They started Thursday for Coos Bay again, but when about two miles north of Cape Blanco the machinery again belked and they were forced to return to Port Orford where once more they repaired their destination which was reached all right. This is said to be the usual experience with new gasoline engines when bucking the rough waves of the ocean.

The Curry county people at Los Angeles as witnesses, expect to be landed by steamer at Port Orford this week.

Commissioner Sypher arrived at Port Orford Saturday on his return from a session of County court at Gold Beach. The Radium is still throwing its "boomerangs" he says.

R. D. Hume had his noted horse "Skipper" and a thoroughbred mare shipped on the steamer Bandon, to be landed here if weather permitted. While Skipper will not be able to run this year, they expect that he can do so next year.

Van Dusen has been ousted as Fish Warden and H. C. McAllister of Portland, a two-year-old Oregonian, who is said to be ignorant of salmon propagation, has been appointed in his place. There is something wrong at Salem, else such appointment could not be.

Dr. Tyler was called last week to see Miss Katie Fromm at Brush creek, and found her condition so serious that he had Dr. Mann called, and the latter believes that it is scarlet fever, which will be determined soon. The patient was doing well when last heard from.

Three of Uncle Sam's warships passed over the coast last Thursday and were so near shore that our people enjoyed the sight. In case of war they will have to make Port Orford a coaling station, and it is a short sighted policy that keeps them away from this only deep harbor in time of peace.

Anderson Lamb, Marvin Hawkins and several other Coquille men spent a day or two in Port Orford last week hunting for timber locations in the lately approved Byer's survey, but as the land has about all been claimed by squatters for some time, it is doubtful if any new locations can be found.

Telegrams received here state that the Curry county witnesses at Los Angeles started home Sunday, and will probably be here by the middle of the week. It will be some time before the decision in the Land Fraud case will be made and whatever way it goes the case will be appealed, it is said, to the Supreme Court of the United States. Time flies, but not in Judicature.

Newt and Ed Divilbiss were in town the first of the week on business, contesting the claim of some timber locator who is trying to get all the mineral grounds on Sixes river as timber land, despite the fact that some of the ground has been worked to some extent for 40 years or more. The cost of putting on water has prevented the full development of these claims, which are known to be rich.

Hon. R. D. Hume arrived in Port Orford Sunday on his way to Wedderburn. He looks well, and reminds one of a live wire with his overflowing energy.

Politically he is an aspirant on the Republican ticket for Joint Senator for Coos and Curry, and if Ross does not run it is believed that Hume will receive a large majority of the votes cast in this county, in consequence of his fight with Chamberlain and Van Dusen over the protection and propagation of salmon, on which subject he is the best authority on this coast. We will have more to say on this topic next week.

Mr. Hume says that the Berwick is a wreck, that the engines will be used in two small boats which he will build, and that with the Enterprise and these new vessels he will be able to do all his business at Rogue and Klamath rivers, and make Port Orford his main shipping point. His cold storage plant will be erected here as soon as possible.

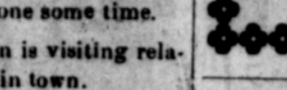
