CURRENT TOPICS.

Editor TRIBUNE:—One of the points of a better day is the fact that the farmers are organizing themselves into Unions, and in many states are affiliating on economic lines with the labor organizations of the cities. A late meeting of the State Federation of Farmers in Kansas passed a resolution requesting the farmers at large to purchase only such goods as bear the Union Label of the industrial crafts manufacturing same.

Since Bailey, the erstwhile Democratic idol of Texas has been proved a despicable creature of Standard Oil, the Socialists have greatly alarmed the Democratic bosses of that state by their aggressive attitude, so they, (the bosses) have put organizers in the field to save the young men from falling victims to the wiles of "soap boxes" who are daily becoming more numerous and daring.

Where Our Fleet will Coal.

Our fleet of battleships, from the Atlantic to the Pacific will probably not come in a single great squadron but in sections. The average time of the vessels is expected to be about fifty-eight days. About 14,000 miles will be the distance, reckoning San Francisco as the Western terminus. They will take coal enough at the east to steam them to the middle route 2,000 miles, where they will receive from colliers a new supply sufficient to carry them to Rio de Janeiro, 3,000 miles further. In the straits of Macellan, 2,400 miles from Rio, they will meet colliers dispatched in advance, which will supply them with coal sufficient for their consumption to Callao, about 2,700 miles. At Magdalena Bay, 3,000 miles from Callao, they will take coal again, sufficient for steam to San Francisco. The estimate for the voyage, not including that which they will take on starting, is 100, 800 tons.

Lives to Age of 94.

Y. W. Moon, pioneer of Coos Co., who died recently was born at Morgantown, Pa. April 25, 1813, being 94 years old at death. He went to Kansas when a young man and enlisted in the Union army. There he also met and married Miss Nancy Finn, in 1833. After the war was over he moved to California, where he remained until 1875, when he came to Coos county and settled on a farm at Fairview. He was a member of General Lytle Post, and had been a life long Oddfellow. He was father of ten sons and one daughter. The daughter with four sons and their mother survive him. He leaves property to his aged wife valued at \$25,000.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14.—In connection with the procurement of the large amount of labor necessary on the Pacific Coast to make the repairs on the battleship fleet when it reaches California next year, the Navy Department is considering a proposition which will undoubtedly cause a great stir among the labor unions on the Coast. This is to induce eastern laborers to go there by giving them and their families free transportation provided they contract to remain in the Government service a certain length of time. Of course higher wages must be paid than are common in the East, as a necessary feature of the plan.
