Explanatory.
As some of our readers will doubtless wonder why a re-hearing for the county printing did not take place at the April term of Court, we offer a few words by way of explanation.
When the Globe was made the official organ of the county, the Tribune believed that it had been "deprived of work to which it was justly entitled, and a canvass of a portion of the county confirmed this belief, inasmuch as it revealed names that were fraudulently sworn in as bona fide paid subscribers, who were not, and never had been subscribers, as the sweener was well aware. Rate cutting was resorted to, where one man is paying \$1.50 his neighbor pays but 75 cents, and to such matters the over zealous editor of the Globe went so far as to "double up," counting the same name more than once.
While we have absolute proof of the above, it is only in the form of signed statements and as sworn affidavits would be necessary to successfully contest it, would necessitate an expenditure larger than the return warrants, and we therefore waive our rights until the succeeding January, but in doing so we wish to thank our many friends who assisted in collecting the evidence we have of the unscrupulous methods used by the Globe editor to secure a smallittance of dollars and cents and personal gratification, even though it cost integrity and honor to do so.

How Trusts Grow.
A financial deal of considerable importance to San Francisco and California, which will practically place all the gas, electric light and power companies of Central and Northern California in one basket, the contents of which will be controlled by the Standard Oil interests, has recently been consummated in San Francisco and in the East. The deal amounts to \$45,000,000 in the aggregate, and one of its results is to introduce, in effect, more than \$6,000,000 of new money into the lighting and power enterprise of the state. The initial step made public of this gigantic deal was a mortgage of the deed of trust for \$45,000,000 from the California Gas & Electric Corporation to the Union Trust Company of San Francisco in January last, merging and consolidating the interests and properties of all the gas and electric lighting and power companies of San Francisco and Northern California, and giving control of the gas and electric plants of 25 counties in the state.—Ex.
