 The unemployed in the United

CURRENT TOPICS.
EDITOR TRIBUNE—Pawa shops
 have multiplied at an astonishing
 pace in the cities since the indus-
 trial world has been turned topsy
 turvy by the criminal manipula-
 tions of the sort of people that Abe
 Lincoln took delight in designating
 "respectable scoundrels." Like the
 vultures that they are, pawbrokers
 are attracted always to the scenes
 of despair and tragedy.

The Penrose Senate bill, which
 was introduced to give the Postmas-
 ter General authority to suppress any
 publication that the "interests"
 might point out as objectionable,
 died an ignominious death as the
 result of members of both Houses
 of Congress being deluged with let-
 ters bearing curses both loud and
 long against it. One Congressman
 from Missouri was the recipient of
 2,000 of such letters. The popular
 frenzy over the matter was instigated
 chiefly by the Appeal to Reason, the
 most cordially hated paper since
 the days of the New York Tribune's
 fiercest agitation. The agitation of
 the Appeal offends the money power,
 while that by Horace Greeley maddens
 the slave power frantic.

As an example of Greeley's out-
 spoken courage in his anti-slavery
 fight, I append the following verses
 which appeared in the Tribune on
 the occasion of the capture of a
 runaway slave at Boston and his
 deportation in a U. S. Revenue cut-
 ter, and which verses became
 history:
 All hail the flaunting lie!
 The Stars grow pale and dim;
 The stripes are bloody scars,
 A lie the flaunting hymn.
 It shields the pirate's deck;
 It binds a man in chains,
 It yokes the captive's neck
 And wipes the bloody stains.
 Tear down the flaunting lie!
 Half-mast the starry flag.
 Insult no sunny sky
 With hate's polluted rag.
 Destroy it ye who can:
 Deep sink it on the waves,
 It hears a fellow man
 To groan with fellow slaves.


An outburst like the above in the
 Appeal to Reason now, would land
 its editor in the penitentiary for
 the crime of treason, and it was
 this paper that the Penrose Bill of
 infamous memory was aimed at.

And Greeley's characterization of
 the Judges of the U. S. Supreme
 Court because of the Dred Scott de-
 cision was something frightful in
 the line of invective, and yet he
 was not arraigned for contempt. It
 remained for the Supreme Court of
 Colorado to cinch Editor Patterson
 for a very mild criticism. So, it
 will be seen, that we are progressing
 slowly.
