Some of the newly elected members of the next legislative session have found statement No. 1 to be a bitter dose. A Lane county man expressed the hope in a message to Chamberlain, that "one of them might die before the voting began in January." This is suicidal or inhuman. It is to be hoped the man was either drunk or crazy when he sent the message, and yet we would rather be dead than a crazy.

If the Socialist vote has increased in other states as it has in Oregon it means the defeat of Bryan, and the election of a Republican President, who will perhaps be the last of his party. The Socialists are the staunchest party voters we have, while the voters of both our old parties are so disgusted at our country's surrender to the trusts and money trusts, and have so little confidence in Congress and our federal courts, that they are ready to join any party that promises relief, restitution from robbers, and resumption of control of our government in all its departments, by the people who created it, and all its wealth.

Our pretended statesmen and politicians have learned no lesson from the fact that three states that stood highest in universal education all became populist states. The Populists brought about some reforms, and opious promises from the old parties into which they finally went, but the promises are unfulfilled. The independent vote is the most intelligent vote, and is about ready to align itself with a party that represents the common welfare. Our diabolical money system, the failure of our congress to pass wise laws, the triumph and arrogance of trusts, the uncertainty of our Judicial System and the presence of so much misery and poverty in the midst of such bountiful resources, all tend to drive intelligent voters out of the old parties, either to the Socialists or to some new party that will mean what it says, and be a people's government in reality.

Conservation just now holds its hands aloft in sorrowful horror over the recent utterances of Senator La Follette. The dauntless statesman from Wisconsin has been more becoming personal in his remarks and the ethics of sleek, well-groomed financialdom and officialdom are trampled in the dust behind this Senatorial night-ride. Senator LaFollette thinks that a group of one hundred men, whom he names, possess too much wealth and too much power for the good of the country. And in that opinion and his manner of expressing it he gives concrete and definite proportions to what the people of this country believe and have believed for many years.

It may be, that in the La Follette list there are names which should not appear there. It may be that names are omitted which should have been included. It may be that La Follette impetuously has erred in these particulars, or in either of them, and that some man is smirking from the unjust sting of his denunciation. It may be that Mr. LaFollette could be as rich as the richest of these and as powerful as the entire one hundred, if opportunity favored. But with all the possibility of error and similarity of human propensity, the plain spoken, unvarnished truth-telling as to the danger of concentrated wealth with which the nation is confronted and is not even within the shadow of discount.

It makes no difference if this particular one hundred or some other one hundred comprise the personnel of a political, financial and wealth controlling junta, the principle of aggression, as ancient as the social intercourse of men, is well illustrated. Every student of the world's affairs should be familiar with it.

In the primitive social and political adjustments, the man of greater capacity steps to the front. The early service of that man is likely to be in the interest of his fellows. The acknowledgment of that service begets power. Similarity of interest brings support of others. The master hand is upheld by those who depend upon its cunning for their own uplance and authority. The flower of aggression unfolds as the process continues until, as one political philosopher has aptly put it: "a hundred thousand men labor for fifty years to build a tomb for one of their own mortal kind."

The love and abuse of wealth and power are as tangible and as harmful in their results to day as they were when the pyramids were first built. But there is this difference: Civilized men have learned to scent the danger and to resist.

Oregon's Sunday Law.

Section 1986. If any person keep open any store, shop, grocery, bowling alley, billiard room, or tipping house, for the purpose of labor or traffic, or any place of amusement, on the first day of the week commonly called "Sunday" or the "Lords Day," such person upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by fine of not less than \$5 or more than \$50; provided, however, that the above provision shall not apply to theaters, the keepers of drug stores, doctor shops, undertakers, livery stable keepers, butchers, and bakers; and all circumstances of necessity and mercy may be pleaded in defense, which shall be treated as questions of fact for the jury to determine when the offense is tried by jury.

CURRENT TOPICS.

Editor TRIBUNE.—One Albert Payson Terhune is engaged in "writing up" our Presidents, beginning of course with General Washington, and has just reached Chester A. Arthur, whom he mentions as having been "investigated" while Collector of the Port of New York, and whose record had been found clean, but omits to mention a hat Secretary of the Treasury John Sherman said of the Committee report.

As a matter of fact this writer of so-called history is wont to slosh over on the slightest provocation, and in a harmless sort of way stray away from the truth as the older generation yet living remember the facts of history.

For instance he does violence to the memory of Mr. Lincoln, by relating sundry shoulder hitting exploits during his younger days. He also betrays inexorable ignorance of the political history of the country when, in his description of the Pierce administration, he mentions incidentally that the Whig party had been anti-slavery forgetting that the Whig party had four times nominated slave holders for President, and had put up a number of slave holders for Vice President.

In 1852 when General Scott was the Whig candidate against General Pierce, the Whig candidate for Vice President was Mr. Graham, a slave holder of North Carolina. It was in this campaign, that Greeley, alleging that the whig convention had fallen down before the slave power, said: "I support the candidate but spit upon the platform."

There is a needless furor just now over the mention by Mr. Taft at General Grant's tomb on Decoration Day, undoubtedly with the concurrence of General Fred Grant, who stood by his side, that General Grant had been compelled to resign from the army out here on the Coast on account of his habit of drunkenness. Whether true or not, that has always been the understanding out here. Taft simply had in view the great honor to the memory of his subject for having been able to conquer himself as well as armies; and those who take up the cudgel against Taft defeat their own positions by insisting that Capt. Grant resigned because his salary was insufficient for the support of his family! As a Capt. he was in receipt of salary and allowances to the amount of \$150.00 a month, while as a "wood hauler" his income was nothing in comparison.

Shall we say that the recently coined word "irregardless," is an original illustration of Kirkham's rule 4, that two negatives destroy each other and generally amount to an affirmative?

Mr. Doyle, who was jumped into the fight at the eleventh hour for Joint Representative against the regular Republican nominee came within four votes of carrying Curry County, in which the Republicans have more than 100 majority. So, I take it, that Doyle has no kick coming over the outcome, especially since he led Mr. Hume, candidate for Joint Senator by long odds in both Coos and Curry.
