SEES WINGED EXPRESSES. Santos-Dumont Utters a Few Startling Predictions Regarding Future Transportation.

Writing in the new French magazine Je Sais Tout (I Know Everything), M. Santos Dumont, the famous French aeronaut, prophesies that before many years have passed a complete revolution will have taken place in modern methods of traveling.

Transcontinental aerial expresses will fly between St. Petersburg and Paris. Men of this generation will take their seats in them as naturally as their grandfathers did in the first railway carriages.

Paris will be transformed by aerial stations at which passengers will alight and embark on flying omnibuses. Winged warships will menace modern fleets and wage war with submarines—perhaps put whole armies to flight. Very possibly some bold explorer will reach the north pole without much difficulty in a dirigible balloon.

"What would you say," adds M. Santos Dumont, "if I told you that next summer I am confident of giving a new impulse to aerial navigation; that I myself hope to be able, before ending my experiences, to cruise over Europe for a week at a time—without descending to earth—in a yacht that will be in itself a flying house?"

TOLD OF ABSINTHE DRUG. Is Described as the "Fairy with the Green Eyes"—Is a Nerve Stimulant.

The "fairy with the green eyes" is the poetical way in which absinthe has been described. "It is rather a drug than a drink," said a medical man who has studied its effects on the body.

As a medicine it has some valuable qualities; as a beverage, its effects are simply deadly. Not a day passes in Paris in which some inveterate absinthe drinker does not drop dead either from apoplexy or heart failure. Fortunately, it has not obtained much hold in England.

The liqueur is supposed to act as a nerve tonic and brain stimulant, and so it does when taken medicinally. When thus resorted to it gives tone to persons of a highly nervous temperament, and also has the effect of relieving bronchitis by promoting a healthy perspiration. But it should never be taken except under medical advice. As a beverage, avoid it as you would poison. Much of the cheap absinthe sold is adulterated with copper, to give it the characteristic green hue.

COMMON ERRORS OF ELITE

A "Don't" Book Will Tell You of Numberless Mistakes Made by People in High Society.

"Did you ever pick up a 'don't' book and read it and see how many mistakes the average, so-called, well-bred person makes unconsciously, or through bad habits?" asked a young lawyer according to the Birmingham News.

"Perhaps slang has a great deal to do with it, as slang expressions are often used in such way as to make them resemble good English. We say a piece of cake is awfully good, or a girl is awfully pretty, when we mean 'very.' We say a wedding 'occurs,' when nothing but accidents occur, and as for that word 'lay,' how few people there are who are not afraid to use it. We 'lay' a thing down, but we ourselves 'lie' down."

"Lay, laid, laid takes an object; 'lie, lay, lain' does not. How ridiculous it is to say that we 'love' candy, when we 'like' it; a plate of soup could hardly be 'lovely,' but a rose could be. And that word 'got.' It seems almost an unnecessary word if care would be taken. The words 'she,' 'him,' and 'her' are really the most troublesome words in the English language to most people. I was shocked to hear a society girl here say: 'Mrs. Blank has invited she and I to her house.' They seem to be afraid of the word 'her' and 'me.' To say 'she asked her and me' sounds queer, but it is correct. How many careless people say: 'He asked for you and I.' The word 'ain't' is fast growing in disfavor. Few know that the word 'aggravate' does not mean 'provoke' or 'irritate,' and that they must not say a 'new beginner.' We expect a visitor but we 'suspect' he is sick. A man dies 'of' a disease, not 'from,' and to say 'do like I do' should be 'do as I do.' The word 'preventive' is to be used instead of 'preventative,' and the term 'I mistake' instead of 'I am mistaken.' So one could go on indefinitely in the line of speech and writing, but when it comes to etiquette and table manners, how many there are who fall short of the rules laid out by the standard on such matters."

PINEAPPLE FOR DIGESTION. Juice of This Fruit May Take Place of Pepsin in Relieving Stomach of Duties.

Pineapple juice bids fair to take the place of pepsin as an encourager of digestion. Recent investigations have shown that for such a purpose it is wonderfully efficacious, rivaling if it does not excel the product of poor piggy. If a piece of ordinary beefsteak be placed in a bowl of pineapple juice, it is found, after a few hours, to be reduced to a lump of mere jelly, having undergone a process of digestion. In the same way the juice, when drunk, acts upon the food in the stomach, and is capable, it is authoritatively said, of digesting something like a thousand times its own weight of edible substances.

Now, the reason back of these facts is that the juice of the pineapple contains an "enzym," a species of ferment, which attacks the beefsteak or other food and disorganizes it. It is such an extremely powerful ferment that, acting much in the same way as pepsin, it will, in the course of a few hours, cause the substance upon which it works to dissolve and melt away. The name "bromelin" has been given to it by science.

It is extremely easy to separate the digestive principle from the pineapple juice. All you have to do is to take some of the juice and dissolve a tablespoonful or so of common table salt in it. This will cause the digestive stuff to fall to the bottom of the receptacle, when it may be easily separated. A good-sized pineapple will contain more than a pint of juice—a quantity which is amply sufficient to help in the digestion of half a dozen hearty meals.

How powerful it is may be judged from the fact that a single slice of the fruit laid upon a raw beefsteak, will, in a very short time, change the consistency of the surface to that of a jelly. But it should be realized that cooking destroys the "enzym," and that the only way to get the benefit of the digestive ferment is to eat the pineapple in its natural state.
