

COASTING IN HOT WEATHER
 Vehicles in the Island of Madeira
 Slips Over Cobblestones—
 Drawn by Oxen.

At Funchal, in the Island of Madeira, the traveler finds one of the strangest kinds of vehicles that the world affords. He sees waiting quietly near the wharf a number of sleds with sleek dun-colored oxen yoked to each, says Everybody's Magazine. It is always high summer time in Madeira, and to see a conveyance which he has ever associated with snow and ice and zero weather is at first disconcerting. The stranger rubs his eyes and asks what those things are for, but he soon finds that they are public hacks, and that unless he cares to walk the must step inside, escape himself on the cushioned seats, and wait for the driver to prod his slow steed with the goad that he always carries. Very soon the vehicle begins to slip, slowly to be sure, but surely, over the smooth little cobblestones with which the streets are paved. At any particularly difficult turn of the road, or when coming to a rise of ground the driver places a little bag of grease under the front of the runners, which makes it comparatively easy for the sturdy steers to pull the sled.

Even up a long steep hill these oxen will slowly make their way. In coming down again no such tedious process is used, but getting into a wide finely upholstered sled with wicker sides, the passenger trusts himself to the tender mercies of more or less villainous looking guides as steersmen. Each one of them holds a rope tied to the back of the sled, and when the boggan, as it is often called, gets to jumping and bounding too hilariously, the guides jump off and pull with all their might at the ropes.

FIND MISSING LINK IN SEA.
 Denies of the Deep Ranking Between Vertebrates and Invertebrates Located.

A remarkable little denizen of the deep which belongs to the interesting border and lying between vertebrates and invertebrates, is the lancelet. Long considered a fish, it is now regarded as more nearly related to the sea squirts. Among its many peculiarities is the absence of any distinct head; the position of the mouth on the under surface of the anterior end of the body, and the ring of tentacles with which the opening of the mouth is surrounded. Many kinds of lancelets are now known, all save one of which conform more or less closely to the general type. The exception is a species long represented by a single specimen taken during the scientific cruise of H. M. S. Challenger in the open sea. But recently a number of others have been found, serving to show that it is a distinct type. Its mouth is on one side of the body, there is no ring of tentacles fringing the mouth opening, and there are several other oddities in its makeup.

The prince of Monaco, a devotee of deep sea curiosities, has found luminous shrimps living at great depths where all is dark. When put in an aquarium they lose their light-giving properties. It is said that probably most, if not all, deep sea creatures are luminiferous or phosphorescent, some of them diffusing light from the general surface of the body and others from special organs.

Changes on the Moon.
 The old idea that changes are taking place on the moon has been carefully investigated by M. Pisslux, a French astronomer. Going over all records, from the earliest observations to the latest, he concludes that the reality of the supposed changes has not been proven, and that the varying sensitiveness of the retina for faint objects is sufficient to account for differences seen, while different conditions of exposure might explain all the appearances in the photographs.

Cocooned Pearl.
 A vegetable pearl found in cocoons is frequently of good size and color and is hard to distinguish from the oyster pearl. They consist of pure carbonate of lime without a trace of salts or other vegetable matter. The natives of North Borneo wear them as a charm against disease and evil spirits.
