We learned from him that he will hereafter make his home near Santa Rosa, Cal., where he owns some valuable vineyard property. He says that coyotes are causing much trouble to sheepmen in the upper Coquille country, and that a great many sheep have been killed by them during the past few years. Mr. Hood left here for Myrtle Point, intending to start from there on horseback, via the coast route, to California.

Berlin, July 27.—Prince Henry of Prussia, who is a great admirer of Americans, believes that a great war between Yankees and Japs must come very soon, probably before the American squadron reaches the Pacific. Officially, of course, his lips are sealed, but privately he has discussed the matter quite freely.

The brother of the Kaiser thinks as do many others with him, that Americans are too prone to believe in the smooth words of the Japanese, and German consular reports from Japan seem to prove that Japan is preparing to strike a blow before the Atlantic fleet reaches San Francisco.

Patents to Be Issued.

Washington, July 19.—Senator Bourne has succeeded in securing an order from the general Land Office calling upon T. B. Neuhausen at Portland to submit an immediate report, giving a list of all suspended land entries in Oregon against which there are no facts of record in his office or within the knowledge of Government officials which warrant further suspension.

Mr. Neuhausen has also been instructed to make separate reports as to each entry against which there are charges warranting further suspension, all such reports to be submitted before September 1, 1907.

The Land Office is in accord with his views, and it is expected that numerous entries now suspended without cause will be released in the near future and started on their way to patent.

Under Secretary Hitchcock blanket suspensions were made on mere suspicion and all these blanket orders are being done away with as rapidly as possible.—Oregonian.
