never be able to run again.

A fatal accident occurred last
Thursday at Adolphsen's mill on
Elk river, by which Ernest E. War-
nick aged 17 years, lost his life. He
was standing near the cutoff saw
when the end of a plank struck him
in the left upper abdomen, knock-
ing him down. He immediately
arose and said that he was not se-
riously hurt, and nobody thought he
was; but during the night he grew
worse, and the next morning he was
taken to his home a few miles away,
where, continuing to get worse, Dr.
Tyler was called, but by that time
the patient was vomiting blood, and
all that could be done was to ease
the terrible agony he suffered. Dr.
Mann was also sent for, but before
his arrival Friday night, the suffer-
er had passed away.

The young man was the son of
Mrs. Pickett, wife of E. J. Pickett
the photographer. A large crowd
of sympathizing friends attended
his burial Sunday afternoon in the
Port Orford cemetery, Atty. Hall,
a neighbor, conducting the services.
This makes a loss of three young
lives in three years at this mill, al-
though some evil genius had thrown
their spell upon it. To the be-
lieved parents and relatives of the
deceased, the TRIBUNE extends its
