CURRENT TOPICS.

Editor TRIBUNE:—Thirty-five thousand men and women assembled at Luna Park Chicago the other day to greet William D. Haywood, who was present in response to the urgent request of the working people. Nothing has happened during the century which so promoted the sense of solidarity among the toilers as the kidnapping of the leaders of the Western Federation followed by the diabolical attempt to rail road them to the gallows, which fact reminds us of the aphorism: "Whom the gods would destroy they first make mad!"

The Wall Street Journal says that the acquittal of Haywood should silence the claim that a poor man has no show for justice in any of our courts. That paper would conceal the fact that while, personally, Haywood was a poor man, the fair minded, honest people of the world made his cause rich in resources for his defense by their generous contributions to a defense fund amounting to more than a quarter of a million dollars. But for this fact what show would he have had for his life against the conspiracy of the Mine Owners' Association backed up and promoted by two states.

And Colorado officials still pursue Haywood with venom and hate notwithstanding his triumphant acquittal at Boise. Governor Buchtel was absent from Denver on the night that Haywood and family were to arrive at the Union depot which is graced by a great "Welcome" Arch lighted by electricity, and telegraphed to Mayor Speer to turn off the lights before the arrival of the train, which he promptly did. The action was pusillanimous and contemptible, and Governor Buchtel is a Methodist Minister!

The Bandon Recorder is inclined to be severe on the striking telegraphers, without, I think, due consideration of the facts involved. The demands of the strikers seem reasonable to the ordinary mind. In brief they are for slight increase of compensation; for abolition of the rule which requires operators each to furnish a typewriter; for a discontinuance of the unjust discrimination against women and girl operators in the matter of wages.

The Recorder intimates that the strike was instigated by "agitators" and what if it was yet in this case such was not the fact. The great increase in the cost of living and the requirement that the poorly paid operators furnish typewriters would seem to furnish a sufficient

Viking ships with a Viking krig and old time warriors togged in the costume of a thousand years ago will arrive in Astoria from mysterious parts at the Regatta and Community Fair to be held at Astoria September 2, 3 and 4.

With a burst of old Norse songs, accompanied by the swish of oars, banked in solid rows, two ships of the old pagan days will glide into the harbor to greet thousands of people on barges and in a huge grandstand at the foot of 11th street.

The members of the Oregon State Editorial Association, hundreds of trained singers, and two or three thousand visitors connected with the Norwegian Sing-fest of the Northwest, which holds a three day celebration in co-operation with the regatta, will be present.

All the railroads and steamboats in the coast states will give special excursion rates to Astoria for the big six-day celebration, which will draw the largest crowds of any event ever held at the mouth of the Columbia.

Strike Over, Says Clowery

New York, Aug. 15.—General of floors of the two telegraph companies said today that business was moving to all parts of the country and that no difficulty in handling everything offered. President Clowery of the Western Union said: "The strike is over. We are receiving applications from strikers today, but we are filled up and cannot place them."

The Associated Press service is moving under steadily improving conditions. Officers of the Union still express confidence and deny that any union operators have applied for re-employment.
