There will be six presidential tickets in the field this fall. The voter who cannot make a choice among so many is too finical to be a good citizen. The tickets are: Taft, Republican; Bryan, Democrat; Debs, Socialist; Watson, Populist; while prohibition and independent are to be yet named. The last three will poll a small vote, but the socialist vote will be large, and no one can tell whether Taft or Bryan will be the loser in consequence.

The announcement of Mr. Herman Ridder that he and his news paper the New York Staats-Zeitung will cordially support Bryan this time, is significant, and must be especially gratifying to the candidate and his friends. The Staats Zeitung is, perhaps the most influential newspaper in the country. It is read and believed in by a vast number of German Americans in New York and throughout the country. While formerly Democratic, as a rule, it went over to the Republican side on the money question in 1896, and has since supported the Republican nominee for president. Mr. Ridder was opposed to Mr. Bryan's nomination, not because he objected to Mr. Bryan now, but because he thought some other candidate would be stronger, especially in New York. But Bryan having been nominated, Mr. Ridder lost no time in advising him of his support.—Ex.

He is a mighty phrase maker; an author, inventor and originator of epigrams that will never die—no, never. His compositions bristle and glitter with all sorts of novel and amazing personages, metaphors, tropes and images. "The star-eyed goddess of reform," "the begonia of high finance," "the patriotism and a pension," "the lean wolves of plutocracy," "the hills of Yubadam," "from hell to breakfast," "the gascutis whandoole oofegooof," "the gin rickety and the bedfella," "the nigger, the trigger and the Ku-Klux-Klan."

He slings rhymes and philosophy with magnificent lavishness; he is never at a loss for a word, clause, sentence, paragraph, chapter book, tome, treatise or library. He has written more than 10,000 articles on the Hayes-Tilden controversy and is still going at full speed. He has annihilated Bryan, resurrected Bryan. His arguments against the Nebraska law were final and unanswerable; his arguments in the Nebraska's favor will be impenetrable and overwhelming. His mind is divided into two halves, one being an immovable body and the other an irresistible force. He is the champion Greco Roman and catch as catch can author of the universe.

Plain prose can never hope to do justice to the colonel's powerful pen. It is a thunderbolt, a 13 inch rifled cannon, a runaway locomotive, an earthquake, a cataclysm. When he dips it into the ink it throws off a ripple which invades the farthest limit of lost words. When it scatters the paper the sound deafens the inhabitants of the faraway Malay Archipelago.

CURRENT TOPICS.

Editor TRIBUNE.—The great "Union League" of Chicago, a strong Republican organization, has taken steps to finance a movement looking to the erection of an imposing monument in that city to Grover Cleveland in commemoration, it must be assumed, of his services to the Republican party by his betrayal of the Democratic candidate for President in two important National campaigns. Even the tory of England had the decency to forego any public manifestation of their respect for the memory of Benedict Arnold after his death.

And it cannot be pleaded in extenuation of Cleveland's treachery that Bryan had not been the first choice of the Democratic people of the country on both occasions when he was their candidate, or that the policies espoused were undemocratic, since, 8 years after Cleveland left the Democratic party, Alton B. Parker his first, not to say enthusiastic choice, made the race for President, and was the recipient of more than a million fewer votes than had been cast for Bryan four and eight years previously.

Further, twelve years after Cleveland had bolted and practically gone to the Republicans because as he alleged, Bryan was unworthy of the trust or countenance as a Democrat, the latter so still the idol of every Democrat in the land with the significant exception of an despotic gang of political and business parasites as ever scuttled a ship or cut a throat; while Judge Parker, Cleveland's ideal Democrat, attracts no attention either at home or abroad.

Sherman, Vice Presidential candidate, is a Millionaire banker, president of a big ice trust, and director in several canning corporations, and has lately been dubbed "Shout Weight Jim," because, as a member in Congress, he fought down the provision for printing on the label the weight as well as the quality of the contents of cans turned out of his canneries.

Two years since, Mr. Taft, in a political speech in Ohio, denounced Boss Cox, banker and saloon keeper in Cincinnati, as utterly degraded and corrupt, and wholly unworthy of recognition by any gentleman. Bryan, on divers occasions during the past few years, has paid like compliments to Roger Sullivan of Illinois. Yet, impossible as it may seem to the uninitiated in the ways of the sordid, conscienceless partisan manipulator, Cox is booming Taft for President, while Sullivan is shouting hysterical testimonials of his loyalty to Bryan's cause.

The new editor of the Radium, though a much abler writer than his immediate predecessor, has not been in a position lately to keep abreast of the important happenings of the country, or he would have known that the great Socialist party lately held a large and enthusiastic National Convention at Chicago, and nominated Eugene V. Debs, a second Lincoln, for President, and the great printer Ben Hanford for Vice President.

A Faithful Servant.

Orsadd West, railroad commissioner, is journeying on foot over the Corvallis and Eastern railroad, between Corvallis and Yaquina, inspecting the tracks and bridges on that line. When he shall have finished the tramp of 70 odd miles, he will have personally examined every tie, every rail on the track, every timber and every bolt in the bridge. An intelligent and valuable report will probably result from the arduous examination, as was true of a simpler tramp taken by him over the west side some months ago. The method is widely different from the policy of the former railroad commission of Oregon, which rode over the lines occasionally in palatial cars, provided by the companies without expense and with entertainment provided by the companies officials. Valuable results however come cheap. West's plan is sane and safe for the public, which in the summer months uses the Corvallis and Eastern road extensively. It is of a kind with the plans pursued in the state land office, in which his services to the state was invaluable.—Journal.

A Frenchman's Views Of Bryan.

M. Clam a Parisian journalist, now touring the country, relates the following impressions on Bryan: "M. Bryan is a farmer, one American does tell me. Yet again I am told he is the editor. Also he is the statesman ready for the job. Also he is the Chautauque, which is the Indian word meaning, peerless orator. Many Americans do tell me of the M. Bryan farm in the province of Nebraska. Almost, I think no farm in the universe so profitable. M. Bryan is the proprietor of one heifer worth 8,000 francs! Also one American did tell me that one windmill on the M. Bryan farm did all the work, and also, he said, when M. Bryan did leave that farm the windmill would not run! This, to me, is phenomenal.

In the Lincoln City M. Bryan does have the newspaper Commoner. Always after milking the 8,000 franc heifer, M. Bryan goes to the Lincoln city and write the Democratic policy editorials. The Commoner newspaper has the circulation gigantic, almost 1,000,000 of Americans reading it at once. All Americans do read the Commoner to learn if these Democrats have discovered one policy yet. Nearly each week M. Bryan nearly out lines the party platform, yet not quite. One American did tell me that it was impossible in these United States to tell that Democratic party altogether. He said: "You know one baker saves the yeast for the next batch of bread? Very well, M. Bryan knows his business too."

M. Bryan, all men do say, is one Democrat. He, also says, "I am a Democrat." Yet always when I ask, "What is one Democrat?" Those Americans do look at me in surprise, yet pain. I do try hard to learn what is the Democrat, yet I have disappointment, with perplexity. The Democrat is not the Republican, yes! Yet M. Bryan tells those people now he has the affection for those Roosevelt policies, most especially. And M. Roosevelt is the Republican!

Those Republicans do hold the fat office, in these United States. When one man does get the office, instantly he becomes one Republican. Now to me it seems this way: All those Americans who have not the fat office, they are Democrats. If that Democratic party should have victory, with fat office, I think it would be the Republican party. And those Republican would be Democrats. If I have made error in this I beg pardon. Yet I think this is the truth."

Supreme Court Record.

Despite the popular notion of the ponderosity and slow moving qualities of the Supreme Court of the United States, that tribunal received not a note worthy record during the term just closed, as follows: LaFollette employers' Liability law unconstitutional.

Federal courts have limited power only to punish conspiracy to prevent negroes from working. Federal government cannot punish captains of steamers for the landing and escape of foreigners or crew. Federal authorities limited in land fraud prosecutions, and new trial granted former Rep. John

Newton Williamson, of Oregon. Liquor laws of Kansas declared unconstitutional. Federal receivership of New York railways upheld.

Krdman act, in so far as railroads being prohibited from discriminating against unions because they are such, unconstitutional.

Boycott of goods entering interstate commerce declared violation of Sherman anti-trust law.

Oregon's female labor law constitutional.

Elkin's rebate law held not to have been repealed by Hepburn law, and \$15,000 rebate fine on Great Northern Ry. Co. approved.

"Canned" music from copyrighted music sheets held not to violate copyright law.

Campaign contributions must not be collected in government buildings even by letter.

Elkin's law applicable to export-shipments of meat. Fines of \$15,000 against the big packing houses and the Burlington railway approved.

Texas law taxing railroads declared unconstitutional.

H. Clay Pierce, oil magnate, must stand trial in Texas for false swearing in Waters-Pierce Oil Co. suit. Ordinance of city of St. Louis levying a passenger tax on street car companies valid.
