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One Day for Bathing in Mexico.

Only one country in the world has a national bathing day, and that is Mexico. The day is the 14th of June, and in the 24 hours so designated every one in the republic, from President Diaz down to the commonest servant, is expected to take a good wash. Unnumbered thousands allow no water to touch their persons except on this occasion, known as St. John's day.—Chicago Chronicle.

Washington.—By utilizing the depleted vermiform appendix to introduce quinine solution directly into the intestines, the surgeons at Washington barracks hospital believe they have found a sure method of curing tropical dysentery, the scourge of the army in the Philippines.

This mysterious organ is reached by means of an incision in the wall of the abdomen. It is then drawn out through the incision. The next step is to inject through the appendix into the large intestine a solution of quinine, flushing the lower intestines with a germicidal and healing stream without affecting the stomach or interfering with its functions.

The treatment has been employed successfully in the case of Sergeant Mould, of the engineer corps, who is recovering in the barracks hospital here from a severe attack of dysentery, contracted while in the Philippines.

London.—Every fortieth person resident in England and Wales is a pauper, supported at the expense of the rates. In London one person in every 36 is a pauper.

Such is the startling fact shown in a return of pauperism in England and Wales issued recently by the local government board by order of the house of commons.

The figures given show the number of persons in receipt of relief at the end of January to have been \$23,254, the highest total on record since 1877. Only once in the intervening 32 years was the number above \$20,000. This was in 1881, when the total reached \$24,519.

During the last five years there has been a steady increase not only in the number of paupers, but in the percentage to the population. The figures were as follows:

The total for this year was divided into 259,346 indoor and 541,568 outdoor paupers, or, in other words, one person in every 125 living in England and Wales was in the workhouse.

In London the number of paupers was 128,162, or one in every 36 of the population. The total in the largest city since 1871, when there were 164,426 paupers, or one in every 32 of the population, which has approached only where near to this year's total was 1636, and then the number only reached 125,435.

Unlike the average for the whole country, the majority of London's paupers were in the workhouses, the figures being: Indoor paupers, 71,493; outdoor paupers, 56,669.

For the purposes of comparison London is divided into five districts. It is in the south that the largest number of paupers are to be found, but it was in the east where the largest increase took place. The figures, compared with those of the previous year, are as follows:

The only provincial district to show a decrease in the number of paupers this year on the figures for last year was the south-western, which covers the counties of Wilt, Dorset, Devon, Cornwall and Somerset.

STUNDISTS ARE COMING.

Army of 200,000 from Russia Preparing to Settle in Canadian Northwest, Says Report.

Ottawa.—Canada is to be invaded by a peaceful army of Russian Stundist immigrants. The report that some 200,000 of these people are preparing to emigrate this year and settle in the Canadian northwest is exciting unfavorable comment in the press of this country.

There are leaders of public opinion in the Dominion who, having the experience of the United States before them, regard with serious misgivings the steady annual increase of the foreign element in the population of Canada. But the present prospect of hundreds of thousands of European immigrants swarming like locusts over the choice western lands is now giving Canadians something to think about in regarding the policy of populating the Dominion.

During the early part of the winter the arrivals of Russian Jews is usually large numbers gave the Canadian authorities very serious trouble. The invasion, therefore, by this new immigrant army of 200,000 persons, although they are described as Slavagical and Protestant, can only inspire officials and others with feelings of apprehension, if not dismay.

Canadian, on the other hand, hail with much satisfaction the reports telling of the continued increase of the movement of people from the American border states into the Canadian west.

First Tissue Paper.
