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MUCH U. S. COIN IN CANADA Dominion Business Men Rise Against Inroad of American Currency— Effort to Drive It Back. The uprising of Canadian business men to expel American coins from the circulation of the dominion was largely directed at first against the "cartwheel" dollar, which seems to be much more common there than it is here, says the Boston Transcript. Now the movement comprehends all United States coin. Our money is no more legal tender in Canada than Canadian money is here, but along the border it has been tolerated on account of popular convenience. Similarly in upper New Hampshire, in Vermont, and in some districts of Maine one comes across Canadian silver and bills in circulation and storekeepers make accumulations of both to meet local demands. There is a French Canadian element, more or less transient, to be catered to, and in Woodville and in some other places thereabouts the shops display signs in English and French.

But Canada being smaller cannot afford continued toleration of a practice that makes little impression in the United States. To get American coins out once and for all, a new Canadian coinage of nickel has been proposed. Some of the advocates of this suggestion have even urged nickel quarters. Judging from Canadian papers this is going too far to meet the approval of business men who, while admitting the convenience of nickels for small coins, believe that the difference in intrinsic value between the two metals must limit its usage in coinage. Canadians fear the general employment of nickel would have a debasing effect on the whole currency. Possibly there would not be so much of an organized effort on behalf of nickel coinage if it were not for the fact that Sudbury, Ont., is the only place in North America in which this metal is produced. There may be an artificially designed "nickel boom" under all this agitation.

TOSS COIN TO NAME CIVITY Seattle Man Now Owns Penny Which Gave Portland, Ore., Its Present Cognomen. Frank W. Pettigrove, of Seattle, has the penny that named the city of Portland, Ore. On the toss of this coin depended the question whether the Willamette metropolis should be known as Portland or Boston. Twice the coin turned "tails," and the town was named after Portland, Me., the former home of Mr. Pettigrove's father, relates the Seattle Times.

A. L. Lovejoy, of Massachusetts, a member of the party that laid out Portland, desired to name it Boston, after the most important city in his state. Pettigrove wanted to name it Portland, after the most important city in Maine, his native state. They agreed to toss a penny, heads to mean Boston, tails to mean Portland, the best two in three to be the choice. Pettigrove won the first toss; Lovejoy won the second, and the third proved to be tails, and Portland it was.

The younger Pettigrove still has the identical penny and would not take any amount of money for it. His father kept it for a pocket piece, and it has been handed down to the son who bears his father's name. It is dated 1835, and is one of those large coins in vogue at that time, about the size of the quarter of the present day. King Entombed in Wax. King Edward I. of England died July 7, 1307, and 400 years later the English Society of Antiquarians opened his tomb in order to find out if he really had been buried in wax, as the legend ran. The chronicler of the Times remarks: "To their great astonishment they found the royal corpse to appear as represented by the historian." Although "the skull appeared bare, the face and hands seemed perfectly entire." The king was found to be six feet two inches in length, thus fully justifying his nickname of Longshanks.
