The Wedderburn Races.

There were many features con-
nected with the races at Wedder-
burn which we should like to dis-
cuss, and under other conditions
would gladly have done so, but now

The location of the track is ideal
in many ways, with fine water and
lovely camping grounds. But the
course, being new, was heavy and
the turns so sharp as to be objec-
tionable to any high speed horses.
In another year, when the ground
is packed, conditions will be better,
but unless the turns are improved
the track will not be favorable for
fast times.

The Southern Pacific is planning
to put on a special express and
mail train between San Francisco
and Portland. Such a system
would do away with delayed mails
as has been the trouble here for
some months.

A comet is now visible, and a
number of our citizens have ob-
served it. The Lick observatory
reports it on the northern border
of the constellation of Orion, and
that it should reach its maximum
brightness for terrestrial observers
in the latter half of August. The
comet should be looked for about
half past 3 o'clock in the morning,
just a little north of east and a
quarter of the distance from the
horizon to the zenith. It will read-
ily be seen that the head is unlike
a star in that it is hazy in appear-
ance.

The joint teachers' institute of
Coos and Curry counties convened
in the Bandon High School room
at 9 o'clock on Tuesday morning.
Supt. Bunch of Coos and Supt.
Johnston of Curry counties are
both in attendance. The institute
opened with about one hundred
teachers present. The instructors
employed are Supt. Robinson of
Multnomah, Prof. Traver of Port-
land and President Mulkey of the
Ashland State Normal. After a
few preliminary announcements by
Supt. Bunch and the enrollment
of the teachers, the regular work
of the session was taken up without
loss of time. In order to better
meet the needs of all, the institute
was divided into two sections for
work. Primary and Advanced.
Prof. Traver occupied the first pe-
riod with an exercise in music. He
gave some very helpful and sensible
suggestions on the teaching of vo-
cal music in the public schools,
and aroused much interest among
the teachers on the subject of music.

(COOS BAY NEWS)
Bishop Scadding, while paying
his yearly visit to the Episcopal
churches of Coos and Curry counties
took photographic views of all
points of interest from Scottsburg
to Rogue river to use in his work
in the East to interest people in the
needs of the Episcopal church in
this state. He has had lantern
slides made of the views and they
will not only interest the people in
the work of the church, but will al-
so be a factor in advertising the
state and getting people to think of
the great possibilities that lay
dormant in our midst, better
than common advertising circulars.
The Bishop used this method sev-
eral years ago when he was request-
ed by the Archbishop of Canter-
bury to come to England and de-
liver a series of lectures in the dif-
ferent cities of that country on the
growth of the Episcopal church in
the United States.

W. C. Herring, chief engineer of
forest service, has just completed
an inspection of the Southern Ore-
gon forest reserves and has approved
the several improvements pro-
posed for this district. He has in-
structed Superintendent M. J. An-
derson of the Siskiyou reserve, who
has headquarters in Grants Pass,
to proceed at once to build tele-
phone lines, roads and trails. Sev-
eral telephone lines will be strung
this fall, wire being now on the
way here. One line will extend to
the Oregon caves, another to the
Blue Lodge mining district of Siski-
you county, California, and anoth-
er to Kerby and extended to the re-
mote Chetco mining region of Cur-
ry county. The proposed wagon
road down Rogue river to the Bear
Camp region received the hearty
approval of Mr. Herring. It is now
being surveyed and will be built as
soon as the route is selected. A
good trail will be extended from
the end of this road to Gold Beach.
This will give the isolated region of
the lower Rogue river country a
more direct route to the interior.
The mail will no doubt be carried
over this shorter route in prefer-
ence to the long mountain trail
from West Fork, and in this one
respect will be a great convenience
to the people of that region, as
more than a week is now required
to make the round trip from Grants
Pass to Gold Beach.
