Port Orford Life Saving Station.

Captain D. F. Tozier, superin-
tendent of construction of the Life-
Saving Service on the Pacific Coast,
returned to the city yesterday
morning from an inspection trip
along the Washington coast. He
will leave today to inspect all sta-
tions on the Oregon coast and will
be away until July 20.

He stated yesterday that a call
for bids will be issued soon for a
new station at Port Orford, Or.,
and for another at Tillamook. An
interesting feature of improvements
in the coast service will be the use
of motor-power lifeboats, which
will be placed at nine different
stations on the Oregon and Wash-
ington coasts.

"The only power boat used in
the Pacific service at present is one
transferred from an Eastern station
to Cape Disappointment," said
Captain Tozier. "Orders have been
placed with Eastern firms for seven
new boats, which are now under
construction. They will be fitted
up in the most modern style for
life saving and equipped with en-
gines powerful enough to force
them through the strongest tides
and storms.

The use of the power boats will
be a vast improvement, because it
will leave the crew fresh for rescue
work when they reach a wreck. No
matter how strong a crew may man
a lifeboat, they are bound to be
somewhat exhausted with forcing a
boat against waves or tide, leaving
them working against odds."

Captain Tozier said that the
boats would be in readiness before
the end of Summer and would be
stationed at the most important
points on the coast.

Speaking of his recent inspection
trip, he stated that considerable
work was being done in the way of
improvements. He said that be-
fore he was through the life sta-
tions north of California would be
improved by about 50 per cent.—
Oregonian.

San Francisco, June 10.—With
a suddenness that startled the
courtroom, Francis J. Heney an-
nounced this afternoon that the
prosecution had completed its case
against Mayor Schmitz. The at-
torneys for the defense, caught by
surprise, asked the court for time
for consultation, and in a few mo-
ments J. C. Campbell, chief counsel
for the Mayor, stated that the de-
fense would put in its evidence in
quick time tomorrow, and he added
that, unless the cross-examination
were prolonged, the case would be
ready for argument by tomorrow
night.—Oregonian.

Murder and Pillage Rampant In Russia.

London, June 10.—A St. Peters-
burg dispatch to the Telegraph says
that the internal condition of
Russia is becoming more serious.
Murder is common; pillage has be-
come a means of livelihood and in-
cendiarism is but an expression of
the peasant's dissatisfaction with
the land owners.

Statistics show that during the
week ending Saturday, 158 persons
suffered. Eighty were killed and
78 wounded. In some of the
provinces organized gangs of terror-
ists are holding up travelers and
many acts of incendiarism are re-
ported.
