**In Reply to S. P. Peirce.**

In the Gold Beach Globe of last week S. P. Peirce consumes about a column and a half of space in an out-of-place and uncalled for attack upon the alleged unfairness of the TRIBUNE relative to the recent opening of the Byer's survey on Hubbard's creek, and as the writer gives vent to his malice towards myself in particular, I will answer over my own signature thus leaving no doubt as to the authorship of this article.

In beginning I wish to state to our readers that I regret very much the fact that this reply is necessitated, as the bone of contention is of but little, if any, public interest, but as it is it would be doing an injustice to every bona fide homesteader in said survey to pass unnoticed an article so grossly false and misleading from beginning to end as the one just penned by the hand of this man, whose elastic conscience enabled him to jump at conclusions and then state them as facts utterly regardless of integrity, honor, or justice to his fellow man.

The TRIBUNE from the first has favored the home localer (timber applicant as well as homesteader) in preference to those from abroad. It did not widely advertise the opening of this survey for the reason that there was not enough vacant land to supply the local want and two notices posted in Port Orford had informed the people of this vicinity of the date at which the land was to be thrown open, and if the outside land-grabber and scripper could be kept out, so much the better. Personally I gratuitously assisted, by blue-print and information, timber applicant and squatter alike; and that there are both bona fide timber claims and homesteads in this survey no person can successfully deny.

In regard to the conditions existing on my homestead, I will simply say that Mr. Peirce's allegations are contemptuously false, as I will have the evidence to prove when the proper time comes.

The list of claims enumerated as having been acquired by the Stewart family is not correct and even tho' it were it has no bearing in this controversy, but as it is mentioned it may not be out of place to state that the Peirce family too have exercised their timber rights—the only difference being that the former did so without trying to take any of the land away from their neighbors.

The underlying current in the article in the Globe is that land with timber on it cannot be homesteaded. This as the writer knew, is erroneous, as many of the most beautiful and productive homes in the West have been carved out of the woods. It would, and has been for years, next to impossible to get a homestead in Curry county worth having without at least a large portion of it being covered by timber. That the home-builder is given the preference is evidenced by our land laws. All land not mineral or reserved by government is open to homestead entry but not to timber entry, while the timber applicant must swear that the land is more valuable for its timber or stone than for agricultural purposes. The homesteader does not have to swear the reverse.

Mr. Peirce in speaking of myself says in part: "who, as every person in Port Orford knows is taking or attempting to take his homestead solely for the timber thereon." The following statement is a conclusive answer to this and gives the lie in a form that it cannot be evaded, and was freely signed by everyone to whom it was presented, containing the names of our leading townsmen:
