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Bob Evans' great fleet of battle ships is soon to start around the Horn for this coast. We shall not worry much over a fleet commanded by Evans when Roosevelt is backing him. Of course we expect to see the fleet at Port Orford, which is the only deep water harbor between Fucus and the Golden Gate.

We have been exchanging with a Minneapolis paper for about two years, but have been unable in that time to discover whether or not it had any opinions on the great questions before our country, which it dares to express. We are glad to note however that a new hand is at the helm, who will have opinions and will support the masses against the classes, and fight with such men as "Roosevelt, Bryan, La Follette, Folk and Hughes," just as the Tribune is fighting. We are for good men wherever we find them and against bad men wherever they may appear.

Hon. R. D. Hanna has a good article in the Oregonian on the Salmon question in general, and particularly as applied to Rogue river, which our legislators and ignorant officials would do well to study and heed. We commend the article to the immediate consideration of the Governors of Oregon and Washington, who should recommend immediate and effective action by our officers where the law applies, and proper legislation where the law is defective. It is said that Chinooks are practically exterminated in the Columbia. Such will be their fate wherever stationary gear and dams are allowed, and the universal greed of man is not suppressed by a force that crushes.

A Naval Post.

The Chamber of Commerce of Portland has asked Senator Bourne to help them get a Naval Post on the Columbia river. There is but one harbor between the Golden Gate and the Straits of Fucus with water deep enough for battle ships, and that is Port Orford, and it is near the center of our coastline and in just the right place. We intend to invite the whole fleet to visit us when it arrives on this coast, and there will be no ditch to dig to get them into our magnificent harbor. Port Orford has been selected as the only place along our coast where a Harbor of Refuge can be built, because it is not only better sheltered, but has the proper depths of water—100 feet and more—necessary for permanency of such work. One Hundred and Fifty Thousand Dollars now lies in the National Treasury, appropriated to begin the work. When war with Japan ensues our Government will need Port Orford for a Naval base, and they will need it badly. Let our Congressmen point out the merits of a "War Station," and not waste their time in Utopian dreams of impossible schemes.

Roosevelt and Bryan.

The American people have quite generally come to the conclusion that they have two great men that they can trust; both open and bold in defense of the general welfare, both intensely loyal, and both able to meet the wildest foe, and whatever the exigencies of any situation may require.

Though they belong to different parties in name, they are united in all the great issues of the times, differing only on the tariff and the creation of a larger Navy. But this difference is important; and is a contest between the two would give Roosevelt every Independent Republican vote—and there are millions of them—from Maine to Oregon, unless Bryan modifies his views on both these propositions. And yet as against any other man than Roosevelt—with the possible exception of La Follette—these Independent voters would rally to Bryan's standard because they can trust him and have faith in his honesty, even though they differ from some of his policies.

Many of us differ radically with Roosevelt's attitude against State Rights; we condemn his administration of Land Matters under Hitchcock; his San Francisco fiasco, and his blunder in denouncing men as "undesirable citizens" when they had been unjustly imprisoned for 18 months, and were being tried for their lives. But while condemning these things, we know that no man is infallible, and that honest men make mistakes, and we can charitably forgive his errors and turn with pride and pleasure to the many grand and courageous achievements of national and international importance he has accomplished, or has under way. Only ungrateful hearts would deny him the praise that is his due.

Roosevelt is not only a man of words, but a man of deeds, and we have both in abundance to help us form a true estimate of his worth. And however lofty the pedestal upon which we may place him, Bryan looms up his equal, in all the qualities of virtuous greatness. The people love both, because of their enemies being the same, and because they can trust them. The greatest ruler in the world is one; and the greatest citizen is the other; and as Elijah's mantle fell not upon an equal, so there are none in their respective parties to wear the mantles of Roosevelt and Bryan.

One of these men will be our next President.

A Seditious Speech.

Brooklyn, Miss., July 27.—
"The Stars and Bars for me, away with the stars and stripes."

This statement was made by Governor James K. Vardaman here today before a shouting, howling audience that apparently coincided with his campaign speech.

"I had rather be living under the Stars and Bars today with Jefferson Davis as President than in the United States with President Roosevelt at the head of the Nation," continued the Governor.

"The Rebel rule was preferable to trust dictation. The man behind the plow is a nobler creature than the crooked politicians who pander to wealth."

Political opponents who heard Governor Vardaman declare that he is guilty of sedition in putting the Stars and Bars above the American flag.

CURRENT TOPICS.

Editor TRIBUNE:—The late rice riots in the State of Georgia speedily led up to the enactment of a drastic prohibition statute. It was discovered that it was in the saloons and doggeries and dives that lawless violence was incited; and prohibition will be vigorously enforced in Georgia, largely on ground that the stuff dealt out by the saloons under the name of whiskey has been "doctored" until, instead of making people drunk, it simply makes them crazy.

It was but recently that a business man at Vancouver, Wash., undertook to get evidence to assist in the enforcement of the Sunday closing law by visiting several saloons and taking a sly "nip" at each. The little stuff that he swallowed made him so crazy that he returned home and whaled his wife, was arrested and jailed, soon breaking out and, continuing his rampage, was finally overcome by a posse. Unaccustomed to drinking at all, and mixing the mixtures fixed him a plenty.

About all of the Southern States impose restrictions more or less severe on the sale of intoxicants. The State Dispensary devised by Governor Tillman (now U. S. Senator) gave promise for a time of the best results of any scheme up to that time devised, but greed for profits finally led the purchasing agents of the State to pad vouchers, a fraud made possible by collusion with the wholesalers, while retail sales agents were not backward in discovering that, in addition to their salaries, they could make big money by increasing the quantity of wet goods for which they had receipts to the State by adulterants.

The Dispensary law was repealed last year, and in very despair, its friends proclaimed that the handling of whiskey where profits are possible would debauch and corrupt and demoralize an angel right down from heaven.

When the Socialist party comes into power the whiskey business will be curtailed and as a consequence the appetite for intoxicants, by abolishing the element of profit. The adulteration of human foods will cease as soon as the same causes to yield profit.

For calling in question the correctness of a decision of the Supreme Court of Colorado the editor of the daily News was fined \$1,000, yet nobody in Colorado or else where doubts that that Court is as corrupt as the Corporations want it to be.
