elected District Attorney at the

Coos and Curry congratulate him
upon his honors, wish him success,
and expect to see him in Congress
before many years, where his elo-
quence and genial nature will make
him a marked man.

Commissioner Sypher attended
County Court at Gold Beach last
week, and returned home Sunday.
He says that Judge Bailey and
Commissioner Cooley will come up
about the 20th, and look over the
survey of the proposed new road
between Sines river and Denmark.
It would be a good move to hold a
mass meeting at Dairyville when
the officials are there, and try to
harmonize road matters and decide
upon a definite future policy. Per-
haps a survey of the south end of
the proposed change, laying the
road straight through by Madden
and Zumwalt might be arranged,
provided of course, that it be near-
er and easier of construction. The
TRIBUNE advocates no special route
but it does favor a decent road some-
where. The adoption of a new
route or the improving of the old
one will suit us—only let something
be done before the horrors of last
winter's experiences in the "green
timber" be repeated.

On April 24th, last, an examina-
tion was held in San Jose, Cal., for
Postoffice-clerks and mail carriers
in that city. There were 23 appli-
cants, among them being two na-
tives sons of Curry Co.—Guy Merri-
man and W. F. Riley. Fourteen
passed successful examinations,
against nine who failed. We are
pleased to say that the names of
both the boys from old Curry are
among the successful 14. The ap-
plicants were examined in 7 differ-
ent branches, among which are
Arithmetic, Geography, Spelling
and Composition. All papers are
rated at Washington D. C., where
strict rules are enforced, as much as
24 per cent. being deducted for each
error in some branches. To suc-
cessfully pass the examination an
applicant must not fall below a
general average of 70.

Guy applied for a position as
Carrier, while Walter preferred that
of Clerk, but, as they must take
their turn among twelve others, as
vacancies occur, it may be months
before either secures the coveted po-
sition. The salary for Clerk and
Carrier is the same, being as fol-
lows:

\$800 for the first year.
800 for the second year.
900 for the third year.
1000 for the fourth year, and
1100 for the fifth year.
Clerks and Carriers work eight
hours a day and are allowed a vaca-
tion of 15 days each year, not in-
cluding Sundays.

Night Work for the Glass-House Boy.

Contrast life on the farm with
the life of the little glass house boy,
who every other week enters the fac-
tory at five o'clock in the evening,
sits at the feet of the glass blower
to open and shut the molds, stands
at his side to break off the soft, wax-
like glass from the end of the blow
pipe, or carries the hot ware from
the finisher to the annealing oven.
After a night of eight or nine hours
in this superheated factory this lit-
tle boy must go out into the raw,
cold morning to prepare himself by
sleep for another night of labor. To
compel young boys at the time of
life when body and mind are un-
dergoing their most rapid transfor-
mation to be employed at labor not
only exhausting in itself, but in-
volving a radical change in all the
habits each week, is to fasten upon
childhood an exertion not only in-
human in itself, but menacing to
our future social well-being.—Sec-
retary of the National Child Labor
