For over a hundred years our government has been taking power out of the hands of the people; but now the people who created the power, are taking it away from government and this time they will keep it.

It is claimed that many Democrats registered in Oregon as Republicans in order to nominate Cake, whom they believe they can defeat with Chamberlain. The Republicans will stay with Cake however.

The President has asked Congress for four battleships instead of the two provided for, and we believe he is right. We are the richest nation in the world, have more sea coast to guard, and should have the greatest navy in the world. We should also have both naval and military academies on this coast to train up sufficient officers, requiring the cadets to spend half their time in the East and half in the West, so as to prevent sectionalism.

As a rule our defeated candidates are taking things sensibly, and will stand in for the election of the nominees. This is the wise way, while those that growl and threaten to defeat their winning rival are simply digging their political graves deeper. All the nominations have been honorably won and we see no cause for any one to air his grievances, while there is much reason for standing by the Golden Rule.

Had Senator Fulton come out squarely in favor of Statement No. 1, there is little doubt but that he would have been nominated. While we look on his defeat as a calamity to the interests of this coast, yet there is a compensating recompense and consolation in the fact that it shows the people are climbing into the saddle and unhorning politicians, and intend to ride, and guide in the future; and that no man, however great, can hold his seat unless he "gives and haves" as ordered by his master, the people. We hope that Cake is really a people's man, but when we recollect his race of two years ago against Bourne we are afraid that he is a bankers' candidate still.

Men interested in the preservation and propagation of salmon, regret that our State Board of Commissioners could not rise superior to their petty spites and appoint Hon. R. D. Hume Fish Warden, instead of appointing a stranger, ignorant of all the essential qualifications. Mr. Hume not only knows every salmon stream in Oregon, but every one on the Pacific coast, and no man living has had his experience in operating and mastering every detail of successful propagation. It was a case where men should have dropped their personal regard and stood up for the interests of future generations. We have never been a special advocate of all that Mr. Hume has done, but it affords us more pleasure to give him full credit for his meritorious deeds than to criticize his delinquencies.

CURRENT TOPICS.

Editor TRIBUNE:—A Portland paper has it that Chase, of Coos, is a Statement No. 1 candidate. On the contrary, he was a self-appointed delegate in the late reactionary or Machine convention held in that county, and from a speech he made in that convention it has been inferred that he is in favor of the repeal of our Direct Primary Law, and at a time too when a majority of the leading states are adopting it.

At the April election in Illinois 35 counties as well as over a thousand separate townships voted the saloon out of business under the Local option Law, while in Michigan of the 20 counties wherein the question was submitted to vote 14 went "dry" by decisive majorities; and this at a time when an effort is being made to return Curry county to the wallow.

In the early days of the Republican party "Abolitionists" was a scare word hurled at members of the new party to make them feel bad; and "do you want your daughter or sister to marry a nigger?" was intended as the climax and everlasting discomfiture of budding followers of John C. Fremont, and now the adversaries of Local Option have recourse to the epithet "prohibitionist" to frighten friends of that principle.

If Senator Fulton could have killed off a lot of d—n fool friends who in Machine Conventions assembled in several counties and endorsed him for re-election, his total vote would have been much larger which is proved by the fact that in every such county including Multnomah, Marion and Yamhill, Cake led him by a large majority; and in Coos he only led by a paltry majority of 30 votes.

The foolish charge that Democrats in large numbers registered as Republicans in order to vote for Cake and thus beat Fulton is being made. Chamberlain who is the Democratic candidate for Senator, and a farseeing politician never could have been guilty of the folly of encouraging such a movement since it is plain that his chances for beating Fulton at the general election would have been great, while if Cake carries his own county (Multnomah) at the general election, Chamberlain's name will be Dennis.

The very small vote in Coos and Curry for the anti-Statement No. 1 lends color to the conclusion that if a vigorous Statement No. 1 campaign had been waged a largely increased vote would have been called out with a very different final result, and it is altogether probable that Hugh McLain, a solid citizen and industrious mechanic, will defeat Chase for Joint Senator.

AN OPEN LETTER

To the Liberty-Loving Voter of Oregon, Greeting:

The undersigned, representing, as we believe, the large majority of the women of Oregon, are happy to embrace this opportunity, accorded to us through your initiative petitions, to lay before you a few of our many reasons for believing you will be as proud to extend to us, at the coming June election, your courteous invitation to join you in full and free possession of the elective franchise, as were the gallant men of Wyoming, Colorado, Idaho and Utah, who bestowed full rights of citizenship, almost without solicitation, upon every law-abiding woman within their borders.

This movement, which began in Oregon in 1871, grew so rapidly under guidance of pioneer men and women and public spirited law-makers, that the Legislative Assembly enacted, in autumn of 1872, a married woman's sole trader's bill, enabling a wife to hold her own earning, if necessary, as her own property, by registering her intention with the county clerk. Stimulated by this small beginning, the growth of public sentiment in favor of equal property rights for women has placed Oregon women far in advance, as self-earning property holders, of any other State in the Union, except the four States wherein they already vote.

But, although we are taxpayers, we are not yet full-fledged voters. This handicap brings the wage earnings of women into ruinous competition with wage-earning voters and, is a disability from which we believe you will be glad to relieve us by your votes next June, in the interest of both halves of the people.

This movement grew from the small beginning in 1872, above noted, until the year 1884, when our representatives submitted for us, by legislative enactment, a constitutional amendment at the State election of that year, which brought us 11,223 votes. Our proposed amendment was again submitted to a vote of one-half the people in the year 1900, and the "yes" vote had by that time grown to 26,265. The amendment was again submitted (always by men) in 1906, and the "yes" vote rose to 36,902.

For causes that are wholly eliminated from present campaign (and we hope from all future State campaigns for equal rights, and, therefore, need not be explained in this letter) the "no" vote of 1906 was for the first time, proportionately increased, but the readiness with which men have responded with their signatures to the large initiative petitions, through which you have reopened our case, is an assurance to us of your success in our behalf at the June election of 1908, for which we are patriotically expectant and profoundly grateful in advance.

If any of you say that you are weary of this agitation, we answer in all seriousness, so are we. So weary are we that, we believe you will, in mercy, not compel us to repeat this struggle in the year 1910, as we surely must if you fail us this time.

If there shall yet remain a few women who should attempt to repeat their former protest in this pamphlet against equal rights for other women, of which they are unable or unwilling, from their viewpoint, to see the need, we trust your practical good sense to prove to them through your affirmative votes
