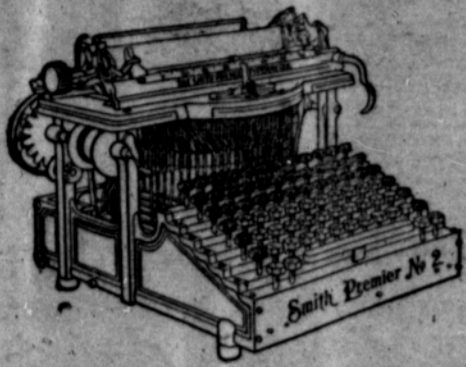

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DIGESTION OF A COYOTE.

The Ostrich May Be Deposed from Its Proud Eminence—Possessor of Other Qualities.

For many years the ostrich has enjoyed world-wide renown from the possession of a digestive apparatus wonderful and unique. The fact that a full-grown ostrich in the prime of physical and mental vigor can exceed the speed of a modern race horse without half trying, and that the same ungainly bird carries with him a ready-for-use kick calculated to make the noblest effort of the famed Georgia mule look like the scratching of a spring chicken, has not detracted from the ostrich's fame as a gourmand.

But now, according to official announcement by the department of agriculture, there is a rival in the field, and the ostrich's diet of Swiss watches, lamp chimneys, Italian marble and other easily assimilated articles of food has paled into insignificance beside the performance of his latest competitor. The rival of the ostrich is the humble American coyote of the western plains, weird of voice, fleet of foot, impish of act, the hated of his brethren and the scourge of the ranchman.

According to a bulletin issued by the agricultural department, the author being David E. Lantz, M. S., assistant in the division of biological survey, coyotes feed chiefly upon animal matter, but when such food is scarce they freely eat peaches, apricots, horses, melons, pears, cattle, juniper berries, fish, manzanita berries, birds, prickly pears, reptiles, horned toads, insects, turtle eggs, prairie dogs, crustaceans, lizards and crabs.

The above would seem to be a somewhat comprehensive list, but the department has already received a number of letters from ranchmen of the western coyote country, suggesting additions to the animal's already extensive menu. Among the things mentioned by the department's western correspondents as being freely and frequently enjoyed by hungry coyotes are old shoes, flannel shirts, canned goods, underwear, harness, axle grease, fish hooks, chocolate caramels and tar roofing.

The fact that, according to the department expert, the coyote partakes freely of the above-mentioned articles of diet only when he cannot get his favorite food is considered to be not detrimental to the coyote's chances in competition with the ostrich. It has never been satisfactorily proved, according to those familiar with the subject, that the ostrich is more partial to assorted hardware and broken glass than to more sustaining, if less appetizing, food.

EAGLE IS A GOOD FIGHTER

Man and Dog Are Happy When Big Bird Sells Away and Leaves Them in Peace.

In the pine woods on the Jersey coast a man was hunting, and by the afternoon was pretty well fagged out, relates the New York Press. He lay down under a tree for a doze and fell into a deep sleep.
