching them to each tree by a small staple and ground the end of the wire at its foot. All it is necessary to do then, is to touch the bottom and the slaughter of insects will be prodigious. Mr. White claims spraying machines will be put out of business when the appliances is put on the market and that the hardest work the fruitman is called on to do, "spraying" his trees, will be made so easy that he can sit on the piazza, press the button, and feel assured that there will be no worms in his apples or disease in his trees.—Journal.

Senator Morgan Dead.

Washington, June 11.—United States Senator John Tyler Morgan, of Alabama, died here tonight. John Tyler Morgan was born in Athens, Tenn., June 20, 1824, and was the oldest member of the United States Senate in point of years, with the single exception of his fellow senator from Alabama, Edmund W. Pettus. He had represented the state of Alabama in the United States Senate since 1877, having been unanimously elected to his sixth term in 1907.

Rush Work on Drain R. R.

Scottsburg, Or., May 31.—The Southern Pacific has begun operations in earnest for the rushing of the completion of the Drain-Coos Bay railroad. A large two story building erected to capacity with cement for the constructing of bridges and an area of over half an acre is covered to a height of ten feet with ninety-pound steel rails. Material for the building of eight iron trestle bridges has been rushed here and construction on them will commence immediately. It is thought that next fall will see the completion of the road to the town of Redport, on the Umpqua river.—Roseburg Review.

(DEL NORTE RECORD.)

Steps have been taken towards the incorporation of an electric road from Coos Bay to Roseburg, Oregon. About time for a move being made to connect Southern Oregon with Crescent City.

Wm. Chatham, who has the Lauff-Crusius ranch, in southern Curry county, leased, was here during the week attending to business. Mr. Chatham reported prosperous times in the neighborhood of Harbor.

The Watkins automobile party, here last week, arrived in Grants Pass at 4:30 o'clock on May 31st, the actual time from Eureka, via this place, to Grants Pass was nineteen hours. The distance is 197 miles, over a road that was in bad condition due to the late storms.

Among the Del Norte teachers who will attend the National Educational Association, to be held in Los Angeles next July, are: Miss Martha Childers of Roudy Creek school, Miss Madgalena Akelan of Crescent school and Miss Elizabeth Marshall of Pine Grove school.

(CRESCENT CITY NEWS.)

Mill one is sawing night and day and puts out an average of approximately 150,000 feet of lumber every 20 hours. At that rate it will keep the loggers hustling to supply both mills.

Tom Braden caught a large sea bass in his gill net set near the wharf, last Friday morning. It was a fine specimen and weighed 38 lbs. Sea bass are rarely seen in the Crescent Bay.

Three persons were killed and two others probably fatally injured in a runaway stage accident on Wednesday near Topy in southern Oregon. The stage was descending a grade when the horses became unmanageable and the vehicle was upset, falling on the top of its occupants. The driver, George Galbraith, and an Italian laborer and a man believed to be a commercial traveler, were killed. The other two passengers were wounded so severely that their recovery is not likely. The driver is said to have been intoxicated.

(COOS BAY NEWS.)

The official count of the vote cast at the late election in this county shows a majority of 432 for "wet." The number of voters who went to the polls was 2,694.

Mrs. Norris, widow of the late Thos. C. Norris, died at Coquille, June 4, aged 82 years. She was one of the respected pioneers of Coos county, having come here with her husband and family in 1848, settling on Burton Prairie. Her funeral took place at Fairview, where she was buried by the side of her husband.

The tug Wizard, which left the city on May 24th for Coos bay with the barkentine Northwest in tow, struck a submerged rock off Point Gorda, Wednesday, and sank almost immediately. The crew of six were saved, and were taken to San Francisco on the steamer City of Puebla. Point Gorda is 28 miles south of Humboldt. The Wizard was backing a strong nor-wester, and had gone close in shore, trying to make headway.

Schooner Bessie K. Adrift Off California Coast.

"The derelict gasoline schooner Bessie K. is still adrift in the Pacific ocean. Several weeks ago she was close to shore off Hecla Head and it was thought she would set in with the current, but somehow she drifted out to sea again and about 10 days ago was seen off the California coast on the course of the regular liners between San Francisco and Honolulu. The derelict was sighted by the steamship Sierra, which has just returned to the Bay City from the islands. The word "Bessie" could be indistinctly seen on the stern of the derelict, which lies bottom up. No attempt was made to board her. The Bessie K. has been adrift for many months. She capized off Coquille river while bound from that place to San Francisco with a cargo of lumber, and since then no word has been received from Captain Lazovitch and his crew of seven men. It is taken for granted that they were lost. Several attempts have been made to tow the derelict into port. The steam schooner Aurelia had a line on her for two days, but finally had to abandon the heavy drag."

Wireless Telegraphy at Blanco Cape.

Father Curley returned from a trip throughout his district Thursday. He had been gone several weeks and visited Bandon, Gold Beach, Wedderburn, Denmark and other places in Coos and Curry counties. Father Curley says that the wireless telegraph has been put in operation at Blanco and when he was there four messages had been received from passing ships, and one from Mare Island at San Francisco.

He says the receiving poles are one hundred and eighty feet high. When a message is expected it is necessary for the operator to sit for several hours at the instrument, with tubes from the delicate receiver in his ears listening for the little tick of the instrument. Ships returning from Alaska can now send a warning message a thousand miles before they are sighted and the delicate instruments will catch it as it flies thru the air and forward it to those waiting for news of her at Frisco.

The station is under the care of Mr. Edmonds.—Coos Bay Harbor.

Wireless Telephones.

New York, June 2.—The first wireless telephone system in the world is now being installed in the Hoboken station of the Delaware, Lackawanna & Western railroad. It is expected that by the end of next week active service with the West street offices of the company in New York will have begun.

Following the success of the experiment, Dr. Lee de Forest, the inventor, expects that tugs, ferry boats and ocean-going craft of all kinds will be equipped with the latest service. He is also planning to furnish all lighthouses and life-saving stations with his invention, which will do away with the elaborate system of code figures.

"While the eyes of the whole country have been centered on E. H. Harriman as the master and manipulator of the railroad world, a greater and more expensive combination of railroad interests has been in process of perfection, until now the plans are matured for the public declaration of this gigantic merger. More than a thousand million dollars of capital are involved, and the mileage of the new system will extend practically from the most northern point of the Atlantic Coast to the Gulf ports, with a network of tracks in New England, in the East and Middle West, and tapping the greatest freight-producing territory in the world. This colossal merger, when perfected, will be known as the Greater Pennsylvania system.—Ex.

New York City is Doomed.

Middletown, Conn., June 1.—"Uncle Horace" Johnson of Middle Hadden, known throughout New England as an accurate weather prophet, announces that all of Manhattan island and much of the adjoining territory will be destroyed by a great earthquake some time in August.

He says one half of New York city will sink into East river and the other half into North river and that the disturbance will entail the loss of thousands of lives. The damage to property naturally will be incalculable.

"Uncle Horace" as he is familiarly known, is about eighty years old. He has made a life long study of astronomy and the changes in the atmosphere. He predicted the great blizzard of 1883 and many other catastrophes, such as the recent earthquakes in San Francisco and Jamaica.

He says the coming earthquake has to do with the constant change in the equilibrium of the earth. He says further that he has known of the coming catastrophe for many years, but has not announced it until he made absolutely certain it will occur.—Ex.

New York, June 11.—Broadway, accustomed as it is to "schooner" will see one next month that will make it sit up and take notice, for Ezra Meeker will drive through it his ox-team and the original prairie schooner in which he went west in 1852.

Mr. Meeker, who is 22 years older than his prairie schooner, is on the way from his home in Puyallup, Wash., to Oyster Bay, L. I., to interest the President and through him the country in making an American boulevard of the old Oregon trail. He wants the old road between the Missouri River and the Pacific Coast perpetuated as a monument to the hardy pioneers whose sacrifices and enterprises made the settlement of the West possible. He expects to ask Congress to pass a bill at its next session appropriating the money for the preliminary survey.

The ox-team and schooner are now in Buffalo, but Mr. Meeker was at the home of William A. Lawrence in Jamaica, L. I., today completing arrangements for his visit to the President. He returned to Buffalo to rejoin his outfit as he calls it.

The outfit makes about 20 miles a day in good weather, and Mr. Meeker is always willing to stop and explain the object of his trip.—Oregonian.
