The vote of Joint Senator in Coos is given unofficially as follows: Chase Rep. 140, Curry socialist 502, Hume Ind 343, Melain Dem. 991. Muncy's majority is large.

We were disappointed this week in not being able to publish, in tabulated form, the official count of the election in Curry. We will try to have it in our next, and will get it up in such form as to be intelligent to the reader.

Douglas County went Republican generally, but Fenton the stage man was elected sheriff by a large majority and Lenox another Democrat was elected County Clerk. Albert Abraham was elected Senator. Chamberlain had a small majority and prohibition won largely.

There was a general attendance at the Battle Rock Circle Saturday night and after the meeting they adjourned to Nielsen's hall and joined the young dancers who were waiting for them, and passed a merry evening the crowd being larger than any time this spring.

E. G. Barker, Jeweler and Real Estate dealer of Coquille City was in this vicinity last week on business. He will be back in a short time to investigate some timber claims that are for sale. Claims can not be had at the old prices, and holders who have good claims will not accept the same price that is paid for claims with only half the amount of timber. The only fair way to buy timber claims is at so much per thousand feet.

The county has bought a Road scraper for this end of the Co., the one bought last year will be used south of Rogue River. Clint Malehorn with a big team and a crew of men are now using the new scraper on the Port Orford mountain and will continue on down to Rogue River, having quickly repaired the road south of here. Clint says that it is just the thing, and he is surprised at the enormous work that can be done with it. It is a wise move by our County Court, and is both effective and economical.

Decorations day was duly observed at Port Orford, many coming from the adjacent country in remembrance of their beloved dead, nor were the graves of those who had no relations here or neglected. Some appropriate songs were sung, and Dr. Glanville made a feeling and appropriate address, fervid with human and patriotic emotion.

Some of the old time friends of the Tichenor family visited their cemetery on the Port Orford Heads, and decorated their graves with native flowers in loving remembrance. These lines were inadvertently omitted in the last issue of the Tribune.

Coos County went strongly Republican on the state ticket. Bedillion Democrat, however, beat Major Kinney for Representative. Partyism went to pieces on the county ticket and Gage, Dem. was elected Sheriff and Jeff Thrift Dem. elected assessor. Prohibition was defeated by a small vote. The vote for Joint Senator at Bandon was as follows: Chase Rep. 174, Curry Soc. 100, Hume Ind. 63, Melain Dem. 100, For Joint Rep. Muncy Rep. 179, Doyle Dem. 95. Cake beat Chamberlain by 40. Hawley has swept every county by a phenomenal vote. The Socialist vote is large enough to cause politicians to take notice, and the trusts to take the shivers. Hume's vote was smaller than expected.

John H. Tyler, optician, was in town last night on a professional visit to Rogue river.

Dr. Bennett, a young Dentist from Portland arrived here Thursday and is spending several days at professional work.

Walter Sutton's family has moved back to their home on Hubbard's Creek, where in the sheltered climate his daughter Mary is rapidly overcoming the symptoms of tuberculosis, which followed her attack of pneumonia.

Hon. George H. Williams, the grand old man of Oregon has been invited to second the nomination of Taft at the Chicago Convention June 16th. It is a deserved compliment. Williams is more than equal to the occasion: We wish the occasion were equal to the orator.

Harbor Items.

Isam Walker passed through Harbor last Sunday enroute for Humboldt Co., with a band of 550 head of cattle, mostly yearlings.

Cold northwest winds have predominated the past ten days and ground is drying out fast. Rain would be beneficial to the crops.

Our election passed off very quiet, eighty-four votes being cast in this precinct, and there about eighteen voters who did not attend the election.

The dance given by the candidates of Harbor Tuesday night was well attended. There being a number of people from Smith River in attendance.

Benj. Miller came down from his mine on the head of Chicoe River on the 29th inst, he states that the mines are all there yet.

On the 31st, inst, two torpedo boats and two destroyers passed up the coast. They were going at high speed and were only a few miles off shore.

Joel B. Wilson of Chicoe met with a painful accident last Tuesday. He was holding a picket while his son was driving it, when the maul came off the handle striking him on the right side, prostrating him to the ground where he lay in a state of insensibility for a few minutes, but soon recovered and from last accounts was doing as well as could be expected.

The six months old baby of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Macindoe of Smith River died last Saturday morning and was buried on Sunday P. M. It appears that the child was as well as ever at five o'clock and at six o'clock the parents were horrified to find the child dead. Its death is supposed to be due to strangulation.

Jo Zweifel a German who resides near Harbor visited our burg last Tuesday when he informed us of a thrilling encounter with a black bear. Mr. Zweifel's description of the encounter is as follows: At about 10 o'clock Monday night he states that he heard a scratching at his smoke house door. Mr. Z. thought at first it might be a stray dog, not dreaming of it being a bear. Taking his big shotgun down he told his wife, "if I catch that tam dog I will give him a charge of shot". As he drew near the smoke house he observed a dark animal just as he entered the door. He raised his gun but for some reason it snapped. He then gave it a tremendous kick in the rear. The bear whirled and seized him and commenced hugging him. His lusty yell soon brought his faithful wife to the rescue, armed with a tea kettle of boiling water, (that being a woman's weapon.) She dashed a large quantity of the water on the bears back, and it being a little too warm a climate for his bruin, he released his grip on his would be victim and suddenly fled for parts unknown.

This may seem to be a pretty big bear story but it is vouched for the truth by both Mr. and Mrs. Zweifel.

The San Francisco Examiner states that "William Walker has claimed Marwood and secured him." Marwood is one of R. Hume's string of runner's that have been performing well at Emeryville. He was entered in a selling race recently on the California track, and in Mr. Hume's absence was grabbed by Walker. Hume lost thereby his best horse, and we predict that he is unhappy over the outcome.

Rose City Sights Torpedo Boats.

High seas were running and strong - northwest winds blew during the entire trip of the steamer Rose City, Captain Kidston, between San Francisco and the mouth of the Columbia River. She reached port this morning and the skipper says it was one of the roughest voyages he has experienced so late in the season. Off Cape Blanco the torpedo boats Perry and Davis, wallowing in the seas, were spoken. The Perry had the Davis in tow, but they reported all well. Later the tow was dropped and she proceeded on with out assistance.

"We thought we saw a derelict off shore," says the skipper. "To make a close investigation the Rose City—ran alongside, and it was found that the supposed wreckage was the body of a mammoth decapitated whale. It was floating upon its back and looked just like the hull of a ship when viewed from a short distance. Without its head the monster was nearly 80 feet long. The stench was something frightful and we did not remain in that vicinity longer than necessary. It is my opinion that the whale was killed by Indians along the British Columbia Coast, his head was then set adrift. His old hulk would certainly do some damage to a ship should she collide with it"—Telegram.

A special race meeting will be held at the Marshfield track July 3d and 4th, and some excellent races are anticipated.

There are a number of horses now in training, and many more, which take part in the fair races, will be here.

In race No. 2 on the program, the entries will close June 10, and the fee will be \$25 each. For all the other races will close on July 1, and the fee will be \$5 for each horse. Four or more must be entered for each event, and if not, the board reserves the right to reduce the purse. They also reserved the right to postpone the races in case of bad weather.

Friday, July 3.
Race No. 1—trotting and pacing, free for all, one half mile. Best two out of three heats. Purse \$50.
Race No. 2—running, three eights mile dash, special for horses named Gold Beach, Verosax, Head light, etc. Entrance fee \$55, and wagers to take all. Purse \$125.

Race No. 3—Running one half mile dash. Purse, \$50.
Race No. 4—Running five eights mile dash. Purse, \$50.

Saturday, July 4.
Race No. 5—pacing and trotting, free for all, one half mile heats. Best two out of three heats. Purse \$50.
Race No. 6—Running, three eights mile dash. Best two out of three heats. Purse \$50.

Race No. 7—Running, one half mile dash. Purse \$50.
Race No. 8—Running, three fourths mile dash. (Stallion race). Purse \$50.

The men in charge of the races have organized with F. P. Norton as president; C. W. Carleton, sec., W. S. McFarland, treasurer; and A. J. Jackson as general manager.

New York, May 30.—Colin is still Colin. The great three year old son of Commando-Pastorella, wearing the colors of Jas. R. Keene was an added starter in the \$25,000 Belmont stakes one mile and three sixteenths day at Belmont Park and won in his usual impressive style a head from Fair Play.

This is the fourteenth consecutive victory of Colin.
He won twelve races as a 2 year old and this makes his second victory in the three year-old division. With the \$21,000 purse of Belmont, his earnings have now reached \$165,000.

Portland, Oregon, June 1st, 1908.
The Portland Rose Festival opened with all Portland in holiday humor, flower wreathed windows and roses were in evidence every where. Many thousands of visitors from outside points are in the city, and incoming crowds are greeted by an immense Arch of Welcome erected at the approach to the union station. Steel Trust Earnings.

The net profits of the steel trust for 1907, notwithstanding the panic were \$167,000,000. Its total business amounted to \$757,000,000 but the net profit on "finished products" was well up to 50 per cent. The total amount of wages paid was \$161,000,000, so that for every dollar a workman earned for himself he earned one for the trust. Thus was labor protected.—Ex.

Schooner Beats All Records.

The four masted schooner Alunna, Capt. J. W. Summie, arrived in port Wednesday after a record breaking trip for sailing vessels from Kahului, one of the Hawaiian ports of entry, making the distance via the mouth of the Columbia in 15 days. The trip to the light of the Columbia was made in 14 days, where she received orders to report at once to Coos Bay. In twenty-four hours he was inside Coos Bay. The entire distance covered was 2650 miles, the ship averaging 180 miles per day.

The captain and the crew are rejoicing in the record which is one that will stand for some time. The Alunna left the Columbia about a year ago with a cargo of lumber for a Chilian port, and carried a cargo to the Pacific Island from their returning to Coos Bay in ballast.—Coos Bay Harbor.
