With her lumber and wheat and wool and fruit and milk and other matchless resources, and with no State debt, Oregon is in the best financial condition of all our states; and has more of all things that makes life worth living.

The whole state is short on school books and the Governor is threatening to sue the contractors. If it will only bring about an entire separation of our common schools from all others and the abolishment of a State series of text books, it is worth all that it will cost in dollars and temporary annoyance.

Our government unlawfully giving control of money to our so called "National" Banks, is the cause of the late flurry in Wall Street; but there is no use in our saying so for men will not study our iniquitous Banking System, under which a few rich men can precipitate a panic whenever they please by going "a-gunning," as they call it.

It is said that the late disasters in the Stock markets have entailed a loss of over three billion dollars to the stock gamblers. But this is mostly based on watered stock and fictitious values, while there has been no loss of real values. The panic is now about over and while many eastern gamblers are ruined, the West has not been touched by the financial storm, and the middle West only in a slight degree.

For fear of a run on Oregon banks Gov. Chamberlain proclaimed a five days holiday in order that the banks could prepare for emergencies. The wisdom of his doing so has been questioned and no doubt the Governor wishes he hadn't done so. His authority for so doing is questioned, but not his motive. These runs and panics would be impossible if our banks were really National as they ought to be, thus keeping the control of money in the hands of Government where it constitutionally belongs.

Senator Fulton made a mistake in hobnobbing with Cook Bay and ignoring Bandon and Port Orford, the latter being the most essential one to improve on the entire Pacific coast, not only as a Harbor of Refuge, but as a coaling station for our Navy. Fulton has never seen Port Orford and if he really desires to serve the best interests of the state and nation he should have come here and seen for himself. Our voters will resent indifference; and the chances are that Fulton's "Cook Bay gushings" will cost him more votes than he has gained.

CURRENT TOPICS.

Editor TRIBUNE:—In matters of Oregon history, writers ought to strive for accuracy, and especially does this need to apply to biographical sketches of pioneers, who have paved the way to the beyond. I was personally well acquainted with the late Anthony (quite generally called "Tony") Noltner, in fact I was for a time associated with him in a publishing enterprise at Salem late in the 80's. He is erroneously credited by one of his biographers as having been connected with the publication at Corvallis of the "Occidental Messenger" along with the late U. S. Senator James H. Slater. It was the "Corvallis Union" that they issued in the early 80's, later to fall into the hands of Pat Malone a brilliant writer of very strong anti administration bent, which led to the exclusion of his paper from the mails, whereupon a "pony express" was organized which for a brief while distributed it. I arrived by wagon in Oregon in the spring of 1883, soon after the "Union" retired from the field, and, stopping over night with a family of the name of English in southern Polk county, I was much amused by the following refrain exalted by a young lady, daughter of the household: "We're bound to have the news, And Pat Malone's the man, We'll feed his oats and hay To carry it through the land." Mr. Noltner was a typo in the Union office when it ceased publication, he then went to Oregon City, and first in company with Joaquin Miller and later with James O'Meara, issued the Eugene City Review, an ably edited paper, albeit somewhat radical in its political tone.

I think the statement that the Review was at one time denied access to the mails is an error, anyway it was given some Federal patronage in 1884 in the way of a lengthy advertisement booming the 7-30 bonds (payable in seven or thirty years at the pleasure of the government.) In these advertisements U. S. Treasurer Spinkney stated with definiteness that these bonds were intended to pass from hand to money; and it was more than a suspicion that the circulating medium feature of these bonds moved the financier's to demand the calling in and retirement of this currency at the earliest possible moment allowed by law.

Late in 1885 or early in 1886 Mr. Noltner formed a co-partner with Urban E. Hicks and the late C. B. Bellinger and moved the Review plant to Salem where he was met with the plant of the Washington Democrat moved hence by Mr. Hicks, a first class printer besides being a man of more than average culture. It was here that Bellinger, Hicks & Noltner issued the Oregon Arena. The paper was, from the start, very outspoken in its exposure of official misfeasance especially in the State department. Tom Patton, son-in-law of E. N. Cook, State Treasurer, one bright morning took it upon himself to resent some strictures of the Treasurer for alleged speculations in Soldiers' Bounty Bonds, and hid himself up to the editorial office of the Arena in Moore's Block in search of Bellinger, slipping in and attacking him from behind as he sat at his desk. Bellinger, always active as a cat, and the very embodiment of personal courage, sprang to his feet and closed with his early caller, landing him upon his back with a loud thud on the floor, which unusual racket attracted Seth Hammer from his abstract office across the hall, to the spot, in time to save Patton from a part of the beating his rashness had invoked.

As to the Occidental Messenger, that was gone before Tony's time in Corvallis. It had been financed by the late J. C. Avery, to advocate the ratification of the separate clause attached to our State constitution providing for the legalization of slaves in Oregon. Mr. Avery in-

stalled a stalwart printer from Mississippi, a breezy if not a learned writer, named L. P. (Loverick Pierce) Hall or editor, and Bush in his Salem Statesman dubbed him "Long Primer Hall," a name that stuck, as was usual with nick names bestowed by Bush, now a millionaire banker.

It will be remembered that when the slave power was in the saddle, it accomplished its ends by the bluff of "disunion." That power as Lincoln predicted would be the case, was succeeded by the money power, and this power has been more arrogant and domineering than its predecessor, and the club it has used with marvelous success has been the threat of a "business panic!"

And the business panic of no small proportion is here, and the only thing which will save the United States from a disastrous collapse is the large crop produced this year by our farmers.

The banks and bankers in all our centers of activity are having recourse to one subterfuge and another to hold on to the peoples' deposits whether or not, while Secretary Cortelyou rushes to the front, with \$25,000,000 "deposits" in addition to the \$178,000,000 held by the National Banks already of the peoples' money without interest.

And what are National Banks doing with this money? They are making "call loans" at from 60 to 100 percent interest, wherefore these National Banks have at all times the strongest personal motives for precipitating a money panic.

J. Frank Watson, President of the Merchants National at Portland, and who not so long ago shouted until he was black in the face that we had plenty of money and that the Populists who evolved the quantitative theory of money were crazy "calamity howlers," now comes to the front in the Oregonian with the plaint that there is not sufficient circulating medium to handle the business of the country though we now have, thanks to the new gold, \$33.60 per capita against \$19 when the Pope were demanding more money and had misery.

And so it goes. The claims of the great Populist Party are being vindicated in many ways right along, until now, even the Wall Street Journal confesses that the Populist claim was more than theory,—that it was actually a "quantitative fact!"
