CURRENT TOPICS.

Editor Tribune:—By the time this reaches the light the great conspiracy at Boise City to murder an honest man will have produced its close with one result or another, but whatever the outcome, the public at large will be the final judge and must pass upon the total inadequacy of the testimony to connect Haywood with the crime witnessed by Harry Orchard, some of which were never committed by him as the testimony has abundantly shown.

And it may be as well to state right here that the first direct indication of bias on the part of the Court was when, the other day, Judge Wood excluded the deposition of Linforth, the owner of the building Orchard alleges that he blew up. Linforth had sworn that it was impossible for Orchard's story to be true, and the court struck out his testimony in an apparent effort to sustain Orchard's credibility. But it will be in connection with his charge to the jury, that the Court will show its hand, and let us hope that that charge will be fair and impartial.

The prosecution dwells upon the fact that the Federation assists in the defense of accused members. All organizations, even the churches lend themselves in aid of members to see that they have a fair trial and fair treatment. The United Workmen are just now taking a hand in the defense of Bowley, at Astoria charged with the murder of Jennings, and what right thinking person will say that the workman's order is a criminal organization because it seeks fair play for a brother. As well say that a father who employs counsel to defend his son thereby becomes himself a criminal.

Your strictures on the methods of the Oregonian in twisting and distorting the testimony in the Haywood case are well timed, but this was to be expected of the editor of that paper who is a disciple of Alexander Hamilton, who held that the laborer was well beneath contempt.

From the Portland Journal, however, better things would be expected until one remembers that it is backed and owned by the "First Families" of Portland.

The total failure of the prosecution to make a case has made them desperate, so they have proceeded to make arrests of defendants witnesses for alleged perjury, this to influence the jury and to excuse themselves before the public.

NEW YORK, July 16.—Charles Edward, carrying 126 pounds, made a new world's record for one mile and a furlong, when he won the Seagate stakes at Brighton Beach today. The son of Golden Carter and Flora Mae ran the distance in 1:50 3/5, which is two-fifths of a second faster than the best previous time made by Bonni-bert, a four-year old, which carried 120 pounds July 30, 1902.

He came here Sunday, suffering from heart trouble. A San Francisco physician, who had been summoned, arrived an hour after Blakeny died.

Prophetic Prognosis.

To any one conversant with the strike and commercial conditions of the world, it is self evident that England cannot much longer stand alone, without some really great power to lean upon. When the inevitable crash of nations, now near at hand shall come, England will find her Oriental alliances melted away. Lulled to sleep by the strains of "Rule Britannia," her statesmen bear not the tramp of hostile feet that are marching on them from every point of the globe, and their faith like fetish warships in a process that has been, has blinded them with a faith that may not be.

Of all the suicidal policies that England could have adopted, she entered into the most deadly, deaf to the danger-ramp approaching, and blind to omens plain as the "pillar of clouds by day, and of fire at night." By no possible twist of diplomatic conditions can she give a reason justifying continuing her deadly alliance with Japan, or any other Oriental power. She cannot force conditions there, and so long as Japanese commercial ships continue to increase at their present phenomenal pace, and a Japanese sailor can serve out an English sailor, there is not a dollar in sight for England, which is not rapidly gravitating to zero, or going into Japanese pockets.

The United States doesn't care for this trade, while our dollars find better investments at home. Long before we shall quarrel with Japan over the carrying trade, England will be run off the Pacific, or she will have thrashed Japan, and annihilated her ships of war and of commerce, and this she will have to do before five years shall have elapsed. Therefore let our people spank the San Francisco hoodlums, and keep quiet a little while, and the aroused Britons will be forced to take the fight off our hands in self preservation, despite her silly treaty of "Alliance with Japan." England's colonies will not tolerate a Japanese invasion, in times of peace or war; and if forced by an effete mother to become allies of the United States, they will then become independent republics, and the protecting shield of Uncle Sam and All America, will be thrown about them under a broader Monroe Doctrine, and their autonomy maintained.
